

Here are the requirements which cotton farmers must meet in 1961 in order fully to protect their future farm allotments: The farmer must (1) plant at least 75 per cent of the 1961 allotment, or (2) release at least 75 per cent County Committee by April 14, 1961, deadline, or (3) plant and release a total acreage which is the 1961 cotton allotment, and (4) actualy plant some cotton in 1961 if the entire allotment was released in both 1959 and 1960.
