Disabled Farmers May Be Eligible For **Disability Benefits**

Are you a farmer so disabled you are no longer able to manage or operate your farm? You may be elegible for disability benefits under the social security program if you are between 50 and 65 years of age, or to have your earnings record frozen if you office in Benjamin. The dates are are not yet 50.

Erton Tate, district manager of the Wichita Falls Social Security Office pointed out that as of October 1959 self-employed farmers who are severely disabled may qualify for disability insurance benefits based on earnings solely from the farm. In addition to being severely disabled a person must have 5 years (20 quarters) of earnings credited to his social security record in the 10year (40 quarter) period before becoming disabled.

Agricultural self-employment income was first covered by social security in Jan. 1955. Therefore, as of Oct. 1959, a farmer with no arnings other than those from the farm can meet this work requirement if he has had creditable self-employment income for each year beginning with 1955. As there is a 6-month waiting period after a person qualifies for disability benefits, anyone who met the requirements in October would get his first check for the month of April 1960.

Can I Be Called Just A Christian?

There is no name so glorious as that of Christian. Is it possible for me to wear this name without descriptive adjectives before it? In the 20th century. is it old fashion to assert that I am not a certain type or brand of "Christian", but just

plain Christian? We should glorify God by wearing this name. To encourage Christians who were being persecuted, Peter wrote these words: "But if a man suffer as a Christian, let him not be ashamed; but let him glorify God in this name" (1 Pet. 4: 16). The apostles rejoiced to suffer for his name. Luke said of the early disciples in Jerusalem following a period of persecution: "And they departed from the presence of the council, rejoicing that they were counted worthy to suffer shame for his name" (Acts 5:-

This name "Christian" was given by the Lord. Several hundred years before Christ was born, God said through an Old Testament prophet: "And the Gentiles shall see thy righteousness, and all kings thy glory; and thou shalt be called by a new name, which the mouth of the Lord shall







Buy A License Before You Get Fishing Fever

The fishing season is here, so get your 1960 fishing license before you get fishing fever," warns the director of law enforcement, Texas Game and Fish Commis-

Last month, 37 persons were charged with fishing without the required licenses. "Most of these probably were individuals who forgot about a license until they were already in the boat and fishng," said the director.

According to the Commission' monthly report on game and fish law violations, hunting contrary tal of 70 persons were charged with illegally hunting at night. Some 29 were charged with hunting without resident licenses. Another 29 were charged with hunting in closed season, and 23 were filed on for hunting from an automobile.

Wardens arrested 19 persons for killing doves out of season, 5 for hunting on game preserves 14 for headlighting animals, 13 for killing deer in closed season, 12 in possession of wild doe deer. 2 for killing curlew, and 10 persons were charged for polluting public water.

A total of 413 violations were reported in January. Of these, 39 were dismissed in court, 3 served time in jail, 6 appealed, one had his fine suspended, and two were found not guilty.

Fines for the month amounted to \$15,609.15 and court costs totalled \$662.00, making \$16,271.15 the amount paid by hunters and fishermen for game and fish violations in January.

Get Acquainted With Game Warden For Your District

"It is unfortunate that some persons never meet a game warden until they are involved in some difficulty," writes H. D. Dodgen, executive secretary of the Texas Game and Fish Commission, in an editorial entitled "His Work-Our Wealth," in the February issue of the agency's official publication. "It is just as unfortunate that so many persons never get to meet a game warden at all."

"Basically," writes Dodgen, "the warden's job was created to enforce game laws passed by your legislature. This still is a very important part of their daily chores. Now, however, he has another part of the job which he likes. He has become a disciple of the great outdoors. He is a walking encyclopedia of information on how to hunt and fish, and where. He must know the multiplicity of laws that govern the ownership, control, and harvest of wildlife.

"Your game warden is your neighbor. He wants to take part in your civic club activities; he will pass the collection plate in your church, or serve as a scout master, or provide motion pictures and talks for the garden club and the P. T. A. on the subject of conservation or wildlife apprecia-

"He will be one of the first on hand to fight a forest fire of to search for the lost or drowned.' he continues.

"Your game warden is not perfect nor is he a saint," concluded the executive. "But he is a dedicated man who is doing his best at his job, and with your help he'll do it better. Get acquainted with
