

PROBATE LAWS RECENTLY CHANGED

Easier handling of the estates of deceased persons, and at less cost, will result from laws re cently passed by the Texas Leg-

During its regular session in early 1957, the 55th Legislature enacted a number of amendments to the Texas Probate Code. The changes became effective on Aug

Here are a few of the new pro-

1. Some of the notices issued in probate proceedings may now served by Certified Mail. Formerly the law required service by Registered Mail, which is more expensive.

2. The amount of bond requir ed of an executor or administrator has been reduced under some circumstances. The estate will thereby save on bond premiums. The old law required a bond to be double the value of all personal property in the estate, even if issued by a corporate bonding company. Now a corporate bond need ony match equally the value

of the property. 3. Sometimes it is desired to use a bond signed by individuals tather than a bonding company. he old law required these individuals to own real property worth double the value of the estate. Personal property could not be considered. The new law allows personal property to be used in qualifying as a bond signer. However, the two-for-one requirement is retained on this



A public hearing soon to be held in Memphis, Tenn., will decide whether to impose trade restrictions requiring inspection and controls on nursery products in areas where fire ants are present or suspected.

The imports, detected by the mounds they build and the painful bites they inflict, are known to exist in six extreme southeastern Texas counties in an area ranging from the Louisiana border to Houston. A survey is now underway in adjoining counties to determine to what degree the ant has moved westward into the

Other states known to be infested include Florida, Georgia, Louisiana, Mississippi, North Carolina, South Carolina and

The most significant quarantine proposal up for consideration at the Memphis meeting is a requirement for treatment by approved methods of all nurseries found infested in any degree. Such treatment would have to be followed by a 30-day waiting period during which no shipment

Asian influenza vaccine is now so plentiful that doctors and druggists can obtain it at will in almost any quantity, exactly as they obtain any other drug

This means that you can now be vaccinated at your own discretion, regardless of your age, job, or physical condition.

In the early days of the influenza epidemic, vaccine was so scarce - even though six drug manufacturers were commission ed to produce it and worked 24hour shifts at the task - that available supplies had to be distributed to states according to population, with populous states

Today, however, reports coming from state health departments and from manufacturers indicate that supplies are catching up with demand, so that controls on allocations to states are
