Water Contract Gets Approval At Benjamin

Voters of Benjamin approved a contract between the city and Knox County Water District No. 1 last Saturday by a vote of 82 3, according to Von R. Terry, who held the election.

Under terms of the contract, the water will be sold to the city for 30 cents a thousand gallons. On March 5, citizens of Benjamin will again go to the polls, that time to vote on a \$130,000 bond issue to finance facilities for getting water to Benjamin.

"POLITICAL 'CARE'-NOT MEDICAL CARE"

The Dallas Morning News has something worthwhile to say about the medical care problem, under the title "Private Security."

"Ninety-five of every 100 workers are now covered by some kind of private-not governmentbenefit program," the paper pointed out. "This is not the brag of private business. It is a govarnment figure.

"Nine of ten have life insurance. Eight of ten have hospital insurance, and more than half of those have surgical policies. Six of ten are coverer for sickness and accident. Five of ten have medical care. Six of ten have their own company pension coverage.

"Yet, there is growing pressure in Washington for the Federal government to get into the medical business. It makes just as much sense as the government going into the automobile business so that those who don't have a car can have one at taxpayers' expense. That pressure is for political 'care,' not medical care.'

M's also significant that the growth of the varibus voluntary health insurance plans has been phenominal in a short period of time. And that growth continues-which certainly proves that the majority of us want and can afford the pro-

There is, of course, a small percentage of indigent people who can't afford such insurance. They can be helped, in whatever measure is needed, without subjecting all the rest of us to politically dominated medicine.

TOO CONVENIENT

Dorothy Thompson recently discussed the closand shop and the union shop. She wrote: "It is extremely convenient for union leaders if every worker is compellel to join a union to get or held a job it is convenient for many employers to have a 'closed shop," and bargain collectively without possibility of minority dissent.

"The trouble is that it is convenient. It reduces the workers' status, more than ever, to that of a commodity to be bought and sold en bloc. It reduces the possibility of creating a more genu anely free and democratic industrial system. It freezes and creates a monopoly of the status

Seventeen states have adopted right-to-work laws, under which workers can join or not a labor organization, as they choose, without fear of reprisal by either employers or unions. There is no more fundamental or important right.

UNJUST TAXES

The National Conference for repeal of Taxes on Transportation has called on Congress to repeal the 10 per cent excise tax on passenger fares which has to be paid by those who use public carrier service, along with the three per cent tax on freight charges levied only on freight moved by public for-hire carriers, and taxes levied on ahe movement of coal and of products which move by pipeline.

These taxes were originally imposed during World War II as an emergency measure. Their purpose was to discourage unnecessary use of war-burdened transportation agencies, as well as to raise revenue. Now the emergency has passed, and all the carriers have plenty of available space for both passengers and goods. Yet the taxes remain in effect, and still discourage travel at at time when there is no need for that what whatsoever.

The Conference's statement observes that the taxes fall "upon one of life's basic necessitiestransportation" and that they "create a great injustice to the traveling and shipping public." There's no question of permitting anyone involved to avoid regular, established taxes. It is simply a matter of getting rid of what amounts to class taxes which unjustly burden certain categories of individuals and enterprises. The Conference is right.



The law provides a special tax rate for any individual who qualifies as a "Head of Houseunmarried or legally separated at the end of your taxable year. CATTLE POPULATION IS HIGHER AGAIN!

FORT WORTH - The announcement by the Department of Agriculture that the cattle population had climbed to 95,-443,000 head on United States farms and ranches on January 1 was not unexpected at Fort Worth. This means 646,000 more than a year ago.

Livestock men at the market had suspected this was the case as shipments of cows and heifers had declined in the past nine-Worth is at the cross roads between the Eastern third of Texas, a section of the country that SHEEP AND LAMBS has had tremendous gains in cattle population in recent years, and the Western two-thirds of the state, most of which has seen drouth decimate cattle and sheep numbers.

Current cattle population is estimated at 95,433,000; a year ago \$8. it was 94,787,000; in 1953 it was 93,637,000. The average 1944-1953 was 82.917.000.

Currently estimates of cows, two-yearold or over for milk are 24,408,000 head; against 24,675,-000 a year ago. A decline of 267,-000 head and this decline was very evident at Fort Worth because of heavy numbers of "marginal" or unprofitable milkers a total of 48,560,000 a year ago. that went to market as raw milk prices sagged. 



Knox Prairie Philosopher Claims Expansion Of The Cities Will Solve The Big Problem Of Crop Surpluses

Editor's note: The Knox Prairie Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm on Miller Creek has another odd idea this week, with maybe one or two grains of truth in it. Dear editar:

I make this prediction from a recent trip I had to take which took me through several Texas cities, including Houston, Dallas, Fort Worth, San Antonio, etc That's more traveling than I've done in years and I expect it will last me from now on. I'm glad to be back home.

But the thing I observed, and which the farm experts and worriers apparently are overlooking is that there's more building going on in them cities than you ever dreamed of. Cities are reaching out in every direction for for more room, and a man who announces in Houston for example that he's putting up 100 more houses has a hard time even getting his name in the pa-

pers. It ain't news any longer. And the same is true in smaller cities and even in towns. They are growing in all directions too. Everybody's building a new

Now here's my point. Every time a city develops a new subdivision, it takes that much more land out of cultivation, makes that many more people to feed. Every time a city grows a few more thousand, it increases its traffic problem that much more, which naturally increases its traffic deaths.

Expansion of cities and cemeteries, if it keeps up at the present rate, is gonna take enough land out of cultivation in Texas to solve the crop surplus problem. We ain't got a thing to worry about.




Swifty Gets Slowed Down




