The term "reverend" is used only once in all of God's word, and then it is used in reference to God! "Holy and reverend is his (God's) name." (Psm. 111:9). The New Century Dic tionay defines the term reverend as: "Worthy to be revered, or entitled to reverence.' No man, myself included, 'worthy to be revered." or is "entitled to reverence." It is my conviction that the use of the term "reverend" exhbits the "minister" to a position authorized in God's word. No inspired writer used the term,

It is my conviction that some scriptures for authority for its use Peter referred to the apostle Paul simply os "our beloved brother." (IIPeter 3:15).

> In the first few verses of the twenty-third chapter of the gospel of Matthew, Jesus describes the hypocritical action of the scribes and the Pharisees in delighting in the praise of men. Men today can be guilty of accepting religious titles which would take men's eyes off the living God. "And call no man your father upon the earth: for one is your Father, which is in heaven." We are to call no man "father" in a religious sense for in so doing we regard him as an authoriitative teacher.

The white-winged dove nest ng area of northeastern Mexico is very dry, although there appears to be a normal population of doves, according to a recent pueliminary tour made by biologists who went from the border to Tampico.

Four men, including two Tex as biologists, one from Mexico and one from the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, spent considerable time in Mexico checking nest ing conditions. They reported drought conditions over most of the area, with little rain having been received since last Decem-




