Chips From The Carpenter's Workbench

In New Testament times worship included praise and adoration to God and Christ through singing. Singing expressed the gratitude and thanksgiving with joy for the salvation the early Christians had gained through the Cross. Under the impulse of love for God they sang spontaneously (James 5:13) "with the spirit . and understanding" (I

Cor: 14:28) The origin of this practice came from the Jewish synagogue worship where psalm singing was outstanding. Paul commanded the Christians to "teach and admonish one another in psalms and hymns and spiritual songs" in praise to God (Eph. 5:19; Col. 3:16). The singing was to come from the heart which was spirit-controlled (I Cor. 14:26).

Paul and John quote from several hymns of Christian origin in the Epistles and Revelation, (fragments are found in Ephesians 5:14; I Tim. 3:16; 2 Tim. 2:11; Phil. 2:6-7; Rev. 4:11; 5:9-13; 11:15-18; 15:3-4). 

Zenger was brought to trial for is published remarks and almost mmediately his New York counel were disbarred because of the resistance they offered in his deense. After disbarment they seured the services of Andrew Hamilton of the Philadelphia bar o continue the defense. Hamilton was the foremost lawyer in the American Colonies and the term "Philadelphia lawyer" was ong used as a special compliment n his individual honor.

Hamilton offered his services to Zenger without fee. Displaying great moral courage he defied the judges who were controlled by the Governor and told the jury that it was not considering the cause of just a poor printer Instead, it was considering the cause of "the liberty both of exposing and opposing arbitrary power by speaking and writing truth." At the conclusion of the trial the Chief Justice instructed the jury that the printed words of Zenger were libelous and that if the jury found he had published them, as he had, then Zenger should be found guilty. Under the law.) such circumstances it was obvious that Zenger would be convicted.

Fortunately, the jury, which was not controlled by the Governor, defied the court. Zenger was found not guilty. 


