MEDICAL CARE FOR THE NEEDY

No person, regardless of age, needs to forego a physician's service because of inability to pay. That statement has been made by Dr. Louis M. Orr, president of the American Medical Association, in opposing a bill which proposes federal purchase of certain health care services for social security beneficiaries.

The backers of this bill would have us believe tnat many Americans, and especially those in later life, are denied medical care because they cannot afford to pay for it. But, as Dr. Crr points out, the evidence is to the contrary. Since time mmemorial, physicians have given their services to the indigent without compensation, and the value of these donated services runs to millians of dollars a year Many county medical societies have even run paid advertisements in newspapers guaranteeing the services of a physician to all who need him. "I am certain," Dr. Orr aided, "that every other county medical society also will answer the need for a physician."

How, then, can the interests, medically speaking, of the aged be best served? Dr. Orr listed a number of areas: By encouraging further development of voluntary health insurance; by replacing compulsory retirement and age discrimination in aid-to-education bills, a statement made last Sepemployment with more realistic and flexible systems; by curbing inflation; by encouraging construction of nursing homes and other facilities designed to care for the long-term patients efficiently and economically, and by increasing reimbursement of hospitals by local and state governments for care of the needy of any age.
