Hurt, of the Bellevue Boulevard Baptist church, Memphis, over remarks which Stewart says he made to Rev. E. W. Reese of the Lenox Baptist church, Memphis, regarding the New Albany church.

Following religious services at the New Albany Baptist church on Sunday, July 28, a business meeting was called to elect messengers to the Chickasaw association, of which the congregation is a member.

It is said that Rev. Stewart, sitting

It is said that Rev. Stewart, sitting near the front, attempted to speak to a motion but was declared out of order by the pastor, Rev. E. L. Wesson, and ordered to sit down. When he refused to do so, a motion to adjourn was made and the meeting broke up. It is alleged that after this Stewart invited the pastor, Rev. Wesson, outside to settle the matter. One of the deacons swore out a warrant for Stewart. Rev. Stewart is an "anti-board" Baptist, being strongly opposed to conducting the affairs of the church through the medium of boards of deacons and trustees. The church at New Albany is conducted on the "board" plan. This is said to have been at the hottom of the trouble between Rev. Wesson and Stewart.

Rev. Wesson formerly was pastor of churches at Sardis and Coldwater, Miss., and was editor of the Expositor and Advocate, a Baptist joilrnal published at Memphis.



PUBLIC HEALTH.

Dr. S. T. Fraser, County Health officer, showed us a copy of rules and regulations relating to the disinfection and sanitation of public buildings, etc, issued by W. M. Brumby. State Health Officer. The rules are too lengthy for publication in The Star, and we suggest that school trustees, hotel and restuarant keepers, butchers, church officials send for a copy of these regulations. The law becomes effective Sept. 1st, and these rules are issued in conformity with the law. The fine for officer, showed us a copy of rules formity with the law. The fine for failing or refusing to comply with the Rules and Regulations published by the State Health officer for the proper sanitation and disenfection of public buildings of any kind, includ-ing churches and school buildings, is not less than \$50. nor more than \$200. tor each offense. The law is a good one, though it will entail some expense and hardship to comto the letter. Some school srustees, we fear, will be about the first to run afoul of this law, and as one of patronage.

Every school house should be thoroughly scrubbed and cleaned, floors, walls, ceilings, doors, and window frames, and disinfected before school opens. 





STATE TO BE SUPREME

American Bar Association Addressed By

HON. ALTON B. PARKER

Former New York Jurist, Who Is the President of the Organization, In Hi Annual Report Touches Upon Duties of Legislators.

Portland, Me., Aug. 27 .- The thireth annual meeting of the American Bar association is in session here President Alton B. Parker presides He delivered the annual address after the usual preliminaries.

Judge Parker touched upon various matters of importance to the legal fraternity. In speaking of legislators New Yorker said they should strive to ascertain the growing but imperfect customs which spring from the effort of the people to correct errors, and give to them the dignity and honor of law.

"The fathers who framed our con stitution, as well as those of the ori ginal thirteen states, had a whole some fear of arbitrary power. They sought to limit governmental power

by law, the source of which should be the people—the states to be supreme is to all matters, and to exercise all powers except those specifically granted to the national government, the constitution of each state to be supreme law and capable of amendment only by its people."

Concluding, Judge Parker said:

"You cannot move legislators crazed with ambition. But the people can, and will do so when they fully understand the situation. And we need never fear they will not understand it fifter a time. But the people should be informed now. Do not forget, however, that if you attempt it, you will be denounced by the demagogue and vartooned by the yellow press, a fate which has come to the few who have appealed to reason and to justice. These tactics have enforced silence spon many whose hearts have prompted them to point out the danger of pon many whose hearts have prompted them to point out the danger of them to point out the danger of the power ment by passion. But they cannot keep silent the earnest lawyers of this country for a minute after they have determined that duty calls them to speak out. God grant that the hour of that determination is at hand."
