## 45 Day Extension Granted Disabled Veterans to Secure License Plates

The Texas Highway Depart- | legislation ment is granting a 45 day ex-tension for disabled veterans to an additional period of tension for disabled veterans to file applications for 1972 "Dis-abled Vet" license plates. This benefit was enacted by the 62nd Legislature, 1971, HB 615, and provides for free license plates a 70 percent service-connect-ed disability and are in re-elpt of compensation because of such disability. UNDERSTANDING THE SCRIPTURES (continued from last week)

Do you believe that it is right in the sight of God for the South Sea Islanders to murder and sacrifice their purest, sweetest virgins to their heathen gods? They are just as sincere in this as any of us are in what we do. In India the Hindus offer their babies to the so-called god of the Ganges River. People were never more sincere. You see, being honest and sincere is not the test of what is right and what is wrong before God.

God has not left it up to man to make just whatever he wants to out of the scriptures. He does not deal with mankind in such an impractical way. He deals in express ideas and specific commandments. It is not necessary for man to wonder about what God wants him to believe and what God wants him do

This brings us face to face with the question: "Is it possible for man to understand what God has said?" God says in His word, "Be not unwise, but understanding what the will of the Lord it." (Eph. 5:17). What kind of a God would He be if He has commanded man to do something which he does not have the power nor the capacity to do? The very fact that God has commanded to understand His will is proof enough that it is possible.
