A LONG WAIT

We Americans assume that retail stores will have whatever we want whenever we want itand priced at a figure that reflects the potent force of free competition. Our superb mass distribution system has been a major factor in boosting our living standards.

Things are very different, however, in those countries where private enterprise has been outlawed, along with anything resembling competition as we know it.

In August, 1953, Russia's ex-premier, Malenkov, announced that the government was "now fully in a position to increase the production of consumer goods." This was great news to the Russian people, who had been living at subistence standards.

Some 18 months later the program was still a flat failure. A United Press correspondent reported, "The Russian people are going to have to keep on waiting for those things the Soviet government promised them."

Now, it appears, that waiting period will be prolonged indeed. The new Premier, Bulganin, who followed the ousted Malenkov, has denounced the emphasis on consumer industry in strong terms, and declared that everything must be given to expansion of heavy industry.

Thus, it goes, when the state bosses everything. Maybe we should stop taking free enterprise and its abundance—as exemplified by retailing—for granted. Maybe we should think more about the system that makes it possible.

INDUSTRY SUPPORTS EDUCATION

Colleges and universities are depending more and more on private industries for their support and industry in the United States is responding. Industrial leaders recognize not only the importance of technical education but also the importance of all-around liberal arts education which will give young men and young women a better understanding of the relationship of the individual, industry and government in a free society.

One of the most recent examples of financial aid to higher education in the United States and Canada is the contribution of \$324,740 by the Socony Vacuum Oil Company for this year for some 200 scholarships and grants. Other gifts of money totaling many millions of dollars are being made annually by American corporations in order to provide a progressive and independent educational system.
