The Attorney General goes ahead to say that no method of marking is declared to be illegal, so long as the intent of the voter is evident to the election judges. But a word of caution is given regarding the crossmarks.

The voter should make sure they extend far enough in both directions to insure marking out the names of the candidates who are opposed; and that they do not run into the name of the person who is to be voted for.

#### **New Education And** Scholarship Program

The American Legion's educational handbook, "Need a Lift?" containing hundreds of college and vocational school sholarships for qualified high school students of this area has been presented to Munday High School and Munday Public Library by Lowry Post No. 44 of the American Legion.
