Will you vote, come Saturday? You should. It won't take you but about a minute.

All we here in Munday will have to do sign our name to that little 2 x 2 - inch tare-off slip, then mark the ballot in two races.

Yes, we have one of the short-est ballots in our memory. Only one state-wide race, that of judge of the Court of Criminal Appeals, is listed on the ballot. In this race Lloyd W. Davidson of Travis County and W. T. McDonald of Brazos county are contesting for honors. And they should receive yours.

Of more local interest is the race for State Representative of the 83rd district, in which Bill Sams of Knox County and J. C. (Carl) Wheatley of Haskell county are seeking your vote. Enough interested should be manifested in who will serve us in the "halls of the Legislature" in Austin for the next two years to assure a good turnout of electors.

It's a different story in Commissioners Precinct No. 1 in Knox County, in which the Knox City boxes carry a large majority of the votes. In this race, T. C. Carter is seeking re-election and is opposed by J. V. (Bud) Carver. Interest in this race is likely to bring out a majority of the voters in this precinct. These names will appear on all the county ballots; but, of course, those of us residing in the other precincts will not vote in this race.

And that's the ticket in next Saturday's election. But the shortage of the ballot should not cause us to lose interest and lose sight of the fact that we should exercise our right and privilege as an American citizen and take that minute of our time to vote.

The larger the vote, the better the candidates will feel, whether elected or defeated. To be elected by just a smattering of votes may cause the victor to feel that he was not elected by a majority of the people — although by a majority of the votes.

In Baylor County, because of the light ballot, it was decided that all of the county's voters would vote in just one box — that of Seymour — in order to cut down on the expenses of the election. We understand they secured approval of candidates to conduct the election in this week. So far as we know, the election will hold forth in all Knox County boxes, and we'll see you at the polls Saturday!

We'd been afraid for it to rain, especially since every shower in recent weeks had brought damaging hail where it fell. But one could not ask for anything better than that which fell Monday morning — except that there should have been more of it.

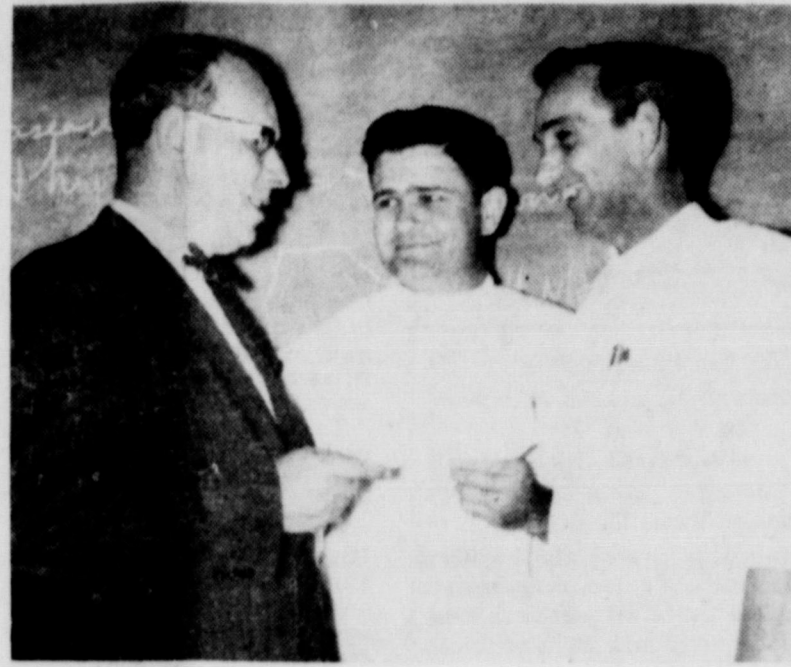
Mr. Bowden has accepted a position as teacher of Commercial Arts in the Munday Public School for another year.

Few People Check On Social Security Accounts In Area

Have you checked your social security account lately? If you have let a number of years go by without checking your social security account, you are no different from many of your fellow workers.

Erton Tate, Manager of the Wichita Falls, Texas Social Security Administration District Office, stated today. It is surprising to find few people checking their accounts now in view of the fact that retirement benefits are much higher and disability benefits are possible to disabled workers age 50 or over who meet the minimum earnings requirements in the ten-year period ending with the date of their disability.

It is most important to you and your family to make sure you receive credit for all your earnings under social security. Anyone who has worked for a number of employers in the last few years should make it his business to check his account to see not only that his wages have been reported to his employers correctly as to the amount, but also that wages were reported under his correct name and social security number.

Tate pointed out that because many workers had previously checked their social security accounts and found them to be correct, they seem to lose interest in their accounts until they are ready to retire or to apply for disability benefits. They fail to consider the fact that with about two hundred million items reported each year, there is room for error.

He explained that sending a statement of your earnings is a simple machine operation once your request is received. All you need to do to obtain a statement of your earnings is to complete and mail a special Wage Inquiry Post Card which is available to you upon request by visiting, writing, or telephoning your social security office.

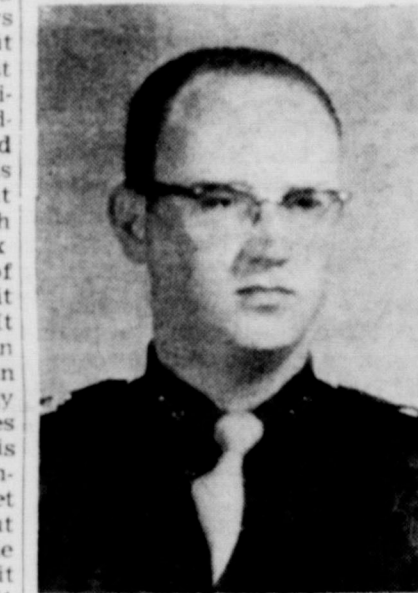

WHERE CRIME DOESN'T PAY

Banditry can be controlled—by aggressive, determined cooperation between the law enforcement authorities and interested enterprises.

If you doubt that, a remarkable record that has been set in Philadelphia may change your view.

Eleven years ago a team of bandits made a career of holding up the managers of a chain system, American Stores. They pulled 17 jobs in a row. In the last, a police officer was shot and killed.

That shot marked the beginning of a non-stop counter-offensive by the store organization and local law enforcement bodies, notably the Philadelphia Police Department. Since the offensive started, there have been 94 holdups—and every participant, save for two murder defendants yet to be tried, has been sentenced to prison! There hasn't been a single acquittal. The prison terms meted out amounted to a total minimum of 361 years and three months and to a total maximum of 996 years and 11 months.

As a result of that record, there have been no holdups in the past two years. The crooks have learned that, in this case, crime doesn't pay. And what has been accomplished in Philadelphia can be duplicated everywhere through the same kind of cooperation.

POLITICAL PAYOLA

We've all heard about "payola"—a device where, according to the revelations of a Congressional investigating body, disc jockeys obtained large sums of money along with valuable gifts from record companies in return for plugging the product. This, coming on the heels of the TV quiz-show scandals, has left a bad taste in the mouths of millions of Americans.

But there's another form of "payola" that is far more important. Congressman Halleck deserves the credit for calling attention to it. He describes the avalanche of proposed multi-billion dollar spending bills as "political payola." In his words, they "simply hand out the taxpayer's money to buy votes for the next election."

If the "political payola" groups have their way, there won't be a budget surplus. In all probability, there'll be a deficit instead. Then we'll have more inflation—and, ultimately, still more and higher taxes. How does that prospect strike you?

SOMETHING TO REMEMBER

Everybody will soon be scratching, or borrowing, to pay their income taxes on April 15.

In a newspaper advertisement the Florida Power and Light Company points to "2 Ways You Can Save on Income Taxes!"

"1. Take advantage of all possible deductions. There are reliable income tax guides on sale that will give you a complete list of all permissible deductions. You may be surprised at how much you can save by itemizing your deductions.

"2. Keep the Government out of business. When the Government competes with private enterprise, the cost is reflected in higher taxes. In just one instance—TVA—Florida's share of the tax burden involved has already amounted to \$125,950,000, based on Florida's share of Federal taxes. This amounts to just under \$100 per family of four. Support free enterprise, resist government competition, and you will save on taxes."

Taxpayers of all states dig up for federal socialization of business. If some well-organized and politically aggressive groups have their way they will force the taxpayers to dig deeper and deeper.

EDITORS AND THE WELFARE STATE

If some have their way, the predicted federal budget surplus of \$12 billion will disappear, and in all probability another deficit will take its place. They would spend money in virtually limitless amounts on new or increased welfare state and similar legislation.

They won't, however, have the support of the nation's grassroots editors. The "American Press" recently polled a substantial number of weekly newspaper editors on a list of current controversial subjects. One question asked how they'd prefer the bulk of the budget surplus to be used. The answers: To reduce national debt, 80 per cent; to increase defense expenditures, 11 per cent; to lower taxes, 18 per cent; for greater social welfare programs, 6 per cent; for federal aid to education, 2 per cent.

These editors have seen the gradual development of the welfare state in this country, and realize its destructiveness—not only to our wealth, but to our self-reliance, independence and freedoms. And the great majority want no more of it.

Chips From The Carpenter's Workbench

The impetus of modern preaching has been focused on hell-fire and brimstone and condemnation. Under this preaching, a person scrupulously trying to live the Christian life never feels quite free from his guilt complexes and fears of God. In contrast, the preaching of New Testament times emphasized "salvation," "freedom," "justification" from sins, guilt and fear. The message of Christ was "Fear not! . . . O ye of little faith" and "I come not to condemn but to save." To prove it He shed His life's blood on the Cross. God simply did not want men to be captive to sin, or feel the guilt of it, but to be free from it! so as not to suffer the consequences of it! God loves us.

To emphasize this fact in reality — Jesus really died, was really buried and really rose!

He suffered the Cross to "free" us from sin and guilt. That's the "good-news," or Gospel, i. e., "that Christ died for our sins in accordance with the scriptures, that he was buried, that he was raised on the third day in accordance with the scriptures" (1 Cor. 15:2).

It wasn't just in His mind—it was as real as the Father's love was real. To impress this on the mind and heart of man

in a psychologically real way, Jesus instituted two formalized ceremonies symbolizing this fact: Baptism and the Lord's Supper. Both have a direct relationship to the Cross, without which the ceremonies become void, empty and unrelated to Christianity.

Paul emphasized that Baptism was "a death" and "a crucifixion" to self and sin (Rom. 6:2, 6). It was "a burial" in water which has always been the symbol of purification (verse 4), and it was "a resurrection" from that watery grave (V. 4). Christ shed His life-saving blood in His death. The follower of Christ is "buried into His death by baptism" (V. 2), thereby contacting the blood which "washes away sin" (Acts 22:16, Rev. 1:5), thus being baptized "for the remission of sins" (Acts 2:38) and being "free from sins they become the servants of righteousness" (Rom. 6:17-18). Baptism is a real death to self and sin, a real burial in water, and a real resurrection. It is not simply a mental attitude any more than love is. God's love was really in the Cross and our death to sin and our burial with Christ in Baptism is also real.

Wheat Referendum Set For July 21st

In line with currently controlling legislation, Secretary of Agriculture Benson has proclaimed marketing quotas on the 1961 wheat crop and set July 21 as the date for a referendum to determine producer approval or disapproval of quotas.

The Secretary also proclaimed a national wheat acreage allotment of 55 million acres, the minimum permitted by law and announced State shares of the allotment. Texas' share of the allotment was set at 4,047,136 acres. This compares with 4,092,251 acres in 1960. An announcement was also made that the minimum national average support price for 1961 production will be determined before the wheat referendum on the basis of the latest available supply information.

If producers approve marketing quotas, under the proclamation announced, the national average support price available to eligible growers in the commercial area will be not less than the maximum support to be announced before the referendum. On the basis of the present supply of wheat and present legislation, the legal minimum wheat support price for the 1961 crop would be at 75 percent of parity.

Individual farm marketing quotas will be the normal production or the actual production from the farm acreage allotment, whichever is larger. Growers in the

commercial area who stay within their allotments will be eligible for price support on their entire production. Growers who exceed their acreage allotments will be subject to market quota penalties if they have more than 15 acres of wheat for harvest.

Growers who sign applications for exemption under the feed wheat provision permitting 30 acres or less to be used exclusively for feed on the farm will not be subject to marketing quota penalties.

If marketing quotas are not approved by the necessary two-thirds of the voting producers in the July 21 referendum, there will be no restrictions on wheat marketings. Acreage allotments

What makes a good buy?

Quantity buying. Lower unit price, a savings on separate delivery charges, and the convenience of fewer shopping trips may make quantity buying worthwhile. If quantity buying leads you to "over-buy", it may be an extravagance and not an economy.

Ask for specific amounts: Weights and measures are standard terms. Use them and you will get the amount for which you pay. A "pound" should not vary in weight; a "quarter's-worth" may vary in value depending on the person doing the weighing.

Recognize standards: Standards describe a product or its characteristics in terms that you will recognize and act as controls to insure constant uniformity in performance.

Read labels: The best labels tell what the product is made of, how it is made, what can be expected from the product in performance how to use, it and how to care for it, in addition to the name of the manufacturing or seller of the article.

Knox Prairie Philosopher Says He's Sorry Cities Are Not Growing Faster, But Just Don't Look To Him

Editor's note: The Knox Prairie Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm on Miller Creek reviews the census situation this week, without being very helpful.



Dear Editor:
Some of the preliminary census figures have been coming in, according to the newspapers I've been reading lately, and as I understand it a lot of towns and cities are downright miserable about it. Many of them want a recount.
Despite the fact a lot of cities already have more people than they can provide paved streets

for, some of them have more than they can provide police protection for, they still want to get bigger and bigger, and to have the census figures show their population gained only half as much as they figured it had, is a blow to civic pride. To have it actually show a decrease, is considered a major catastrophe. To have it double in size, is a cause for hand-springs.

I don't understand this. I've got as many people living around me as I want, and I figure most of my neighbors are as close to me as they care about being, but still I can't see where our country folks can be of much help to the towns and cities.

I mean, for the past twenty five years we've been culling as fast as we can, to where the farm population has dropped from 30 per cent of the total population of this country to only 10 per cent, but still the cities aren't satisfied. Oh, I'll admit, we might have a few stragglers and low producers left we could send into town to swell the census figures next time (don't look at me, I ain't going, even if I do qualify), but anybody who understands arithmetic knows that if our farmers just have 10 per cent of the population left, even if all of us moved to town, cities could show only a 10 per cent increase, and that won't pacify many chambers of commerce. Also, it would completely eliminate the farm problem, and how're you going to have a Presidential race without a farm problem?

Consequently, it looks like the problem from here on out is up to the towns and cities, if they insist on getting bigger and bigger. They'll have to use their own ingenuity. No use looking to us farmers. We're at the end of our rope. I ain't no expert in these matters, but it looks to me like the only way cities and towns can get bigger is to produce more.

COTTONSEED MARGINS OF COOPERATIVE GINS

Cottonseed, once a waste product of the cotton industry, has become an important agricultural product, which contributes to our economy in the form of human food, animal feed and other valuable products.

The competitive market position of cottonseed has been improved by major developments in processing along with improvement in cotton production. In 1959 the Texas cotton crop was valued at almost 737 million dollars at the farm level; and cottonseed accounted for over 72 million dollars of this total. Seed normally contributes 10 to 15 per cent of the total value of the cotton crop.

More seed go to the crushers every year and fewer seed are returned to the farm for feed. The modern cotton producer prefers to feed cake and hulls and to plant certified seed.

Cotton gins are practically the only market available to farmers for their cottonseed. The prices which gins receive from cottonseed all mills presumably determine the price farmers receive

from the gins for their cottonseed. However, the margins between the mill prices and prices paid farmers are affected by the operating methods of the gins for their cottonseed. However, practices, which in turn affect the costs of handling cottonseed.

A recent study by the department of Agricultural Economics and Sociology at College Station shows that seven factors in the cottonseed buying and selling practices of cooperative gins affect the gross margins on cottonseed. Four of these factors affect the margins directly and two are minor or contributing factors at all gins; one factor affects only cooperative gins. Seasonal price changes, purchase weights, mill grading and transportation allowances affect margins directly. Seasonal movement of cottonseed is correlated with seasonal price change. Harvesting methods contribute to gains or losses in the purchasing weights at the gins. At cooperative gins, the oil mill patron dividend on cottonseed purchases affects the margin.

By evaluating these factors, gingers should be able to im-

prove the efficiency of operations, thus lowering costs and enabling the gins to pay a greater proportion of the mill price to farmers.
