

# Six Accidents **Investigated** In **County In August**

The Highway Patrol investigated 6 rural accidents in Knox County during the month of August, according to Sergeant F. P. Jircik, Patrol Supervisor of this area

These wrecks have accounted for no persons killed, 2 injured, and a property damage of \$1,865. This brings the total for the year in this county to 1 person killed, 7 injured, and a property damage of \$22.745.

Prior to the first of this month there had been a total of 1,088 fatal accidents in Texas. These tragedies resulted in 1.342 persons losing their lives.

### "NEITHER NEED NOR JUSTIFICATION"

For a long period of time the Post Office Department has been moving a limited amount of 4-cent mail by air between certain metropolitan points, on a "space available" basis. Recently it was proposed that this practice be substantially extended.

This brought a prompt response from the House Committee which has charge of Post Office matters It held, without qualification, that the Postmaster General does not have the authority to transport first - class mail by air. In other words, that cannot legally be done without specific Con-gressional authorizatin.

Then, going beyond the legal aspects, Representative Kathryn Granahan of the Committee made these important objections: "We oppose the transportation by air of first-lass 4-cent letter mail because it must tend to dilute the stability of the airmail structure. It is highly significant that airmail volume has been declining sharply since the airlift experiment was begun in 1953. The decline in 7-cent airmail pleces in the fiscal year 1960 alone is expected to be about 20 per cent of the Putting it another way, we spent \$260,37 for each Central and Southwest Texas has total volume of such mail.

"According to the weight of evidence, there is neither need nor justification for the airlift of 4-cent letter mail It is a good deal costlier than surface transportation with en route distribution There is no proof that it speeds delivery. Is there a teacher shortage? If so, it's hard to pin down. There are 47.6 per cent more teachers now than in the 1849-50 period. The number of pupils has increased too, of course, but to a lesser legree — 14.9 per cent.

Have the teachers' salaries lagged seriously behind? It doesn't look that way. In the last 11 years these salaries have increased by 99.8 per cent - almost doubled - while the cost of living has increased by only 23.6 per cent, according to the government's Consumer Price Index.

Has the public been niggardly in its spending on schools? Again it doesn't look that way. This spending increased from \$5.8 billion in 1949-50 to \$15.5 billion in 1959-60 - a jump of 167.9 per cent. livestock auction markets in East. pupil in 1949-50; now we spend \$481.48.





## LAW REQUIRES STOP FOR SCHOOL BUSES

Thousands of school children are now trouping back to school throughout Texas. Many of them will be transported by school buses. Most people are careful when approaching a school bus which may be standing beside the road or school to pick up school children or allow them to alight. However, we have already had some very bad accidents this year because a child or a motorst, or both, were careless at that very time.


Most Texans are aware of the aw which requires a driver to owne to a complete stop when overtaking from the rear a school bus which has stopped to receive discharge school children After stopping immediately be hind the bus, he is then allowed by law to proceed past same at a speed "which is prudent, not exceeding ten (10) miles per hour, and with due caution for the safev of such children."

What many persons do not realize is that the very same rules pplies when MEETING a stopped chool bus. While everyone is in terested in protecting our child ren, unthinking violators of this simple safety rule greatly out number those who comply. Failure to follow the law in this case an lead to fines up to \$200.00 even when no accidents occurs Following an accident in which some child is injured or killed. the penalities are naturally much more serie

Although the above rule does not always apply when passing a stopped school bus in a business or residential district of a town, the necessity for extreme caution even in those locations is obvious When it comes to overtaking and passing moving vehicles, exercise of ordinary common serse will generally keep a driver with in the law. For instance, when passing a car it is only common sense to proceed on past it a safe distance before cutting back to the right side of the highway. Also, any driver would realize the danger of increasing his speed while another is attempting to, pass him.

In the same category is the prohibition against passing on the right under most ordinary conditions. Of course, you may legally pass on the right in a few specific instances, such as when the vehicle overtaken is making or
