## County Reaches Three-Fourths Of Bond Sales Goal

During the month of October the citizens of Knox County purchased \$11,370 in Series E and H Savings Bonds.

This announcement was made recently by W. E. Braly, Chairman of Knox County's Savings Bonds Committee.

"Sales for the first ten months of this year totaled \$178,135," Chairman Braly reported. "We have now achieved 75.2% of our 1958 goal of \$237,000."

Sales in Texas during the first ten months of 1958 were \$146,136,258 which represents 83.5% of the 1958 goal of \$175,000,000.

"Under a recent change in Treasury regulations, individuals who hold F and G Bonds that mature after September 1, 1958, may invest the proceeds from the maturing bonds in E and H Bonds without regard to annual purchase limits," Mr. Braly announced. "This information should be of interest to hundreds of people in this area who hold maturing F and G Bonds."

## Open House For New Parsonage At Knox City Held

Rev. and Mrs. Oran D. Smith and members of the Knox City Methodist Church held open house last Saturday from 2 to 5 p. m. in the new parsonage which was completed last week. All former pastors and friends were invited to attend.

The parsonage replaces the one built in 1907-08, during the pastorate of the late Rev. Z. B. Pirle.

Since that time 28 pastors and their families have occupied the dwelling.

The new parsonage, which is located immediately west of the old one was begun during the pastorate of the Rev. Walter Driver, who was assigned to Roscoe the last of May. The Rev. Driver did much of the actual work himself.

The building is in the shape of an "H," with two bedrooms and a bath on the west side. In the center is the living-dining area and on the east is another bedroom and bath, den and kitchen with utility room and half bath. A car port, storage area and a large patio complete the plan.

The old parsonage has been sold and will be moved from the premises in a short time.

## 8-Year-Old Girl Carries Three To Safety As Fire Destroys Home Here

An 8-year-old Negro girl carried her two small sisters and brother to safety Wednesday afternoon, Nov. 26, from their burning home.

Irma Fay Williams, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Williams, made two trips into the 4-room frame house after her younger brother and sisters when the fire was first noticed about 1:30 p. m. Wednesday.

Mother of the children, an employee at City Grill here, said the fire evidently started while one of the children, J. L., was playing with matches in a closet.

Mrs. Williams said she "had a feeling" when she left the house

Wednesday morning that something would happen. She said when she heard the fire alarm, "I knew it was our house," and ran five blocks home.

The father, an employe at a local compress, was not at home at the time, Irma Fay had stayed home from school because of a cold. She is a second grade student at Dunbar School.

Irma Fay carried the two smaller children, Lilly Fay, 3, and Debbie, 1½, to safety first. Then she went in after J. L., 5, and dragged him out of the house a few minutes before it collapsed.

Firemen arrived too late to save the Williams house, but concentrated their efforts on saving the residences on each side by spraying them with water. Neither of the adjoining houses was damaged.

The house and furnishings were a total loss. They were valued at between \$1,500 and \$2,000.

The Williams family was renting the house from the Rev. Sylvester Sanders, Negro minister here. It was in the Negro section of town in the east part of Munday.

Mr. and Mrs. Williams have lived here for more than 10 years. They moved in with friends Wednesday night.

## Wheat Marketing Quota Penalty

In the recent Texas Court Decision, U. S. vs. Evetts Haley, Jr., it was the court's opinion that the provision of law requiring the payment of penalty, where the excess wheat is fed or consumed on the farm is unconstitutional. This is the opinion of one U. S. District Court Judge out of 238 in the U. S.

However, since the Federal District Court's decision in the Haley case in contrary to the law as established through a Supreme Court and other appellate court decision, the General Counsel of the U.S.D.A. is in the process of filing an appeal to the Supreme Court.

Mr. Gayton C. Scott, Chairman of the Knox A.S.C. County Committee, says that the decision in the Haley case will have no effect on the Secretary's regulation or on administration of the wheat program. The wheat marketing quota and other provisions will continue to be carried out as they have been in the past.

Mr. Scott says that wheat producers in Knox County will be subjected to a penalty for harvesting any acres of excess wheat.

Furthermore, Scott stated that due to the lack of funds necessary to operate the County office, wheat measuring of this year's crop will require the wheat farmers to assist the reporters in this work. The performance reporters will be using steel tapes and an assistant will be required for them to properly measure wheat acreage. Since the producer is equally responsible for this operation, and the financial budget of the office will not permit employing extra reporters, it will be necessary for them to assist the reporter or furnish an assistant when their individual farm is measured. If this assistance is not furnished, there will be considerable delay in making the acreage determinations.

The wheat producers are asked by the Knox A.S.C. county committee to fully cooperate in this matter.

### RAILROADS AND AUTOMOBILES

"The railroads will be the principal deterrent to the automotive industry's expanding production objectives unless they are allowed to make a big improvement in the quantity and some improvement in the quality of the service they are now able to provide."

That unusual and thought-provoking point was made by the head of one of our principal railroads. And he then called on his audience of automotive business leaders to join a mutually benefiting alliance with the railroads in the campaign to modernize transport regulation and taxation.

His reasoning is impressive. A mere 10 years from now, it is anticipated that there will be 25 million more automobiles and 3 million more buses and trucks in service. Those vehicles will represent 43 millions tons of steel, 11 million tons of cast iron, 3 million tons of rubber and big tonnages of many other materials. Here the railroad spokesman said: "If you get the raw materials you need I am sure you can do this job. But let me emphasize that you can't get those raw materials, nor move your semi-finished products to assembly plants at reasonable costs without efficient railroad service."

The kind and scope of railroad service this country will need can be assured only if the discriminatory and obsolete burdens on rail transport are removed. This requires a complete overhaul of Federal and state regulatory policy. Every American business, not just motors, should enthusiastically join with the railroads in the effort to bring about urgently needed reforms.

ROSEBURG, ORE., NEWS-REVIEW: "It has been interesting to note that while there has been considerable interest shown in the small foreign cars, which advertise economy and space, a lot of these cars are being used for 'seconds', and have had but little effect on the domestic market."

CLERMONT, FLA., PRESS: "When Lenin wrote his book on Communism, one line in that book was all powerful: 'We shall force the United States to spend itself into destruction.'"

According to a member of the Maritime Board, more than \$4 billion will be spent to modernize the U. S. Merchant Fleet in the next 15 years — a billion more than earlier estimates indicated.

OLD TOWN, ME., PENOBSCOT TIMES: "Hunters and lovers of the 'great outdoors' throng to the eighth annual Old Town Hunters Breakfast. "But the main significance of the Old Town Hunters Breakfast—the big reason why the first Breakfast was planned eight years ago—is to remind hunters, before they set out into the woods after that big one, to use their wits while in the woods, so they will not become lost or have accidents to spoil their enjoyment, and, above all, to make sure that stir of motion, bit of color, or rustle of sound is a deer before they shoot at it . . ."

WALTERBORO, S. C., PRESS AND STAND-ARD: "In the past few weeks a rash of senseless bombings of houses of worship and schools has taken place throughout the South . . . Decent people should rise up and demand that the culprits, when captured, should be severely punished for these unwarranted attacks. If allowed to go unchecked these groups may decide that the Methodist, Presbyterians or even the Rotary Clubs, should be eliminated. The reason is that Swedish firms have been losing out in export markets, largely because of high wages. So, as U. S. News puts it, the unions "prefer to see jobs, rather than higher wages but no jobs."

No one expects our own unions to ask for lower wages. But it's time they thought in terms of restraint in wage and other demands. American business, no less than foreign business, can be priced out of markets. If and when that happens, the workers are priced out of jobs.

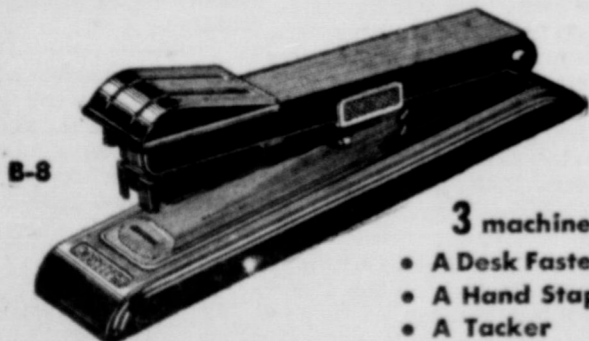

Young man, you say you represent the Daily Gazette and that, since this is the 100th anniversary of the birth of Theodore Roosevelt, you want to interview me on my recollections of that great American?

Well, sir, you have come to the right man. I'll be glad to give your readers the benefit of my first-hand knowledge of Teddy, as I used to call him.

Teddy Roosevelt was the first president that I can remember. I was living in Brinkley, Ark.,

and it was in 1904, Roosevelt was running for re-election. There was a brand of chewing gum that had attached to each package, a celluloid button. You could choose a Roosevelt button or one with the picture of Alton B. Parker. (I had heard of T. R. but not of Parker — and judging from the election returns outside the Solid South, neither had many of the voters, either.)

So I selected a Roosevelt button but soon found that I was the only supporter that had in the entire town of Brinkley, Ark. So, deciding to bow to public sentiment, I returned to the store and the merchant let me trade the button back for a Parker one.

Now my next first-hand recollection of Roosevelt was a review of a book of his he wrote on his experiences in the Spanish-American war. Come to think of it, I read the review somewhat later than 1904 but having proceeded this far, I will go on. "Mr. Dool-

ey," the nation's most popular philosopher, said, in his review, that after reading Roosevelt's book, he thought the author should have called it "Alone in Cuba."

I guess actually that my second recollection of Roosevelt was a song we used to sing about the president and Booker T. Washington, "Won't you have tea with me, under the White House tree?"

Then I recall that my parents, my two little sisters and I were in Little Rock the day that Roosevelt was there. (This was, I think, in 1905.) We went to the railroad station in the hope of catching a glimpse of him. We didn't and

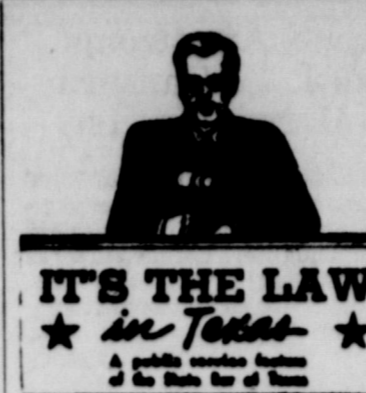
I was disappointed but my father saved the situation by pointing out a coach as the private car of the President of the United States.

That same year, we went to the St. Louis World's Fair. Roosevelt had been there only the day before, so again he and I were prevented by fate from meeting. I did, however, see a statue of him, made of butter.

I believe those are all of my personal recollections of the man who discovered the River of Doubt in South America, had a bear named for him, hunted wolves in Oklahoma, ran a ranch in the Dakota bandlands, commanded the Rough Riders, advocated the strenuous life made "De-e-lighted" his own trade mark, founded the Bull Moose party and was, without question, the most colorful, exuberant, dynamic individual who ever occupied the White House.

Never mind thanking me, young man. I feel it is the obligation of us old-timers to pass on, for the benefit of posterity, our first-hand recollections of the great men we have known.

**SOVEREIGNTY UP THERE**

Down through the ages man has dreamed of traveling through space, but for once we now seem to have the machinery to do it, perhaps to the moon or to Mars soon.

Space flight creates new relations and conflicts, surely among earth people and maybe between us and denizens of other worlds.

The satellites, for example raise problems, though right now fortunately sovereignty is not one of them.

But suppose some country claimed that our satellite held a T. V. camera which threatened its security. Can that nation claim violation of its sovereignty up there? Such questions of sovereignty might involve communications, flight control, traffic regulations, ownership, moon mineral rights and what have you.

How much is one nation entitled to high-altitude unimpeded flight over another? Or how

much may one nation restrict the overhead passage of satellites, missiles, etc.?

New international agreements might set out low-altitude zones of national control, with unrestricted freedom beyond that zone.

Do we need a space navigating code? space rescue code? rules of governing transport of passengers and goods?

We'll have brand new problems of neutrality, nationality, domicile, statelessness, internment, asylum, embargo, piracy, smuggling, customs, colonies, legal jurisdiction — all coming with the space age.

Physical science certainly does not present all the problems. Many people in fact claim we do not know enough about the nature of outer space to write laws defining the rights of nations to explore it.

## Weekly Health LETTER

Issued by Henry A. Holle, M. D., State Health Officer

Tetanus, often called lockjaw, is still prevalent in the United States. Figures for 1958 show that there were 447 cases of the disease in the country from January 1 to November 1. Twenty five of these cases occurred in Texas.

The history of tetanus goes way back. This disease was clinically described by Hippocrates and Arataeus very accurately.

In 1885 Nicolaier produced the disease experimentally in animals. He did this by inoculating them with garden soil.

Four years later, Kitasato isolated the bacilli in pure culture.

He went on to produce a tetanus toxin in 1890 and the antitoxin a year later.

For the past five years the incidence of the disease has been holding its own in Texas, fluctuating only little. The disease is caused by the introduction of the tetanus bacilli into the body through a wound.

The bacilli in turn produce a toxin which reacts in much the same manner as a poison on certain bodily functions.

It is characterized by stiffness of the jaw and neck muscles. Before the development of antitoxin, about 80 percent of all afflicted persons died.

The disease was more prevalent then because of few paved roads and sidewalks, besides the abundance of horses and other animals before the coming of automobiles. Today, soils, street dust and animal excreta are still the principal reservoirs.

Since 1941 the U. S. Armed Forces have protected their men with tetanus toxoid. During World War II there were only 12 cases of tetanus in the Army and Air Force. Six had not received the toxoid shots and two had received the toxoid, but not an emergency booster. Out of 600,000 battle wounds, only one case developed tetanus.

Meanwhile in the Navy there were two deaths from four cases. Only one had not been fully immunized. Compared to high tetanus rates of other warring nations, low incidence among allied troops proves the benefits of tetanus toxoid.

In contrast to the antitoxin the toxoid does not contain horse serum, a decided advantage for allergic people.

Active protection can be obtained from inoculations of the tetanus toxoid with a booster shot at regular intervals as suggested by your physician. Anyone who is subject to incur an open injury such as construction workers and farmers should protect themselves. And certainly little children running around barefoot need the protection of tetanus toxoid. (A weekly feature of the Public Health Education Division of Texas State Department of Health.)

## The American Legion

R. F. Horan, Adj. TEN COMMANDMENTS

All of the marvelous advances in social sciences — the multiplication of youth programs, playgrounds and substitutes for broken homes will not properly help our children if we fail to give them the spiritual and moral training so necessary to help them withstand the rigors of adult life. All the child welfare agencies and youth movements in the world will not produce a generation of good character without the spiritual discipline of the Ten Commandments.

Yet a survey of some 50,000 school children in one of our largest cities revealed the startling facts that three-fourths of them did not know the Ten Commandments, and nearly two-thirds of that number had never heard of them.

A survey sometime ago disclosed that approximately 68 percent of our children and youth had either no connection with religion or only nominal church connection.

Statistics released sometime ago by the Federal Council of Churches of Christ in America, representing twenty-two major Protestant denominations, revealed a sum total of approximately 70 million churches affiliation among all of our people, or roughly, a little less than one-half of our population.

Also, the International Sunday School Association estimated that more than one-half of our children were outside of the influence of the Church, the Sunday School and religious classes.

In view of this mass of evidence, the clear inference is that one out of two of our American people, and at least one-half of our children, are outside the orbit of the effective operation of the moral law, and the influence of religion.

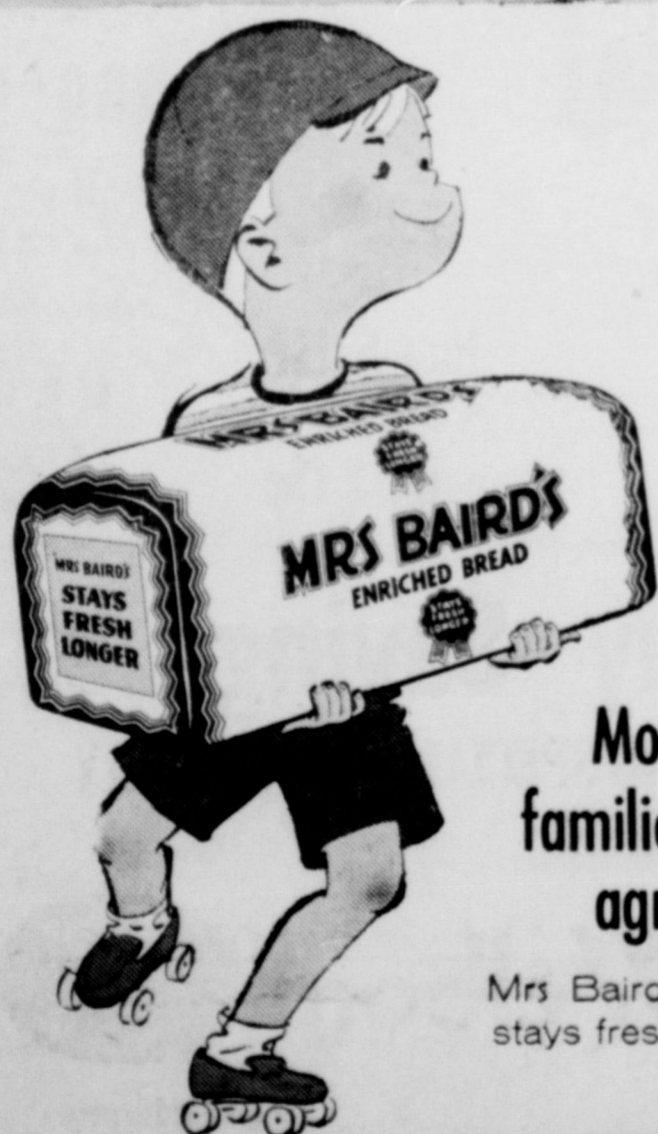

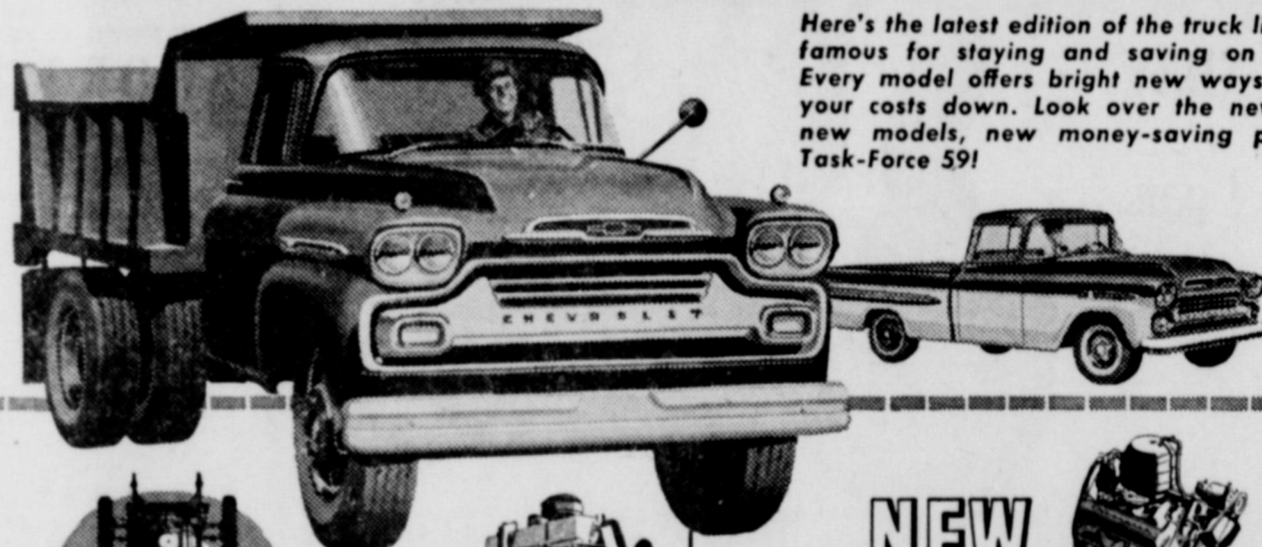

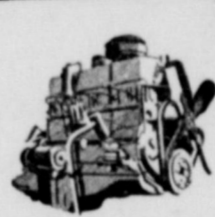

## Knox Prairie Philosopher Comes Out For A Brand New Taxing Theory, If He Can Have Strong Voice In It

Editor's note: The Knox Prairie Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm on Miller Creek endorses a new taxing theory, with considerable reservations, his letter this week reveals.

Dear editor: The trouble with a good idea out of Washington is that it never does get enough attention to detail to make it fit into my farm out here on the creek.

For example, the other day an economic expert in Washington said what this country needs is a sliding tax rate to vary automatically with the ups and downs of the economy. When times are good, raise the tax rate a little, when they get bad, lower it, automatically, without waiting for Congress to argue over it a year or two. By the time Congress got through debating, we could be out of one recession and into another one.

Now this is a fine idea, it suits me exactly, but here's the trouble: who's going to decide when times are good and bad?

The way it'd work is, a bunch of experts would figure out what the economic index is and set the tax rate from that, but the economic index is sort of like a public opinion poll — nobody has ever consulted me on one of those things.

The way I see it it's impossible to fix an economic index for everybody and say, well, the country is 3 per cent better off this year than last, or is 4 per cent

worse off. Lots of times there is absolutely no connection between my financial situation and the national economic index. That is, when the index goes down, you can pretty well figure my situation too, but there's something wrong with the other end of my index and when the national trend goes up, mine frequently stays where it is, or drops.

Consequently, what the country needs is a personalized economic index, with the tax rate tied on to that.

If the tax rate is going to be based on your financial shape, I don't want any bunch of bureaucrats in Washington sitting down to figure up what shape I'm in. If there's anybody who ought to know what shape I'm in, it's me. If this new taxing theory is going to work, as far as I'm concerned, it'll have to be based on what took place on this farm in the past twelve months, not on

1 cup fine graham cracker crumbs  
¼ cup melted butter or margarine  
½ cup PET Evaporated Milk  
1½ pkg. unflavored gelatin  
½ cup water  
2 eggs, separated  
½ cup sugar  
½ teaspoon salt  
1 Tablespoon vanilla  
¼ teaspoon rum flavoring (can omit)  
½ cup PET Evaporated Milk

Press mixture of crumbs and butter on bottom and sides of 9-in. pie pan. Chill until needed. Chill ½ cup PET Milk in ice tray until almost frozen around edges. Meanwhile, soften gelatin in ½ cup cold water. Stir in ½ cup boiling water until gelatin dissolves. In 1½-qt. bowl mix slightly beaten egg yolks, sugar, salt, vanilla, rum flavoring and ½ cup PET Milk. Stir in dissolved gelatin gradually. Chill until very thick, but not set, stirring now and then. Put egg whites and chilled PET Milk into cold 1-qt. bowl. Whip with cold rotary beater by hand, or with electric beater at high speed, until stiff. Beat in chilled gelatin mixture gradually, until smooth and creamy. Put into crumb crust. Chill until firm, about 2 hrs., and ready to serve.
