It was fifteen per cent greater than the whole farm income of New England in 1946. It was 40 per cent greater than the total education budgets of all American cities of more than 25,000 population in 1945. It was greater than all the tax revenwes received by New York State in 1947. And finally, it was about equal in dollar value to the total payroll of the transit industry in 1946, the wages of the whole light and power industry in the same year, and the net income of all American railroads in 1914.

Even that is only part of the story-and the smallest part. The \$693,000,000 was direct, calculable loss. The indirect loss, which cannot be precisely measured, is estimated to be two to three times as great. It is totaled in lost jobs, wages and taxes; in diminished production, and in all the other wastes that go with fire.

Intensified research is being carried on in new Lone Star Engineering Development Laboratory, Dallas, pictured above.


