Children have a fairly clear and immature! idea of God, but when they grow up their childish ideas do not satisfy

Most children grow up physically, mentally and psychologically but as far as faith is concerned, a lot of them haven't grown up at all. They haven't given it as much attention as they've given to their jobs, football or TV. So they find their ideas about God so small and childish they naturally don't want to love or worship or serve a God they've outgrown. What they need to do is "wise up." A number of people still thank of God as a Super policeman, or a Tyrant, or a Dreadful Judge, or sort of a Killjoy. You know it is hard to love and worship someone with such a tragic personality, but some well meaning people are trying hard to do it. Some good people regard Him as a kind of Santa Claus, some great Benevolence, who brings us gifts once in a while when we are "good boys." Now you're growing up!
