POWER FROM THE ATOM

Great progress can be expected in the development of atomic energy for peacetime purposes, such as electric power production. The fact that private enterprise, as well as government agenries, will participate in the work is assurance that the nation will get maximum results in a mini-

However, there seems to be an idea in the pubic mind that the atom will revolutionize the electric business in the relatively near future. And this idea, to experts active in the field just isn't

One such expert recently said that while total electric generating capacity in this country is expected to reach 2,000,000,000 kilo, by 1965—double the present figure—it is doubtful is more than 3.-000,000 kilowatts will come from atomicallyfield plants. He added that "economical and technical considerations make it certain that the enormous requirements for electric power in the next 75 years will be satisfied in the great majority by conventionally fueled plants."

Many other authorities have expressed similar views. They do not minimize the potential importance of atomic energy. But they are convinced that the changes it will bring about will be revolutionary, and will occur over a much longer period of years than many people now believe.

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HOW RELIGIOUS DIVISION STARTED (Con.)

As has been previously stated last week it is evident from the scriptures and history that the christian movement had its beginning about the year A. D. 33 and from this time until about A. D. 100 the teachings and religious practices of christianity were under the watchful guidance of inspired apostles.

Soon after the death of these inspired apostles, a departure from the original pattern began. The first change was in the government of the christian community or church practices of an organization cannot be changed until the government of that organization is changed. In the student's Ecclesiastical History, Vol-1, page 182, there is the following statement:

"In this more definite organization of the church, the most striking feature is the increase in the authority of Bishops, and the introduction of distinction of rank among them-as most christian churches has a plurality of presbyters-some of these obtained, whether by age, character, or ability, the position of a president, and to him was the title of Bishop applied in a special sense, while his colleagues retained that of presby-

In the Bible the governing officers of each congregation were called by different names which described the nature of their office, the same office-"Elders" (presbyters) Tit. 1:5. Bishops (Overseers) 1 Tim. 3: 2; and Pastors (Shepherds) Eph. 4:11. All apply to the same official capacity with no special designation of any one officer. No one man was given authority over more than one congregation. The New Testament pattern is that of congregational independence — each congregation a separate unit bound together by no ecclesiastical authority, but by christian love and having in common identical teachings concerning salvation, the same observances in worship, and all wearing the name of Christ.

Naturally with the departure from the B.ble pattern of church government would come a change or other changes in the christian system. The climax came when this order became a religious dictatorship governing almost all of the religious groups throughout the world-religious groups which themselves were filled with doctrinal corruptions and un scriptural practices.





CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MUNDAY, TEXAS:

Before the City of Munday, Texas, shall be liable for damges for the death or personal injuries of any person or for damage to or destruction of property of any kind, which does not constitute a taking or damaging of property under Article I, Section 17, Constitution of Texas, the person injured, if living, or his representatives, if dead, or the owner of the property damaged or destroyed, shall give the City Council or City Secretary notice in writing of such death, injury, damage or destruction, duly verified by affidavit, within forty-five days after same has been sustained, stating specifically in such written notice, when, where and how the death, injury, damage or destruction, occurred, and the apparent extent of such injury, the amount of damages sustained, the actual residence of the claimant by street and number at the date the claim is presented, the actual residence of such claimant for six months immediately preceding the occurence of such death, injury, damage or destruction, and the names and addresses of all witnesses upon whom it is relied to establish claim for damages; and the failure to so notify the City Council or the City Secretary within the time and manner specified herein shall exonerate, excuse and exempt the City of Munday from any liability whatsoever. No act of any officer or employee of the City shall waive compliance or estop the City from requiring compliance, with provisions of this ordinance, as to notice, but such provisions may be waived by resolution of the City Council, made and passed before the expiration of the forty-five day period herein provided and evidenced by minutes of the City

This ordinance shall become effective on the first day of February, 1955, and the City Secretary shall give notice of the passage by causing the ordinance to be published in The Munday Times, the official newspaper of the City of Munday, Texas, within ten days after the passage of







Weekly Health

Issued by Henry A. Holle, M. D., State Health Officer of Texas

AUSTIN-" A hundred years itis because nobody had it," said Dr. Henry A. Holle, State Health Officer. It wasn't until forty years ago that there was enough of it around for it to be given a name. Today an estimated two and a half million Americans suffer from the hurting joints caused by bursitis.

The reason for the big increase seemes to be found in modern living. So many of the things people do-typing, working adding machines, driving, handling compressed air tools, exercising the very things that can cause an attack of bursitis. Too. people live longer nowadays and busitis most often attacks after forty when age weakens tendons.

The body has more than 140 of these little sacs. Most important is the subdeloid bursae in the shoulder, which helps the major shoulder muscle operate. It is the most improtant because the human shoulder wasn't designed for the work it now has to do. The result is that though bursitis can occur in any of the 140 bursae and often does affect elbows, hips, ankles and joints, 80 per cent of the time it is in the shoulder.

If an attack of busitis occurs, a physician should be consulted. He can control bursitis but he can't control the results of neglect. Curing bursitis takes time and patience.
