## News From The U. S. Congress

The following was written by Dan McCrary, a newspaper reporter, who is spending a year in Washington as a Congressional Fellow of the American Political Science Association. This Association provides funds to send about 15 journalists and political science teachers to the capital each year to learn more about how Congress functions. They divide their time working in Congressional and Senatorial offices. Dan, who is originally from Michigan, has worked in my office since late December. I thought you might be interested in some of his observations.)

Newspaper reporters, like anyone else, can get in ruts. They can become so accustomed to the atmosphere in which they work that they become a part of it. I think there's plenty of evidence that members of the Washington press corps represent good examples.

There's little doubt that there are so many top-notch reporters per square mile anywhere as in Washington. Newspapers and press services send only their best men to report from the Capital where news breaks constantly and in volume. And somehow, each day, reporters manage to surmount this mountain of news and get it in print.

But reporters here become so closely identified with the Government that they stick primarily in their writing to what is done here and mostly overlook how things get done.

Take, for example, the unlikely combination of pomp and confusion with which the House of Representatives conducts its business. To a casual observer it must be amazing indeed that the House accomplishes anything at all. Members mill about on the floor, converse with their colleagues, and apparently pay little attention to the course of business. Yet things get done, and you can be sure that some member is on the floor, alert and ready to jump on skullduggery, whether it be real or imaginary. This flavor, feeling, or what-have-you with which the House carries out its duties, is mostly missing in news dispatches.

Any seasoned Congressional reporter can relate anecdotes by the hour dealing with the wondrous process that is Congress. But

few stop to insert the colorful, vibrant atmosphere of the place into their news stories, even when they do have time for this extra twist.

There's one thing, for instance, which this inexperienced observer of a few months has noticed about the House which rarely worms its way into news dispatches. This is the two-headed nature of Congress. One head is an institution. It is bound up tightly in a set of written and unwritten rules, custom and precedence. Some of these rules are undoubtedly out-dated; some are awkward; some don't seem to make much sense. But they serve a vital function in a Democratic body, and, significantly, they're double-edged. They recognize that the will of the majority is the will of Congress, and they protect this majority from a militant few who might force their way. At the same time, the rules protect the minorities and recognize their right to assert themselves. The rules are designed to avoid undue haste in the passage of legislation, but they can be bent to meet clear-cut emergencies, and bills can move through the House quickly and effectively.

This is one head of the House: a black and white, unsympathetic, unyielding creature of rules. But on the other hand, the House is a creature of men and it is when these two ingredients — rules and men — are blended that the Congress takes on its depth and resilience. The men and women who are members seem to be pretty much like men and women you'd meet anywhere else. Some are brilliant; some boil with ideas; some are "wheelers and dealers"; some mediators; some are dull and uninteresting. But together they produce a personality strong enough to make itself felt throughout the Nation; a man-sized accomplishment, when you stop to think about it.

I'm sure experienced Congressional reporters are more aware of the make-up of the House than I am. And I recognize that in the usual meaning of news,

the trappings of Congress aren't newsworthy in the daily flood of happenings. But I have been amazed at the processes of Congress, and I think that others, also uninitiated to the Body, would feel the same.

As a footnote, I would like to express my appreciation to Mr. Ikard for his help and guidance during my four months here. In my opinion, the 13th District of Texas sends to Washington a Representative who is as able as any in the House. Voters can feel proud of their choice.

## Weekly Health LETTER

Issued by the State Health Department

A Megalopye opercularis—for those of you who don't have an entomology textbook handy—is a moth, commonly called "asp" in the larval stage.

These brown or grey, semi-crescent shaped larvae may become extremely abundant, feeding on the foliage of a variety of trees and shrubs. They're making their annual appearance in Texas now, and will be noticeable until months of late fall.

Everyone should familiarize themselves with the appearance and medical importance of these stinging caterpillars. Children in particular, should be warned to avoid them.

Individual reaction to the stings varies greatly, dependent upon many factors such as age, sensitivity status, size of caterpillar, area of skin involved, and the amount of pressure on contact.

A mature larva dropping from a tree into a person's shirt or blouse and mashed against the skin in several places before being retrieved would likely cause a much more painful condition than the simple act of brushing an exposed arm or leg against a small specimen.

A burning pain is felt almost immediately on contact. Small, raised, whitish spots appear, later becoming red. The inflamed area may spread for several inches, accompanied by swelling.

The resulting skin reaction frequently lasts for days. Further systemic symptoms may arise of an allergic nature.

Hollow hairs are filled with poison supplied from poison gland cells opening directly to the hairs. The tips of the hair or spine can readily penetrate the skin and break off.

The "buck moth" is another stinging caterpillar common to oak trees as well as some other trees, often stepped on by bare-foot children.

Leave the puss caterpillar and "buck moth" alone. For while they

probably won't kill you, a disturbed system isn't something to be taken lightly.

A spray of lead arsenate (two tablespoons per gallon of water) or 50 per cent wettable DDT (two teaspoons per gallon of water) will get rid of them for you.

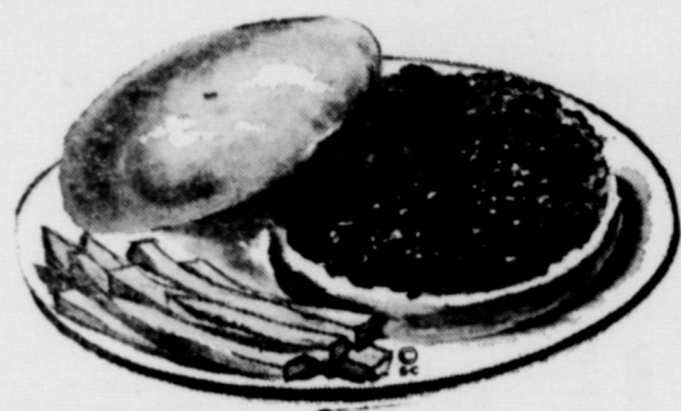

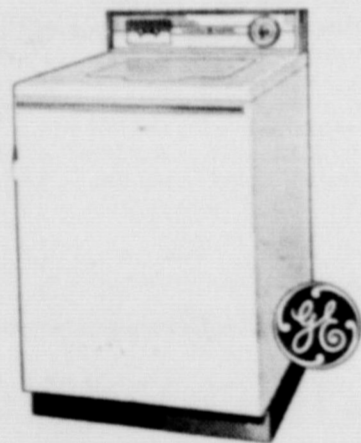

Fort Worth, when I moved there in 1931, had a population of around 150,000. As a reporter on the Star-Telegram, I was often assigned to the police station and there was a period of a year or so when I attended the luncheon of some service club five noons a week—so that I knew all the detectives, half the patrolmen and nearly all the members of the downtown Lions, Kiwanis and Rotary clubs. Now the city has grown to such an extent that I can walk two blocks and not see

a single face I know. Automobile traffic was not a third of what it is today. There were no parking meters. The traffic signals were connected with bells which rang when the signal changed. This was during the depression and national prohibition. Millions chuckled at Will Rogers' remarks in the daily paper. There was no air-conditioning; no TV and even radio was not yet so stabilized but one man operated a station without a license until federal officers walked in, in the middle of a program, and jerked the wires loose. People were talking about a successor to "the great engineer in the White House" and a Texan and two former Texans were coming in for consideration. Speaker of the House John N. Gatter, of Uvalde, Gov. "Alfalfa Bill" Murray of Oklahoma, who had lived in Parker County, and Melvin Traylor of Chicago, who began his banking career in Malone, in

Hill County. Travelers visiting Fort Worth for the first time inquired the way to the Seibold Cafeteria famed for its huge steaks; and gourmets said the specialty at the Virginia Ham Kitchen was better than the ham served in Virginia. A certain hooded organization had faded, like a spectre, from the scene only a few years before, after having briefly exercised political power in Fort Worth and the State. There was rumor it was going to be revived so I was assigned by the city editor to report the meeting. The place of a hill-top overlooking the Fort Worth-Dallas pike, a quarter of a mile east of the car-barns. This hill was said to have been the meeting place during the heyday of the organization. Several hundred men were there, none in robes and masks, and a few speeches were made but the old-time ardor was absent and the ghost returned to its tomb. One week end the Missouri Pacific railroad ran an excursion to San Antonio. I went. The round-trip fare was \$3. (Years ago, the Missouri Pacific gave up passenger service between Fort Worth and San Antonio.) Ten thousand was a good crowd for a T.C.U. football game. The Stock Show was held in the North Side Coliseum. Bowen Air Lines advertised that the fastest passen-

ger planes in the world were in operation between Fort Worth and San Antonio. Amon Carter already had become an international celebrity. William P. McLean was the State's most renowned trial lawyer. The Rev. Frank Norris was one of the best known ministers in the nation. The city's most spectacular capitalist of that era was busy in various enterprises. Rated many times over a millionaire at that time, he was to die 20 years later as guest in a hospital to which, in his days of affluence, he had given \$50,000. W. T. (Tom) Waggoner, last of the old-time West Texas cattle kings, was living in Fort Worth. He was said to be the richest man west of the Mississippi because of the countless cattle and the oil wells on his vast ranch. At this time, he was building Arlington Downs which came to represent an investment of \$2,000,000. But after a short period, the place was to stand deserted except for the memories of pounding hooves, beats and cheering throngs. After years of desolation, the big grandstand recently was torn down so the land can become part of a great industrial development. Verily, time has brought changes since 1931.

For the third consecutive year, May Day has a special significance in this country. By proclamation of President Eisenhower, May 1st is again to be observed as LAW DAY U.S.A. Why is it that some men are able to live in freedom while others cringe under a rule of tyranny? We owe our rights and freedoms to our state and national constitutions, our laws, and our courts. In other lands, there are no rights and people are subjected to the edicts and whims of individuals unhampered by legal restraints. Most of us tend to take it for granted that an individual is free to think for himself and that his rights are protected by law. We know without actually admitting it that our whole way of life is governed by this rule of law. Law is the intangible force guaranteeing all of us freedom, peace and progress—ideals which have been, and are, dependent upon the adequacy of our legal system and the protection awarded the individual by our courts. On May 1st, then, this year and every year, with the nation's attention focused on LAW DAY U.S.A. it behooves us to re-dedicate our belief and faith in this rule of law that is the birthright of all Americans. It is this liberty and equality under law that distinguishes our system of government from communism. Without laws and the courts, these freedoms we take so for granted would be meaningless. Our respect for law is vital to the continued growth and strengthening of our nation; our thoughtful observance of LAW

Dear Editor:

An educational booth will be added this year. In this booth will be souvenirs from all the countries visited this year in the study course.

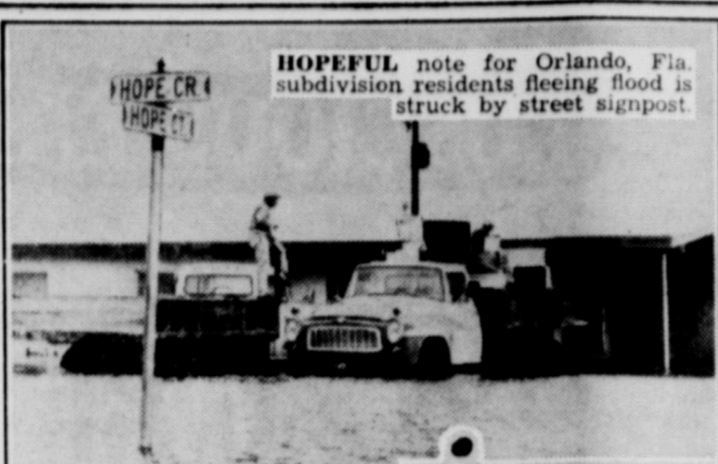

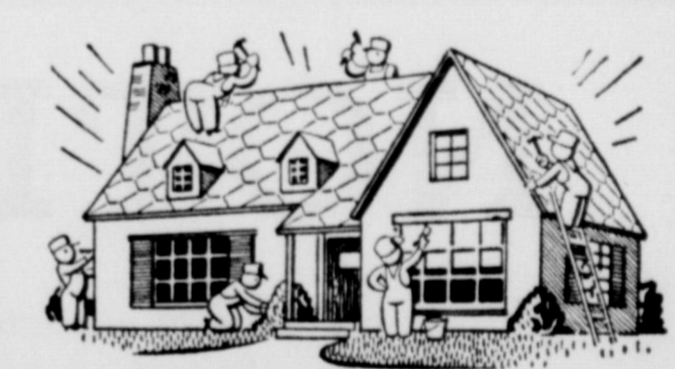

**REALISTIC POLICY ON CHEMICALS**

Not long ago Rep. Henry A. Dixon (R-Utah), who was an agricultural expert before he became a congressman, delivered a speech to the House in Washington in which he strongly implied that the present policy of the U. S. Food and Drug Administration toward use of chemicals in agriculture is downright ridiculous.

Rep. Dixon traced this policy to the administration's interpretation of the Delaney amendment to the food additive bill in the last session of Congress. The Delaney amendment prohibits in food any carcinogen residue—a chemical which ingested under any conditions can produce cancer in animals or humans.

"The original Delaney amendment," said Rep. Dixon, "was opposed by the Food and Drug Administration and had been rejected in committee as being too sweeping. However, there was little opportunity for debate and on the floor House members were made to feel they would be voting for cancer if they opposed the Delaney amendment. So it passed in a breeze, as it also did in the Senate.

"The Food and Drug Administration takes the position that the Delaney amendment prohibits even the most minute trace of any carcinogen in human food,

even though it requires heavy and sustained dosages to produce cancer in an animal. This has aroused the Farm Bureau, Farmers Union, and virtually all other farm organizations to an unprecedented fury.

"Farmer groups want to use these needed chemicals and protect public health through designation of safe low tolerances of chemicals established by the National Academy of Science or a commission of scientists. . . . They fear that the present interpretation of the Delaney amendment could virtually wreck U. S. agriculture as well as worsen rather than improve public health."

Rep. Dixon quoted the Food and Drug Commissioner, George P. Larrick, as having pointed out that "cancers can be produced in test animals by repeated injections of sugar solutions in the muscle tissue or peanut oil or cotton seed oil or lard or tannic acid."

A realistic policy on the use of chemicals in agriculture is essential, the congressman insisted, because "so much publicity has been given to the cancer scare that even routine Food and Drug actions are now causing financial losses to farmers, merchants and companies."

Before becoming a congressman Rep. Dixon was president of the Utah State Agricultural College.
