



SHORT END OF THE STICK

The extent to which canned hams and other pork products from European countries, including communist Poland, are entering the American market will come as a surprise to most of us. Last year an increase of 28 per cent was registered over 1953, for a record total of 99,163,000 pounds. Of this, communist Poland accounted for almost 20,000,000 pounds. Germany, Denmark and Holland were other heavy shippers.

Without going into a discussion of foreign trade theory, it is evident that in this case the United States is getting the short end of the stick. Communist Poland, for example, is not a market for American pork, or for lard, hides, tallow, etc. And the dollars Poland thus obtains may even be used for the purchase, in dollar-hungry third countries, of stragetic materials which are not permitted to be exported from the United States to the communist countries.

Even in countries which do buy some meats and allied products from us, the trade is severely restricted in many ways-by licensing and quota systems, exchange controls, prohibitively high duties, and so on.

The moral is plain. These heavy imports should persuade foreign countries that reciprocally fair treatment should be given American products we want to export to them. We should have the same freedom of entry in foreign markets as foreign producers have in ours. Foreign trade, to be sound and equitable, must be a two-way street.

THE "RIGHT TO WORK"

Suppose for the sake of argument that the 48 states or Congress should pass laws requiring that before a man could work at his trade, and before an employer could hire him, he would have to join a specified organization, pay an initiation fee and regular monthly dues, and be prepared to submit to special assessments.

Do you suppose the men who drafted the Declaration of Independence and the United States Constitution with its Bill of Rights would have agreed to such restrictions?

And yet 17 states have found it necessary to pass "Right to Work" laws protecting a man's right to earn a living without joining any organization. It would seem that a man already had the Constitutionl right to "join or not to join" without specific legislation to that effect, but apparently that is not true under present-day closed-shop agreements.

Additional states are considering "Right to Work" legislation pending consideration of a Constitutional Amendment guaranteeing the right to work free of any restrictions.

Labor union spokesmen have announced they are going to use all their powers to repeal existing "Right to Work" laws and prevent the passage of any additional ones.

If we are to remain a free country it is difficult to see on what logical grounds they will base their opposition, aside from pure self interest. It is altogether possible that public respect for unions will decline as a result of their opposition to the fundamental principle of the "Right to Work." Long ago outraged public opinion led to the passage of laws forbidding employers to blacklist union members. The current practice which a man must join a union or go jobless is equally indefensible.
