THE ECONOMICS OF MEDICAL CARE

Much has been heard about the cost of medical care. No doubt some people believe this cost is out of all reason, and absorbs an excessive percentage of our incomes.

In search of the truth, the American Medical Association conducted an exhaustive study of the economics of medical care over the last quarter century. The facts produced are noteworthy. In 1930 a fraction less than four per cent of personal consumer expenditures went for medical care. This proportion remained fairly constant for years. Since World War II, however, it has risen -to about 4.35 per cent. And the main reason for that is the tremendous postwar upswing in the birth rate. The increased number of babies and young children has affected not only hospital and obstetric expenditures, but has increased the demand for other medical services, since the youngest age group normally requires the most frequent medical attention.

The U.S. Bureau of Labor provides some important evidence. The Bureau's consumer price index was at 191.9 in 1954. But the index for medical care and drug prices was well under that level-173.9. And the item indexes for physicians' and dentists' fees were 160.3 and 174.5 respectively.

The AMA also reports that, over the 25-year period, the average income of physicians rose at almost exactly the same rate as the avearge earnings of wage and salary workers.

All in all, the situation justifies this AMA statement: "The various providers of services and commodities in the medical care 'industry' can well be proud of a quarter century record that included great medical advances. . , while little change occurred in the industry's relative economic position. Possibly this is our most efficient industry!"

Every company knows that the only way to win or keep business is to continually offer you new, improved products at the lowest possible price.'

Mr. Kettering also pointed out that by every measure of performance and economy today's gas is 50 per cent better than the gas of the 20'swhich means that two gallons now do the work that used to require three. Yet the current price of gas is just about the same as the 1925 priceonly the taxes are higher.

What is true of gasoline, of course, is true of all other oil products. And competition does more than improve quality, important as that is. It is one of the spurs that keeps men searching for oil and taking the long chances involved, in the hope of hitting a big strike. The oilmen's creed of action could be pretty well expressed in a phrase: "Get there ahead of the other fellowand do a better job than the other fellow.'

"WITHOUT DUE PROCESS OF LAW"

Modern street lighting is a pow-erful force for safety after dark, according to reports from cities throughout the nation to the Na-tional Street and Traffic Safety lighting Pure Lighting Bureau. For example: . In Dayton, O., service and buildings director George F. Baker said, "A lighted city is a live city." Last year, when Dayton's extensive street lighting modernization program was nearly complete, traffic deaths during the hours of darkness dropped 41 per cent.

· Police Chief Frank Evans of Peoria, Ill., reports, "Crime defi-nitely is down in Peoria. There are no shadows for the criminal to hide in with the modern lighting system. There's no doubt of its effectiveness."

· Total traffic accidents in six Connecticut communities, after mod-ern relighting of streets, dropped from 253 to 192, in-stances of property damage fell from 203 to 163, and the cost of these accidents declined from \$106,000 to \$46,000. From El Paso, Tex., Police Chief Risinger declares, "We don't need statistical evidence to show the value of street lighting on the south side. You drive the holdup men and the assaulters off the street as soon as you light them.

• Police Chief Roland B. Kelley of Fort Lauderdale, Florida, be-lieves modern new street light-ing will reduce traffic accidents to a minimum. Relighting the main traffic artery through town reduced accidents on that street more than 50 per cent!






