Notes From Knox Farms, Ranches

Farmers and ranchers in Knox County in general are happy over the rain that they had this last week. The rain was general and most of the county received 3.7 inches and better. Ranchers report that most of the water soaked in and very little water was caught in the tanks and lakes. There was a lot of sweet corn and grain sorghum in the county that received the moisture at the exact time to boost yields. Dry land cotton that was planted early was in critical need of water and was beginning to throw off. The rains will delay the throwing off and allow a more desirable fruiting and gives the hope of a larger yield. The potato growers in the Munday area that did not have all of their potatoes out of the ground lost a lot of the potatoes that were not harvested; however most of the potato crop was out and not all of the remaining crop was lost.

The program will get underway with an election of officers and general assembly.
