TYPHOID FEVER

October—the month of typhoid fever—Unless extraordinary precautions are taken immediately many cases and deaths from this disease will occur.

It is often a common belief that typhoid fever comes from decaying animal or vegetable matter, or from damp basements, cows and pigs or other animals. However, this is a false theory. Typhoid fever only comes from human beings who are suffering with the disease, convalescents, or those who have had typhoid fever and who continue to carry the germs in their bodies. The last mentioned are called typhoid carriers, and are the cause of the many cases that occur each year.

Naturally all persons do not become typhoid carriers; only about 4 per cent, or one person in about twenty-five cases who recover, remain permanently infected. A typhoid carrier is a healthy individual, shows no outward sign of being a disease carrier, and goes about his regular work unmindful of the fact that he may excrete germs, which may be discovered by laboratory examination.

These little organisms excreted by the carrier become a menace to the human race and may cause any number of cases of typhoid fever without being detected. Here is where the typhoid fly gets in his dirty work by contaminating milk and food with these bodily wastes.

If these body wastes are deposited in an open surface privy they are likely to be washed by rains into wells and other sources of water supply and may be carried by the filthy fly from the surface privy, where millions of flies feed, to our food in the dining room or kitchen.

Unless the typhoid carrier is not extremely careful after every visit to the toilet, the germs may be carried on the hands and thus transferred to the food supplies. If he is employed in a dairy, cafe, or soda fountain, the danger of infecting food products is very great. Here the carrier is not only a menace to his own family but to the entire community.

No typhoid patient should be dismissed from medical observation until two specimens of the patient's bowel discharges have been examined at stated intervals by a competent laboratory and pronounced free from typhoid germs.

Every dairy worker and food handler should be examined before being allowed to follow these trades. While it would be impossible to discover all the typhoid carriers by these requirements, much could be accomplished in reducing typhoid fever in Texas.

In cities and towns where houses are screened against flies and where outside surface privies are not allowed by city ordinances, and where immunization has been most effective typhoid fever is no longer a problem. It is in small towns and rural communities where insanitary conditions prevail, where water supplies are unprotected, and where the surface toilets exist, that typhoid thrives and continues to take its toll each year.

I have carefully read, and re-read, in the last few days, the pledges made by your party to money is easy, even when it is the government's.

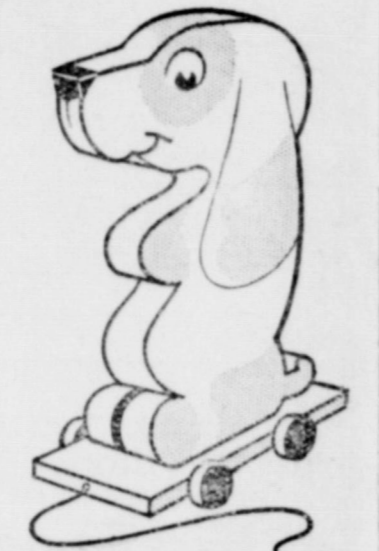

society as a whole, and to the farmers, who as a class, have not in the past received their equitable share of the national income. You being a Quaker, should have an old-fashioned sense of honesty and its application to the position you now hold. This Republic is an estate, handed down by the fathers to be managed and used, not in the interest of any group, but in the interest of the whole people of this country. No individual can assume the responsibility of such management alone, therefore every four years different organizations known as political parties, and organized for the purpose of assuming responsibility of the management of this great estate of ours, submit to the people their proposition, in fact, they propose to enter into a solemn contract with the public for the management of this great estate, and the people of these United States carefully analyze the different contracts—which are party platforms—reject and endorse as their conscience dictates.

These political parties not only write the contract they wish to enter into with the public in the management of its estate, but select and present as the interpreter of said contract their general manager. In 1928, the public, by an overwhelming majority ratified the contract proposed by the Republican party and accepted yourself as the general manager selected to carry out the provisions of said contract.

I shall specifically discuss with you the fulfilling of that part of the contract relating to agriculture. The contract written in Kansas City specifically pledges to the American farmers that the tariff shall be made effective on agricultural products, that agriculture should be placed upon an economic equality with industry, and you, as the general manager, selected and clothed with power as such manager to not only interpret the meaning of the terms of such contract, as expressed in words, but also the spirit of the contract, and in so doing you gave to the platform of your party an interpretation that reached yet farther than was expressed in so many words in the contract.

In your St. Louis speech, you said: "The whole foundation and hope of our nation is the maintained individualism of our people. Farm is, and must continue to be, an individualistic business of small units and independent ownership. The farmer is the outstanding example of the economically free individual. He is one of our solid materials of national character. No solution that moves for consolidation into large farms and

mechanized production can fit into our national hopes and ideals."

Neither of these pledges have been fulfilled, nor has there been any apparent attempt to do so. The tariff on wheat is 42 cents per bushel, which is more than the price the farmer receives. Has the tariff been made effective on wheat?

The Congress of the United States gave you a farm relief bill, such as you desired. You appointed the Board that was supposed to administer the Act as to redeem the pledges contained in the Republican party and the contract entered into between people of the United States. This Board, whether because of lack of ability or inclination so to do, has failed to redeem a single promise contained in the party's contract or by yourself, as general manager. In fact, they have done more to cause dissension between farm organizations and independent

farmers and to destroy real co-operatives than all private opposition to co-operative marketing could have accomplished in a quarter of a century. Every step they have taken has been so apparently a blunder, or worse still, a criminal disregard of the plain provisions of the Act, that this Board, created to stabilize prices, has been the cause of the most erratic market in the history of the nation, with the tendency always downward, until the price level of the farmers' products, as

compared to other things, are the lowest in the history of the country. The pledge made in your speech of acceptance to all of society, that if permitted to continue the pro-

gram of your predecessors, with the help of God you would banish all poverty from the nation, has been no more nearly redeemed. The situation, as exists at present—(Continued on last page)

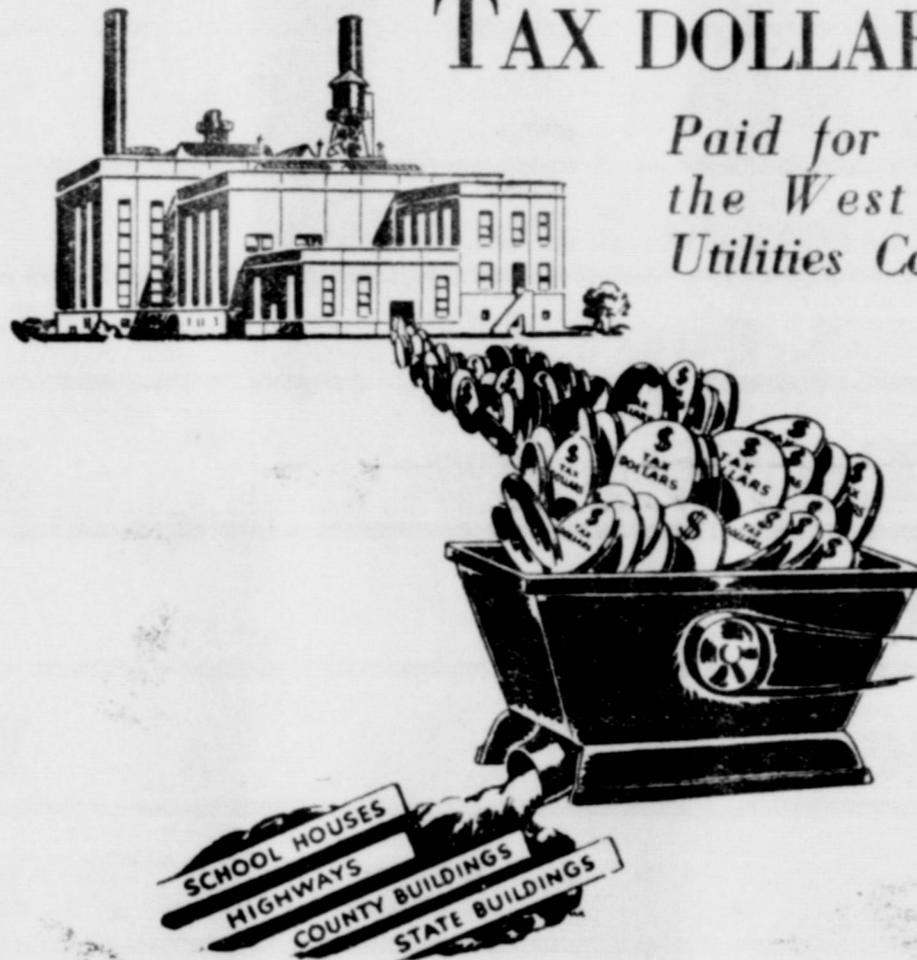

ent, is unthinkable and has never existed in any nation of the world before. An abundance of everything necessary to human happiness, yet the most abject poverty, want and despair.

Your program, so far, instead of fulfilling the pledges of your party, is making honest labor, in whatever capacity they serve, mendicants and tramps. Instead of providing for those who ask only for the privilege of serving society, and to receive an adequate compensation for such service, your wonderful organizing ability has been used in setting up organizations to dispense public and private charities.

Mr. President, you have it in your power to change this picture of distress and desolation, or discouragement and despair, in forty-eight hours. You need only to say to the world that you propose to see to it that a sufficient amount of life blood is injected into the arteries of trade and commerce to relieve the economic depression and it will be done.

The money lords of the nation that have control of the money and credits and are responsible for the present money famine, which has caused this endemic condition of the industrial body, can be made impotent to further persecute and oppress the citizens of this country, if you will have the courage to demand that the money of this nation, hoarded by the money lords, be put to work performing the service for which money is intended. I need not argue this question with you for you know full well that if you should make this demand it would be obeyed, and if in the stubborn determination those who are today destroying the principle of our nation by monopolizing the currency, should refuse so just a demand, you have the power to convene Congress in extra session and there is no Congress of the United States that would dare ignore the cry of suffering and despair of the plain people of this nation.

Instead of permitting your Secretary of the Treasury to issue billions in interest bearing bonds to further absorb the energies of the nation, public expenditures should be met by an issue of government currency that could enter into the avenues of commerce and take the place of the hoarded dollars that are today inactive.

The question is, have you the courage to take such action? A few plain questions at this time are worth while.

Have you no conscience? Has your heart been so hardened by ambition that you cannot hear the cry of the weak and oppressed?

Is there no sympathy in your heart for your fellowman?

Are position and wealth and the approbation of the oppressing money lords sweeter to your ears than a happy, industrious, contented people?

Do you desire to go down in history as the President of this great Republic despised and hated by those you have permitted to be crushed?
