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**THE PEOPLE'S CHANCE.**

During recent years there has been a general feeling that members of the Railroad Commission of Texas were not in sympathy with the people, especially in this true with reference to rate cases that have been carried to the commission by various municipalities in Texas, seeking a reduction in public utility rates.

With a full knowledge of conditions Governor Sterling, without hesitation, selected Ernest O. Thompson of Amarillo as a member of that important body, when the resignation of Pat M. Neff was presented to him, and in the selection of Col. Thompson the governor made an appointment that met with the approval of every municipal official who had been interested in securing a reduction in public utility rates, and to our way of thinking the people should vote on August 27th to retain Col. Thompson in that important and responsible position.

As Mayor of Amarillo Col. Thompson demonstrated his determination to bring about a readjustment of public utility rates to conform with present conditions. He, after pleading with the gas company serving gas to Amarillo, for lower gas rates, began the piping of gas from nearby fields and the installation of a local municipal distribution system, and where the gas company discovered that he was in dead earnest and was not making a political play, came to terms, and is selling gas to citizens of Amarillo today at about half the former rate. He then went after the telephone company and secured a reduction in telephone rates for the citizens of Amarillo, and in various other ways he demonstrated his sympathies for the citizenship, however, he always expressed a willingness to abide by the high rates charged if they could be justified.

The people now have an opportunity to retain such a man as a member of the Texas Railroad Commission—the one and only rate-making body in Texas, and if we fail to select a man of this type at this time, then we certainly should not complain in the future.

And let us call attention to the far-reaching authority vested in this body. It regulates railroad rates and thereby directly affects the price of all farm commodities. It regulates utility rates, and thereby determines just what price citizens of the towns and cities of Texas shall pay for gas, electric current and other necessities purchased from public service concerns.

It is the one governing body between the people and the corporations, and too much care cannot be exercised in selecting its personnel.

**A Brother's Heroic Example.**

Recent months have not been a good time for people who like to keep a strong faith in human nature. There has been a good deal of news of stupidity, venality and perversity in high places—almost enough to convince one that the race is a pretty shabby affair. But now and then there will be a little story about some utterly unknown, perfectly ordinary individual that will turn the tide; a story that helps to restore one's belief that mankind is, after all, capable of every great and noble thing.

Such a story got into the papers the other day from Cannon City, Colo.

Tom and George Embleton, brothers, were digging a well, assisted by their father. They got the well shaft 60 feet deep, and then George was lowered to the bottom in a bucket to set off a dynamite blast. He lit the fuse and ordered them to hoist him out. They began to do so—and the rope broke. George fell to the bottom, knocked unconscious, and lay right on top of a charge of dynamite that was certain to explode very shortly.

The two men at the top would have been amply justified in staying there, waiting in frozen horror for the tragedy. But Tom, without hesitation, got into the bucket and ordered his father to lower him into the well—into the well where his explosive was due to go off in a few seconds.

Unfortunately, he was not able to save his brother. The dynamite went off when Tom was only half way down the shaft. He went to the bottom, picked up his brother's broken body and brought it to the surface, but it was too late. George was fatally injured.

But you will go a long way before you find a finer example of real bravery than Tom displayed.

**THE COMMERCIAL USE OF TEXAS HIGHWAYS IS A PRIVILEGE, NOT A RIGHT**

The highways of Texas are the property of its citizens. They constitute a system of nearly 200,000 miles of road of which 20,000 miles are designated as State highways and the remainder are county roads. All types of road are represented in this system, less than 5% have so-called "permanent" surface.

The total cost of these highways is unknown but it amounts to many hundred million dollars. From 1917 to 1930, inclusive, counties and road districts of the State issued \$243,592,834 in bonds for the construction and improvement of roads and bridges. In the two-year period ending August 31, 1930, the State Highway Commission expended \$89,032,825, of which \$22,488,426 was for maintenance of the State highways.

In view of these tremendous costs the preservation of our highways from rapid wear and destruction is a matter of very vital interest to their owners, viz., the public. It is especially important that they be made to outlast the life of the bonds, which run from 20 to 30 years.

The use of the public highways for commercial purposes is not a right but a privilege which may be withheld or granted subject to such restrictions, regulations and charges as the Legislature may see fit to impose. Such regulations are intended to promote safety, preserve the highways and safeguard the interests of the public.

Texas Railroads, which pay the entire cost of construction and maintenance of their own roadbeds and, in addition, make substantial contributions to the cost of Texas highways, are thoroughly regulated with respect to their services, rates, methods and practices. There is no good reason why commercial users of the highways, built and maintained at the expense of the public, should not likewise be regulated to such extent as the public interest requires and pay such charges as will represent proper compensation for the privileges granted them.

The statutes governing highway transportation as enacted by the Forty-second Legislature represent the wishes of the citizens of this State and express their desire to give equal rights to all and special privileges to none. These statutes should be given a fair trial and their value ascertained. Unless this is done, a chaotic condition in transportation as a whole will surely ensue.

H. J. R. No. 26.  
PROPOSING A CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON NOVEMBER 8, 1932.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto Section 3a, which shall read as follows:

"Sec. 3a. When an election is held by any county, or any number of counties, or any political sub-division of the State, or any political sub-division of a county, or any defined district now or hereafter to be described and defined within the State and which may or may not include towns, villages or municipal corporations, or any city, town or village, for the purpose of issuing bonds or otherwise lending credit, or expanding money or assuming any debt, only qualified electors who own taxable property in the State, county, political sub-division, district, city, town or village where such election is held, and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be qualified to vote and all electors shall vote in the election precinct of their residence.

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitution-

al amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1932. (A correct copy.)

PROPOSING A CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON NOVEMBER 8, 1932.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 55, Article 3, of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 55. The Legislature shall have no power to release or extinguish, in whole or in part, the indebtedness, liability or obligation of any corporation or individual, to this State or any county or defined subdivision thereof, or other municipal corporation therein, except delinquent taxes which have been due for a period of at least ten years."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the electors of this State qualified to vote on Constitutional Amendments at the General Election in 1932. (A correct copy.)

Ross Sisters Introduce Cubist Harmonies

New York City—Is the public ready for a futuristic interpretation of harmonies? PROPOSING A CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON NOVEMBER 8, 1932.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 14 of Article 8 of the Constitution of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 14. There shall be elected

by the qualified electors of each county at the same time and under the same law regulating the election of State and County officers, as Assessor and Collector of Taxes, who shall hold his office, for two (2) years and until his successor is elected and qualified; and such Assessor and Collector of Taxes shall perform all the duties with respect to assessing property for the purpose of taxation and of collecting taxes as may be prescribed by the Legislature."

Sec. 2. That Section 16, of Article 8, of the Constitution of Texas be so amended as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 16. The sheriff of each county in addition to his other duties shall be the Assessor and Collector of Taxes therefor; but, in counties having ten thousand (10,000) or more inhabitants, to be determined by the last preceding census of the United States, an Assessor and Collector of Taxes shall be elected to hold office for two (2) years and until his successor shall be elected and qualified."

Sec. 3. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the State on the next general election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1932. (A correct copy.)

## PROPOSING A CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON NOVEMBER 5, 1932.

Section 1. That Section 15 of article 8 of the Constitution of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Sec. 15. Provision shall be made by the first Legislature for the speedy sale, without the necessity of a suit in Court, of a sufficient portion of all lands and other property for the taxes due thereon, and every year thereafter for the said in like manner of all lands and other property upon which the taxes have not been paid; and the deed of conveyance to the purchaser for all lands and other property thus sold shall be held to vest a good and perfect title to be inchoate only for actual fraud; provided, that the former owner shall within two years from date of the filing for record of the Purchaser's Deed have the right to redeem the land on the following basis:

(1) Within the first year of the redemption period upon the payment of the amount of money paid for the land, including One (\$1.00) Dollar Tax Deed Recording Fee and all taxes, penalties, interest and costs paid plus not exceeding twenty-five (25%) per cent of the aggregate total;

(2) Within the last year of the redemption period upon the payment of the amount of money paid for the land, including One (\$1.00) Dollar Tax Deed Recording Fee and all taxes, penalties, interest and costs paid plus not exceeding fifty (50%) per cent of the aggregate total."

Sec. 2. That the foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1932.
