Rally day will be held in Seymour Park on July 12, and plans were made for recreation and a skit.

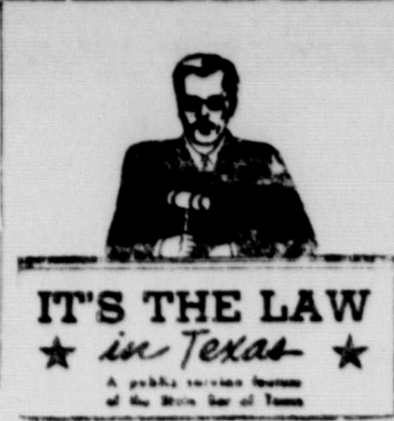
The program was given by a 4-H Club member, Melba Ritchie who demonstrated the method of making and served delicious coconut cookies. She gave the food value of all the ingredients used.

### PROTECTING THE RECORD

Monday morning quarterbacks always have brilliant hindsight. How well they can see the coaches' mistakes last week.

So, with a lawsuit! After the jury brings in its verdict, people can tell how your lawyer should have tried your case.

But, as with sports, it's hard to look forward into the swirl of moves and counter moves to see how a given move would make out in a trial.

What's worse, unless your lawyer objects and makes the proper motion, he may lose the right later to have the court strike a piece of damaging evidence from the record.

Fully to protect you, your lawyer must so fight your case that he could take it, if need be, "on the record" to a higher court by objecting then and there. That's why a lawyer may seem always to be objecting. He has to.

If he had not, for example, moved to "quash the indictment," or objected to certain evidence, the higher court might reject his appeal where your life, liberty or property may be at stake.

By court rules, the lawyer still had the duty of "protecting the record."

In the heat of a trial, your lawyer must always keep in mind the thoughtful justices on the appellate benches. For they may some day sit down calmly to review what he did or did not do in the excitement of the trial.

William Jennings Bryan in his presidential race of 1896, was denounced for his advocacy of "free silver" but, oddly enough his position was little different from that which his successful opponent, William McKinley, had held not long before.

McKinley's reversal is amusingly depicted in Oscar Ameringer's "If You Don't Weaken" (Henry Holt and Company). As a member of the band which welcomed the delegations who came to Canton, Ohio, to pledge their support to the Republican candidate, Ameringer heard the speeches which McKinley made in his "front porch" campaign.

On each occasion, the advocate of the gold standard would produce a silver dollar from his Prince Albert coat and say, "My fellow citizens, the opposition will tell you that this silver dollar represents 100 cents of American currency. Yet the same amount of silver contained in this dollar I hold in my hand will only purchase fifty-three cents' worth of merchandise in our sister republic across the Rio Grande."

The observer said that he knew that silver dollar well, because, a few years before, he had seen McKinley produce it, or one just like it, during a speech on the courthouse steps in Circleville. At that time, the speaker was running for governor and his declaration then was, "The opposition will tell you that the silver I am holding in my hand is worth only fifty-three cents. But I challenge any of my intelligent audience to walk into any store in the

city and convince himself that this silver dollar will purchase one cent less than 100 cents' worth of goods."

McKinley's switch was even more amusingly brought out in a story in Louis Brownlow's "A Passion for Politics" (University of Chicago Press). The author, himself a Democrat, had a cousin, Walter Brownlow, who was named as Tennessee's representative on the Republican National Committee in 1896. Someone protested to Mark Hanna, McKinley's campaign manager, that Brownlow was not for the gold standard but, on the contrary, had won the Republican Congressional nomination that very year on a free silver platform, and therefore should be removed from the national committee.

Hanna wrote to Brownlow, inquiring about the matter. Here is his reply in dialect which would have done credit to the pen of Artemus Ward or Petroleum V. Nasby:

"Dear Mr Hanna, I done got your letter. It is so that I made some speeches only this here past spring when I was arrunnin, for the Republican nomination for Congress. I hadn't never run for no office before, and I hadn't never made no speech. I knowed I didn't have sense enough to get me up a speech so I just thought I'd get a speech some other feller had made and get it by heart and just say it.

"I happened to pick a speech made by a fellow by the name of McKinley to the Stark County 'Ohio Farmers' Alliance a couple of years or so back.

"I aim to be mighty busy in this here campaign, but if Mc flops agin, just wire me Yours truly, Walter Freston Brownlow."

## Biologist Tells How To Start Ponds

Preliminaries for farm pond management are fully discussed in the current issue of Texas Game And Fish magazine, in an article prepared by C. R. Inman, aquatic biologist of the Game and Fish Commission.

"The objectives of any good lake management program are to control the species of fish present and to provide conditions for good fishing," Inman said.

He then lists five requirements. They include the eradication of wild or rough fish, construction designed to avoid introduction of unwanted fish; installation of drainpipes, preparation of the lake bottom; and proper stocking.

"The most common mistake made by lake owners is overstocking with fish," he cautions. "It is very important that the correct species and ratio of game fish be released in a new lake at the proper time."

"Since largemouth bass and channel catfish are the most popular pond game species, they should be stocked at a ratio of 150 bass to 50 catfish per surface acre of water. If at all possible, bass fry should be released in the spring or early summer to permit fast growth of the fish.

"If sunfish (bream) are to be stocked, not much more than 50 per acre should be stocked. These should be released during the late fall to prevent them from

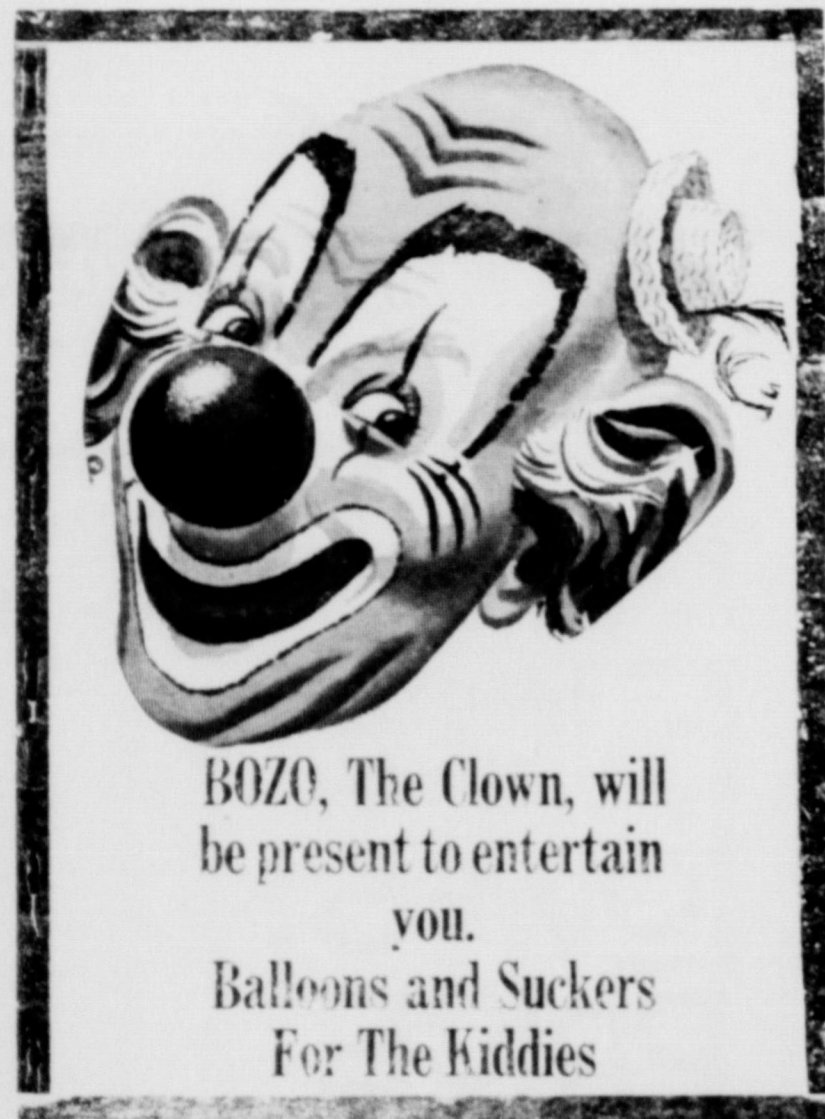

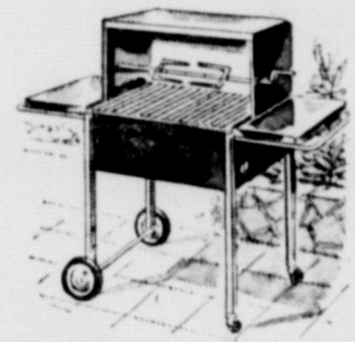

**IRRIGATION OF TEXAS SOILS**

The great demand for irrigation water makes soil and water management increasingly important in crop production.

Much more efficient use of the water and soil resources for crop production will be required if the dwindling water supplies are to be conserved and used most effectively. Since the competition among agriculture, industry, and municipalities for water will be come greater in the future, it will be necessary for each segment to make the most efficient use of its share of water if the public interests are to be served in the most effective manner.

When a farm changes from dry land to irrigation farming, he often overlooks the importance of the relationships which exist among soil, water and plants. Good irrigation practices also must take into account such important factors as soil fertility, amount and quality of water, adapted crops and varieties, land preparation for irrigation, water distribution over the land, irrigation timing to suit crop needs, rate of water application for a particular soil type, capacity of soils to store and release water, rates of seeding and root development and distribution within the soil storage reservoir for obtaining both water and plant nutrients.

The variable distribution of rainfall continues to be the most important factor affecting the yield and quality of crops in Texas. As a result, the irrigated acreage has grown from approximately 1 million acres in 1939 to about

7 million acres in 1959. This expansion has come about largely by individual development of ground-water resources.

Since soil and climatic conditions vary greatly over Texas, it is impossible to give a set of rules for irrigation which can be applied to every problem. However, by studying and considering all aspects of the interrelated soil-plant-water system, the irrigation farmer should be in a much better position to work out a suitable soil and water management program for his farm. It is of major importance that the irrigator be more concerned about what is taking place below the soil surface than he is about the conditions above it.

In many cases, special problems will exist on individual farms. Where they occur, it will be necessary to consider them on a local basis. If a farmer cannot cope successfully with a particular problem concerning soils and irrigation, he should consult a local representative of the state or federal agency concerned for additional technical help.
