Alvis Ressell, Knox County farmer, tells of his experience growing guar in the June issue of The Progressive Farmer Mag-

In a 48-acre field, Ressell stripped four rows of guar and four rows of grain sorghum across the field. He harvested 8,788 pounds of guar that brought \$3.40 per hundred on the market, and 7,000 pounds of maize that brought \$2 per hundred. His difference in income from the two crops was \$158.79

TOWARD WIDER FARM MARKETS

An editorial in the May issue of Better Farming observes: "The greatest need of farming is . Where are the wider for more markets. markets to be found? Farmers, who have seen the tremendous gains in production caused by research, ask why a comparable emphasis has not been put on research to develop new uses and markets for farm products. This kind of research hasn't got much attention and, judging by U. S. Department of Agriculture appropriations, it isn't going to soon."

Then the magazine describes a different approach, which has been proposed by the head of one of the leading private research institutions. It lies in providing industry with the necessary incentives-such as tax concessions, rapid amortization of capital investment, and depletion allowances-to undertake the job of developing new uses and wider markets for farm products, particularly those in surplus.

There certainly seems to be much merit in this idea. Beyond doubt, research could greatly broaden the farm market as a whole, and make a big contribution to the solution of the ever-growing. ever-more-costly surplus problem. To quote Better Farming once more, "The packing industry, with 140 different by-products from the livestock it buys, has demonstrated what can be done by research." It is almost literally true that, in the packing process, nothing is wasted. Practically everything goes for some useful purpose, and the by-products range from fertilizers to medicines. And the consumer is also a major beneficiary here—for the revenue the by-products bring the packers makes it possible to substantially reduce the cost of the meat itself.

CAMEL IN THE TENT

For 17 years retail and certain service businesses have been exempt from the federal minimum wage law. Now it is proposed that the law be extended to those businesses which operate units in more than one state.

If that is approved, certain things will inevitably happen. First, it will be only a matter of of the businesses, including even the smaller ones-once the camel gets his nose in the tent. his whole body will eventually follow. Secondly unskilled, marginal workers will find fewer and fewer jobs open to them-for retailers and others, operating in intensely competitive fields, will be forced to pare their payrolls to the utmost. More important still-government will have taken another long step in controlling our
