Odd Bits Salvaged

Too many of us pray too little. To many of us do not pray at all.

But most of us got our ire up over the Supreme Court's decision knocking out the New York prayer in public schools. Many have commented on the matter in daily papers, and preachers have brought out the ruling in sermons from the pulpit.

We, like many others, probably formed an opinion without analyzing the matter. And that's what Dr. E. S. James, outspoken editor of the Baptist Standard, pointed out editorially recently, which we were glad to see.

"As we interpret them (the court's decision)," he said, "it has made no effort to oppose religion in school life. It has simply ruled that prescribed and controlled religion shall not be forced upon students by the power of the government."

The prayer, we understand, upon which the decision was based was that composed by Regents of New York State to be recited daily in the public schools.

"The decision," Dr. James said, "was made on the fact that it was a prayer composed by one government agency to be recited by another and contrary to the government's Constitution."

"If it may be legal to have volunteer prayers in the public schools, then many of them be offered every day; but there is no place in American life for prayers formulated by the government."

Concluding his editorial, he said: "Some branch of the government already controls just about everything we do. It is encouraging to know that American citizens will, at least, be left free to compose their own prayers and offer them when and where they choose."

If that's the way the wind blows, then we're inclined to agree with Dr. James. No agency, governmental or not, has the right to control a Democratic people in prayer, be it private or public prayer.

It seems this was tried in Biblical days—but Daniel continue to pray after being placed in the lions' den, and the three Hebrews continued to pray after being placed in the fiery furnace. Prayer can not be stopped, or controlled!

So, whether he's right or wrong, we're inclined to agree with Dr. James. The Government, through its Supreme Court, is not trying to stop our praying in the public schools, but merely telling us that the Government can not tell us how to pray.


## Masonic Lodge Installs Officers

## FREEDOM 7 MERCURY SPACECRAFT TO VISIT CITY FOR SAVINGS BONDS



A Mercury 7 Spacecraft, duplicate of Freedom 7, Liberty Bell 7, and Friendship 7 that carried our astronauts in their sub-orbital and orbital flights, will soon be displayed here. Its arrival will call attention to the Treasury's Freedom Bond Drive during May and June and help stimulate the sale of Savings Bonds. The Capsule is mounted in the manner shown above. Retractable steps will permit individuals to examine the Capsule, its cockpit and instrumentation panel, and the escape tower. ## Notes From Knox Farms, Ranches

### Cotton Insect Meetings

There will be three field cotton insect meetings held in Knox County on Friday, July 6. The first meeting will be held on the Claud Reed farm, two miles east of Knox City, at 10 a.m. The second meeting will be held at 1 p.m. on the John E. Nelson farm one mile west of Munday. The third meeting will be on the Johny Elkins farm east of Vera on south of highway 82, at 3:00 p.m. Farm Road No. 266, one mile.

The meetings will be conducted by John Thomas, Area Entomologist, with the Extension Service, from Lubbock. Mr. Thomas will discuss all cotton insects and give the latest recommended control of these insects. The field meetings will show the methods for making insect counts and will discuss the factors that will determine when a control program is recommended.

### Wheat Fertilization

There was an increased number of Knox County farmers and ranchers who fertilized their wheat this year. Many of whom have stated that they received more wheat yield, and more than paid for fertilizer used. Some farmers are already sending in soil samples on their wheat land in preparation for another wheat crop. Now is a good time to collect soil samples from the small grain fields that will be planted this fall, because at the present time the soil labs are not over-run with samples, and can get an analysis returned to the farmers more promptly.

Soil sample bags and information sheets are available at the following locations in Knox County: Gilliland, Gilliland Gin; Munday, First National Bank; Knox City, Citizens State Bank; and in Benjamin, at the County Agents Office.

## Bond Sales Now At High Figure

W. E. Braly, Chairman of Knox County Savings Bonds Committee, announced recently that the county's May bond sales totaled \$10,418. Sales during the first five months of 1962 totaled \$142,200 which represents 71.1% of the 1962 Bond sales goal.

Savings Bonds sales in Texas in May were \$11,496,167 and \$64,736,607 in bonds were purchased during the period January through May. 83.6% of the Texas' Freedom Bond Drive goal of \$75,000,000 has been achieved.

"The total amount of E and H Bonds outstanding has reached \$44.8 billion. This is the highest amount of E and H Bonds on record. During the first four months of 1962, the amount of Savings Bonds outstanding had a net gain of \$353 million. As a result of the Freedom Bond Drive, the Treasury Department is confident that the amount of E and H Bonds outstanding will go even higher," Chairman Braly said.

of the county that was very deficient for soil moisture last spring, and obtained outstanding results from the application of fertilizer. The League Ranch fertilized one block of wheat, and did not fertilize another. With the application of 40 pounds of nitrogen per acre, the yield was increased from 6.5 bushels to 12 bushels per acre. Mr. Idol stated that there was about twice the amount of grazing on the fertilized wheat and that the cattle in their grazing habits showed a preference to that wheat that had been fertilized to that which had not.

#### Potato Variety Tests

There were two Irish potato variety tests conducted in Knox County this last year. One of the tests was conducted on the Jack Tidwell farm East of Munday, and consisted of 151 varieties of potatoes planted in 5, 10, 20 and 75 hill plots. There were harvested June 21-22, with the help of Dr. John Larsen, Extension vegetable specialist, and Virgil Woolfin, Horticulturist with the

### Experiment Station at Iowa Park

Some of the vegetable committee present at the harvest stated this year had given the most satisfying results. There were 13 varieties that were worthy of re-testing and 40 varieties that need a larger test per variety next year.

The second demonstration was conducted on the H. H. Partridge farm west of Munday, with four varieties in it. This demonstration was of varieties that looked well in the plots tested last year, and the year before. The varieties in this demonstration yield at the following field weights; Catoosa, 10815 lbs. per acre; Early Red 21039 lbs. per acre; Early Gem, 7192 lbs. per acre; and F-29-1, 8073 lbs. per acre.

### Landlords May Get Social Security On Farm Earnings

A recent change in the social security law has made hundreds of farm landlords eligible for benefits although they do not materially participate in the actual operation of their farms.

Under this new provision, a farm landlord may get social security credit for his net income from a farm he owns even if his participation in the operation of the farm is through an agent or an employee.

Formerly, a farm landlord had to take a personal part in the actual operation or management of the farm in order to have his income from the farm count for social security.

Your Wichita Falls social security district office will be glad to answer any questions you might have about the recent change in the law.
