RETAILING AND THE MINIMUM WAGE

Retail trade has always been exempt from the provisions of the federal minimum wage law. Now, it is reported, an effort is to be made both to increase the wage, and at the same time subject retailing to the law.

The case against doing that is a powerful one, which should be generally understood-and it concerns the welfare of the worker and the consumer, as well as the retail employer.

For one thing, retailing is essentially a local business. Even though a store may be a chain system, or affiliated with other stores in buying groups, it must adjust to the conditions in the specific shopping area in which it is located. Its wage scales must be competitive and fair.

Second, the amount that can be spent for payroll in any store must be related to the volume of business. In a small town, for example, a salesperson can't sell as much mercandise in a given period of time as her counterpart in a bustling big-city store. Yet the percent of payroll cost to volume must be relatively equal everywhere.

Third, legislatively forced increase in retail operating costs, unaccompanied by increases in productivity, cannot help but raise prices and reduce sales-at the expense of farm and factory producers, as well as consumers.

Fourth, local competition between businesses of all types in obtaining workers assures that

Finally, the people covered by a minimum wage are those with the fewest skills and the least experience. They are of very limited value to the employer. Thus, if the arbitrary wage law were extended to retailing, store operators would be forced to reduce this kind of emplyoment to the bare minimum. There would be fewer jobs openand fewer opportunties for people to get the training that leads to better-paid positions.

PROTECTION AGAINST MAJOR ILLNESS

The newest development in health insuranceand one whose potential for good is enormousis found in policies covering catastrophic, or major, illnesses which involve long periods of treatment and heavy costs.

As of late count, 31 insurance companies were offering the protection and six more were contemplating it. The policies are written on a deductible basis, like automobile collision coverage. Maximum benefits are high-\$5,000 to \$7,500 in most cases. The rates are moderate.

As with anything new, this coverage is still in an experimnetal stage. But most of the insurance executives queried by Mr. Williams are optimistic as to the future. More and more people will obtain the policies, they think-and the policies' provisions will be liberalized whenever poss-

HOW TO CREATE JOBS

In a new study entitled "Investment for Jobs," the Chamber of Commerce of the United States urges changes in the tax laws that will encourage the investment of money in job-creating enterprises. As the study's title implies, it is proposed in the interest of everyone who works for a living. LET'S PUT CHRIST IN EVERY DAY

It is a strange thing that the time of the year when millions propose to celebrate the birthday of Jesus is the time when church attendance and Bible study attendance in most places is at its lowest ebb, when there are more drinking parties given in offices and homes and when there is more drunkeness and general worldliness than usual. Of course students of the Bible realize that we are not told when Jesus was born and there is not any indication in Holy scriptures that we should ourselves choose some day and make it a day of religious celebration. We are told Christ rose from the dead, and we are authorized to celebrate each first day of the week around the Lord's table proclaiming to the world our faith in him, in his death, and resurrection until he come, (1 Cor. 11 and Acts 20:7.)

But the Bible certainly teaches that we should put Christ into every day. When we obey the gospel we put Christ on. (Gal. 3:27.) Jesus said, "I am the vine, ye are the branches. 





Issued by Henry A. Holle, M. D., State Realth Officer of Texas

AUSTIN-If you have not had an audit made recently of your physical assets and liabilities, go to your doctor now and have it done is the advice of Dr. Henry A. Holle, State Health Officer, to all grown-ups in Texas. "It is quite important," Dr. Holle said, to check up on your physical resources as it is to look into the state of your financial possessions. By regular care under your physician's direction, you can conserve your physical assets and avoid the accumulation of destructive liabilities.

"Each of us starts with a certain amount of physical capital. Merely as a business proposition, it is worthwhile to conserve it to the best of our ability. In infaney and childhood our physical resources, as a rule, are safeguarded for us. As we grow older, the responsibility for doing so rest upon the individual. The critical period may come in midde life with the sudden realization that the physical capital is yielding diminishing returns in the way of physical well being. A large number of the deaths reported each year in Texas is due to the degenerative diseases of middle age.

"Nearly all of these diseases have slow beginnings, and their onset can often be recognized in the course of a thorough physical examination before they have gained serious headway. If the current Congressional investigations cripple the Federal Housing Administration and slow down new housing legislation, "there will be serious repercussions on the entire national economy," E. G. Gavin, editor of American Builder, says in a forthcoming issue of the magazine.

Gavin warns that it is "against the public interest to impair the service of this federal agency to home buyers." Gavin says it would be a "calamity" to condemn the FHA or cause it to lose public confidence.

FHA, Gavin declares, has "made it possible for more people to own
