#### MIRACLES ARE NORMAL

Early in October a major oil company dedicated a new refinery at Mandan, North Dakota. There is nothing particularly remarkable about such an event. Steady industrial development is something we take for granted. However, it is worth pausing occasionally to think of what has happened in an amazingly brief period of time.

Less than 80 years ago Colonel George A. Custer and his Seventh Calvary rode out from a frontier fort near Mandan to round up some hostile Indians. The vast reserves of petroleum lying deep in the Williston Basin of North Dakota would have no meaning to Custer and his men. They would have been stunned as the Indians they were fighting at the sight of a modren automobile. In less than 80 years, thanks to research, invention and industrial development, we have come to accept miracles as normal progress.

The fact that the management and stockholders of a single company have ventured to spend millions of dollars building a 30.000 barrel a day refinery and linking it to distant markets with hundreds of miles of pipeline without causing the raising of an eyebrow in a region where a handful of white settlers were fighting Indians a matter of decades ago, is something for the political detractors of the American system to think about. It should also make us all realize that payrolls, employment opportunities, and the prosperity of the smallest community are linked inextricably to freedom of opportunity in basic enterprises such as the oil industry.

#### PROGRESS REPORT

Various factors determine just how good the standards of medical care are in any nation. One is the number of doctors in practice, and the quality and extent of the facilities for educating physicians. In this, the United States is exceedingly fortunate.

A report made by the American Medical Association tells the story. The record graduation of 6,861 doctors during 1953-54 brought the nation's physician population to approximately 220,100. This means there is a doctor for every 730 persons in the country-and that, too, is a high rec-
