The Pilgrims included cheese in the ship's supplies when they made their famous voyage. And so, in America, cheese has always been with us and we eat more and more of it.

Probably the cheese most homemakers know best is Cheddar or American. This was the first great product of American cheese makers. Now however, many of the European cheeses are made in America and with complete success. Cheese counters offer a great variety at popular prices Store cheese in the refrigerator, Soft, unripened cheeses, such as cottage and cream, are quite pershable, so buy only the amoun to use in a short time. Unpack aged cheese should be tightly wrapped in waxed paper, foil or plastic film before refrigerating, Store packaged cheeses in their containers. Mold, which may de develop on natural cheese, is not harmful. Cut off the mold and the cheese is ready for use.

Do not store cheese in a freezer Freezing damages the character istic texture of most cheeses. Camembert and Liederkranz are ex ptions and may be frozen for several months but serve them promptly after thawing.

Recipe -of-the-Week

Quick Cheese Bread: Sift together 2 cups sifted flour, 4 teaspoons baking powder and 1/2 teaspoon salt. Add and mix well 1 cup grated American cheese. Combine 2 beaten eggs and 1 cup milk. Add slowly to flour-cheese mixture mixing only enough to blend ingredients. Fold in ¼ cup melted butter or margarine. Board." This Board, if created, would have authority to issue and sell general obligation bonds of the State of Texas in an amount not to exceed \$100,000,000. If more funds should be required at some later date, the Legislature would be authorized to provide for the issuance and sale of an additional \$100,000,000 in bonds. A twothirds vote of the Legislature would be required for this author ization.

Proceeds from the sale of the bonds could not be expended directly nor given away, but could be loaned to various governmental authorities for certain author ized purposes. Eligible borrowers would include cities, counties, river authorities, conservation and reclamation districts, and interstate compact commissions.

The money could be used to build and extend dams and reservoirs and to finance other measures necessary in preserving and developing water resources and in controlling and storing storm and flood waters. Money could also be loaned for the construction of facilities for transporting water from storage points to distribution points.
