## Farmers Form Corporation for Growing Certified Seeds; New Gin To Be Built

Realizing that the machine age for harvesting is here, a group of ten local farmers have organized a corporation known as the Knox Prairie Seeds, Inc., for the purpose of growing hybrid and certified seeds and to enter the machine age of harvesting and ginning cotton.

The group is composed of B. E. Smith, James Smith, Edward Smith, Leland Floyd, Omar Cure, Gene Thompson, John Earl Nelson, Lonnie Offutt, J. B. Reneau, Jr., and H. H. Partridge.

Various types of cotton to be harvested by machinery, both pickers and strippers, will be grown. In addition, they will grow hybrid corn and certified small grains.

They have purchased the 18-acre Ratliff property south of Munday, where the Munday Livestock Commission Co. was located, and have entered into a contract with Continental Gin Co., to construct a new and modern pure seed gin. The gin will have three stands with a ginning capacity of about 12 bales an hour, and will be equipped with all new and modern equipment.

Foundation for the gin office was laid last week, to be constructed by Munday Lumber Co. Construction on the gin plant is expected to begin around April 15.

All of the organizing group are directors. Officers are: Lonnie Offutt, president of the board; J. B. Reneau, vice president; Omar Cure, general gin manager, and H. H. Partridge, secretary and treasurer, and he will also handle the seed program.

The group will be growing cotton for the Texas Experiment Station, South Texas Planting Seed Assn., and the Gregg Seed Farm. Hybrid corn will be grown for the Texas Research Foundation and the Texas Experiment Station.

The group has entered this enterprise because weather conditions locally and a longer growing season makes this area more suitable for such a program than other areas.

## April 15 Deadline For Safety Sticker

Inspection Sticker!—Deadline?—Saturday midnight, April 15, 1961. Motorists are warned there is less than two weeks for procuring their new 1961 inspection sticker. This announcement was made by Captain Alan Johnson of the Motor Vehicle Inspection Service of the Texas Department of Public Safety.

Johnson pointed out that of the 544,419 vehicles registered in the 60 counties of this region only a little more than half of them have been inspected and approved. This means that in the last few days of inspection there will be long lines of cars and trucks waiting to be inspected.

Motorists are reminded that the inspection law prohibits inspections being made when it is raining or the streets are wet. So, it is possible that inclement weather could prevent inspection these last few days. "There will be no extension of the April 15 deadline for inspection," Johnson stated.

Anyone operating a motor vehicle after midnight April 15 without displaying a 1961 inspection sticker will be operating in violation of the law and subject to a fine not to exceed \$200 plus court cost.

## Tower-Blakley In Runoff For Post In Senate

Republican John Tower, 35, the stocky, handsome, friendly former college professor of Wichita Falls, and U. S. Senator William A. Blakley, who ran as a conservative Democrat, seemed certain Wednesday to be in a runoff for the U. S. Senate seat vacated by Vice-President Lyndon B. Johnson.

Returns announced by the Texas Election Bureau at near noon Wednesday showed Tower leading in the race but short of a majority necessary to avoid a runoff. The vote received by the six leading candidates at that time was:

Tower, 322,531; Blakley, 187,064; Wright, 167,304; Will Wilson, 118,661; Maverick, 103,343; Gonzalez, 95,816.

The date for the runoff has tentatively been set for June 3.

Congressman Jim Wright of Fort Worth received the nod of Knox County voters last Tuesday to become the highest man of the "big six" in the race for U. S. Senate.

Wright received a total of 358 votes, on the basis of unofficial returns. Senator William Blakley received 253 for the second highest spot in the county.

Running third in the race was the state's leader, John Tower of Wichita Falls, with 172 votes. Will Wilson was fourth with 111 votes.

Henry Gonzales received the least number of votes, 14, while Maury Maverick, Jr., received 31.

### SINCE HECTOR WAS A PUP

A leading American Oil Company\* summarized the history of the federal gasoline tax in chart form under the apt heading "A Temporary Bite That's Lasted Since Hector Was A Pup."

1932—First "temporary" federal gas tax of 1 cent a gallon, to expire in a year.

1933—"Temporary" tax extended for two years and "temporary" 1/2-cent was added. This addition was scheduled to expire with repeal of the 18th (Prohibition) Amendment. That actually happened in 1934, and the tax reverted to the still "temporary" 1-cent rate.

1935, 1937 and 1939—The "temporary" tax was extended on each date for two years.

1940—"Temporary" 1-cent tax was "temporarily" increased 1/2-cent.

1941—This "temporary" 1 1/2-cent tax was made permanent.

1951—Tax was increased "temporarily" to 2 cents, with the increase scheduled to expire March 31, 1954.

1954—"Temporary" increase renewed for one year.

1956—Tax was boosted to 3 cents because of the national highway program.

1959—Tax was increased "temporarily" to 4 cents—scheduled to expire June 30, 1961.

1960—Now the plan is to continue 4-cent rate and, if other highway tax measures proposed by the Administration are not approved by Congress, to add still another 1/2-cent.

State and federal gas taxes amount to about half the cost of the fuel less taxes. This is a far higher rate than that imposed on even absolute luxuries, such as diamonds and mink coats. If anyone has a completely justified tax gripe coming, it's the American motorist.

Medicine at Work, a publication of the Pharmaceutical Manufacturers Association, says: "A 40-year look into the future indicates health advances that go beyond the empirical—encompassing progress in medicine as it is entwined more and more intimately with such other fields as economics, religion, education, oceanography, electronics, cybernetics, sociology and international politics. Envisioned are successes in 'cures', medical stalemates in limbo, and challenges to health problems which have not yet even been posed."

### NO TIME TO INCREASE

It is significant that leading newspapers in areas where unemployment is greatest oppose both the proposed increase in the federal minimum wage, and extension of the wage-hour law to some 4.3 million workers who have always been exempt.

The Detroit Free Press is one of these papers. The principal danger in the bills, it observes, is in the extension of coverage. In its words, "The 4.3 million . . . work in smaller businesses and retail establishments. Waitresses, janitors, dime store clerks would be affected. Many of these have nothing to do with interstate commerce, the only legal justification for federal action. In many cases, jobs worth \$1 an hour such as the full-time janitorial and coffee-carrying job in a small plant, would be cut back to part time, thereby lowering, not raising, the take-home pay."

"In the restaurant business, for instance, where split shifts, overtime, rapid turnover and peak hour employment already account for a high labor cost in proportion to the volume, there is simply not enough money to pay an extra quarter an hour."

There is nothing carping about these views. No one is against good wages and working conditions. But when wages are arbitrarily raised, without regard to productivity, trouble is inevitable. To quote the Free Press' conclusion: "With five million people unemployed and the economy in a slump; with President Kennedy warning against the dangers of inflation, this would hardly seem the time to increase the pressure."

### FAITH PLUS MONEY

L. W. Moore, president of the American Oil Company, says: "Whatever the short-range outlook—and it seems to change from day to day and from expert to expert—we believe this country is going to continue to grow at a healthy rate. We are not only putting our faith in the future, but our money as well."

Moore said the petroleum industry and the competitive system under which it operates deserve a "vote of confidence" from American consumers. As he puts it, "While the cost of living has soared to unprecedented heights, the price of regular grade gasoline today—not counting tax—is lower than it has been for eight years and the quality is greatly improved."

## Chips From The Carpenter's Workbench

### FARM GROCERY MARKET

There is a persistent conviction among many city dwellers that no farmer or his wife ever should have any business in a grocery store except to buy coffee, salt, perhaps a little sugar and the like.

They still carry the vision of the farmer with his own vegetable garden, his own orchard, milking his own cows, gathering his own fresh eggs, and so forth and so on.

Bill Durham, the astute agricultural editor of the Houston Post, did something to dispel this concept not long ago with one of his columns elaborating on an article in Food Business, a publication for the food manufacturing, processing and marketing business.

"Apparently," Durham commented, "these people still thought that every farm had a garden and a milk cow and that all the purchases from the grocery store involved only coffee, flour and corn meal. Farm Journal magazine did a lot of work in getting information together on the importance of the farm market for food stores."

"Farmers and those who serve them have failed to get across the story that agriculture is big business and that today's farmer must be one of the most shrewd and astute business men in the economy."

"You just can't find a commercial farmer in the Houston area who doesn't have a capital investment of less than \$50,000. In most cases it amounts to more than that. You can find a lot of people in business in Houston who don't have to stand that kind of financing."

It was pointed out that, as a matter of fact, farm women buy more when they go to the store than do women who live in town. The reason is that they serve more food—a farm woman fixes three big meals a day. Feeding a bunch of men who are doing hard work in the field just naturally takes more groceries.

In 1960, it was figured that people living on farms consumed \$3.5 billion in food products, and these supplies were bought in retail stores. One of the points that may have been confusing to the food industry was the preference which farm women showed for convenience foods such as cake mixes, frozen foods, and the other new items offered in the super-markets.

One of the reasons for this, perhaps, is that today's farm housewife engages in almost the same activities as does her sister in the cities. She belongs to the P.T.A., has her church activities, and is often a leader in various women's clubs. Cultural activities also are a part of the rural scene these days.

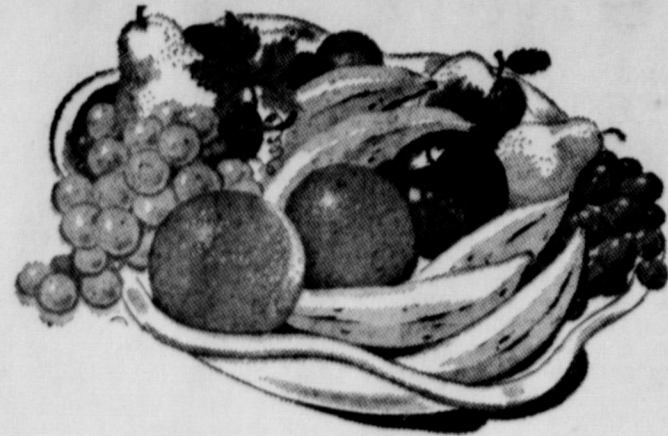

### Lateral Oiling Can Cut Cotton Production Costs

Like to save up to \$25 an acre on labor costs on this year's cotton crop?

Lateral oiling for grass and weed control is the answer, says Glenn Black, extension cotton specialist. He points out that a once-over application of naphtha costs only a dollar to a dollar and a half an acre for material compared with more expensive hand hoeing.

Black recommends spraying seedling grass and tender weeds in young cotton with 5 gallons of naphtha an acre. The first application can be made when the cotton is 7 to 10 days old. Be careful, he adds, and apply the spray below the leaves of the cotton plant. Cotton plants have enough growth and natural wax on the stalks at this stage to shed the naphtha without injury while the grass and weeds are killed.

Other applications, at 7 to 10 day intervals, may be used if needed. Stop oiling, he warns, when the cotton is 5 to 6 weeks old or when bark begins to form on the stalks or damage to the cotton may

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occur.

This practice, Black says, was used on over 71,000 acres in 75 Texas counties last year where the cotton was rolled at planting time or rotary hoed later to prepare a smooth surface for the operation.

Parallel action oiling shoes for a 2-row set-up are available and can be connected to a low volume insect spray rig.

Local county agricultural agents, advises Black, can supply detailed information on this cost-cutting cotton production practice.

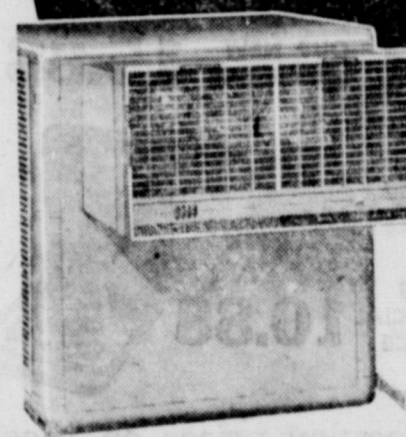

**Dollars And Sense**

General guides for refrigerator storage. Remove market wrapping paper from fresh meat, poultry and fish. Store unwrapped or loosely wrapped, in moisture proof paper in the coldest part of refrigerator.

Wash and trim all vegetables. A little moisture left on vegetables is desirable. Store in moisture proof wrap or a food crisper. Fruits are best when stored unwashed as moisture may make them soggy.

Store milk, cream and cheese in original container. Reseal or rewrap tightly after each use. Wash or wipe milk cartons or bottles before storing them.

Use food which has been in storage longest before using newly purchased food.

Check refrigerator frequently for "Forgotten" items.

Take foods from refrigerator just before cooking or serving, and refrigerate left-overs as soon after meals as possible.

## Weekly Health LETTER

Issued by the State Health Department

Diphtheria managed to strike down 95 young Texans in January and February, State Health Department records show, despite the fact that measures for controlling it are well-known and effective.

The 1960 toll reached 239. That's 76 cases above the 5-year median, and 63 cases more than were reported during the previous year.

While worrisome to state and local health officials, the 1960 figure is by no means a record, even for recent years, but it is highly significant when individual cases are studied: 164 of the victims had had no immunizing shots whatever, and 38 had been inadequately immunized. Only 16 had received the full course of protective shots.

Therein lies a basic truth concerning communicable diseases and their control: outbreaks are products of neglected immunizations.

Other parts of the world are having similar flare-ups. An outbreak is reportedly in progress in Santiago, Chile.

Is diphtheria dangerous? Certain types can be quickly lethal. In some epidemics the death rate may reach as high as 12 percent, but it is more commonly two to five percent.

In communities where immunizations have been neglected, studies show that about one-fourth of all cases and one-half to all deaths are among children under five. On the other hand, when childhood immunizations have been adequate but reinforcing shots neglected, older persons are more often the victims.

Diphtheria today is probably the same disease which cut down great numbers of children in Egypt during the second century and faithfully described by learned men of that early day.

Its germs characteristically invade the body's mucous membranes—usually in the throat.

They remain localized but grow and multiply and exude a poison which produces typical symptoms.

Recovery from one attack of diphtheria usually, but not always, confers an immunity against a second attack.

The only effective control against the disease is active immunizations of whole populations, on schedules advised by family physicians. Reinforcing shots are essential during pre-trance into school, and optional throughout school life and early adulthood.
