THE CHANCES WE TAKE

Bill Vukovich, twice victorious in the 500-mile race at Indianapolis, died in a tragic accident on Memoral Day weekend trying for an unprecedented third win in a row.

The news of Vukovich's fatal crash on the speedway filled radio listeners with horror. They mourned a popular hero.

Several hours later came the news of 368 deaths in other fatal auto crashes on the highway. But the absence of drama in these accidents-and the anonymity of the victims-produced no comparable sense of loss to the nation as a whole.

Bill Vukovich took a calculated risk when he stepped into his high speed car. He was an expert driver and he knew the odds.

You and I might say he was foolish to take such chances. But just what chances did he take, as compared to those many so-called "pleasure" drivers take?

First, he was a fine driver. He had passed a rigorous examination of his skill and his physical condition before he was allowed on the track. His reflexes and coordination probably were far above

His car was tuned like a fine watch. Every mechanical part had been checked and rechecked. He would have changed tires twice had he finished the race.

The car was reinforced with rollover bars. He wore a crash helmet and safety belt.

His fellow drivers also were experts. They were all going one way. There was no cross traffic, no pedestrians, no narrow bridges, no turns, hills, no blinding lights and countless other hazards met in almost every mile of ordinary roadway.

And a glancing crash into a retaining wall at 120 m.p.h. does not develop the lethal force that a head-on collision does of two cars traveling 60.

How many highway drivers know as well as Vukovich did the hazards they may encounter? How many are as well equipped to cope with them?

So when you drive your car on the Fourth of July, think of Vukovich-not as a fast driver, but as a man who knew what he was up against and took calculated risks. Make sure you know what you are up against on the highway this weekend-and drive accordingly.

Before long, if plans go through, 10 Soviet farm experts will visit Iowa and take a searching look at American farming methods. Russia has always had a food problem, and periodically she has suffered widespread famine. The head of the Communist Party is determined to do something drastic about it, and he clearly is convinced that at least a partial answer can be found in the U.S. -home of decadent capitalism. He is especially interested in what is known as a "corn-hog-economy." Under it, farmers raise big quantities of corn and use it to fatten hogs for market.

In an editorial on this development the Portland Oregonian observed: "The Soviet experts, if they are honest, will report back to the Kremlin after their Iowa visit that corn must be grown in a suitable climate, that farmers will produce it in corn-belt quantities not by compulsion but with possible profit in view and with a right to determine whether it shall be corn or hogs this year. That is a free economy and capitalism, of course, and aynone who would suggest it in Moscow would be a dirty birdski. The experts may as well stay home.

If they do come they will certainly get some surprises. For example, it might profit them to survey the great American livestock industrymeat of all kinds being one of Russia's chronic shortages. They will find that the livestock producers, even in times of severe price declines, have refused to ask for government subsidies or supports and have chosen to take their own chances and keep their independence. These producers, in other words, believe in freedom and they aren't afraid of risk. That will pose a really tough problem to the masters in the Kremlin.
