The wearing of the Poppy has special meaning for each of us. I think of the young boy who came from a broken home. My husband and I tried to give him the affection and counseling he so desperately sought. Bill answered his country's call and was lost in battle on Guadalcanal. Bill's life held much promise, that of a home, a family—yet he gave his full measure of devotion that we might live in freedom.

Then one day while distributing Poppies, a man with a beaming face approached me and said, "May I wear a Poppy, please? I once helped make Poppies and I know what the Poppy means to the hospitalized veteran." This man wore a Poppy in remembrance of long hours made less lonely by the task of using his hands to fashion the flowers and being cheered by the thought of additional funds to supplement his family's needs.

Our hearts beat a little faster on Poppy Day. This is a memorable day for the people of America. This is the day when Poppies are worn and cherished as an offering of faith and remembrance to our war heroes who through unselfish service made it possible for free men to remain free.

We, in this great nation, have much to remember. Our American Heritage has been dearly bought through sacrifices made by the fallen heroic dead, the living veteran and the veteran's widow and family. We will not break faith—our faith lives on through the Poppy as a living symbol of thankfulness for the peace that abides in our land.

## Accidents Cause \$535 In Damages

The Highway Patrol investigated 2 rural accidents in Knox County during the month of April, according to Sergeant Frank Jirik Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These wrecks accounted for a property damage of \$535.00. This brings the total for 1961 in this county to four injured, and property damage of \$4,075.00.

"A driver who learns and complies with traffic laws can never prevent as many accidents as a driver who learns and complies with both traffic laws and defensive driving procedures," the sergeant stated. A traffic law describes what a driver must do or not do. Procedure describes ways in which a driver can comply with the law or do something extra that will increase his safety and prevent congestion.

"For example, the law says that no person shall park a vehicle upon the paved or main-traveled part of the highway. A driver complies with this law on a rural highway when his car barely clears the pavement. Procedure, in this instance, when possible or reasonable would require the driver to park a greater distance from the pavement," the sergeant explained.

## County Clerk To Receive Fees For Notaries Public

Secretary of State Frank Lake announced that all qualified Notaries Public desiring re-appointment for the new term ending June 1, 1963 must re-qualify by the payment of the required fee and the filing of a new oath and bond with the County Clerk of his residence between June 1, 1961 and June 10, 1961.

Lake emphasized that Notaries Public should not send requests for re-appointment or for commissions directly to the Secretary of State. The law specifically requires that the County Clerk approve notary bonds.

Any person not now a Notary Public who desires appointment should apply to his County Clerk between April 1, 1961 and May 20, 1961. Application during this period will assure prompt attention before the rush procedure of re-appointing present Notaries.

The Secretary of State further pointed out that each person applying for a commission as a Notary Public must be at least 21 years of age and a resident of the county for which he is appointed. The exact name and permanent address of the applicant must be furnished the County Clerk.

### ASKING FOR TROUBLE

Everyone, to say the completely obvious, would like to make more money—to get a greater return for whatever goods or services he produces. But attempts to make more money by purely arbitrary and artificial means usually lead to a dead-end street.

In 12 of the Midwest states the members of a new farm organization have combined to hold livestock off the market, in order to create scarcity and so force prices up. If they should be successful, says the Chicago Daily news, the price of pork chops would increase from the 1960 average of 86 cents a pound to \$1.04, and bacon would rise from last year's 65 cent average to 79 cents. Other livestock products would show comparable jumps.

Outside observers doubt very much if this effort can succeed. For one thing, animals can't be kept off the market indefinitely. They must be fed, and they continue to grow. If marketed late, in a too-heavy, too-fat state, they bring reduced prices per pound.

Even leaving that practical problem aside, the wisdom of these farmers is seriously open to doubt. The artificially-induced price boosts, if they should come, would hit all consumers—and there are a great many more consumers than farmers. Resentment against this form of price-fixing would be enormous.

Any group which tries to undermine the free market is asking for trouble—in the form of tough legislation and regulation.

### WARNING SIGNALS FLASHING

Every time government forces wage increases on the public by law, it automatically forces prices increases, no matter what argument is used to disguise this effect.

As the process is repeated over and over, the inevitable day comes when government will set not only wages, but prices by law—then the free market, free labor, free industry and freedom of action in our daily lives is gone. And all this will be done step by step, ostensibly in behalf of the "common man" who, before he knows it, winds up the pawn of a dictator governor.

Over the centuries this process has been repeated time and time again. In a short life-time millions of people over the world have seen the "common man" who, in reality, is all men, engulfed by big government until his freedom was

wiped out by bureaucracy, and the beneficent benefits promised left him a helpless ward of the state.

Government is being injected more and more into the affairs of private citizens and industry in the United States. It is promoted in many ways generally with strings attached, which restrict or remove individual opportunity. How far will we permit it to go in our own land? We are not immune from the penalties exacted by it.

### BILLS FOR CHILDREN

The council of State Chambers of Commerce has tallied the price of proposed new major spending programs. It finds that, if passed, these cost would average \$3.2 billion a year for the next few years and reach \$5.2 billion by fiscal 1966.

The Federal budget, estimated by President Eisenhower at \$80.9 billion for 1962 and subsequently increased by President Kennedy to \$84.3 billion, would certainly reach \$90 billion by fiscal 1965 and possibly by 1964.

Following the Soviet achievement in putting an astronaut into space, President Kennedy, speaking at a press conference, said: "I do not regard the first man in space as a sign of the weakening of the free world, but I do regard the total mobilization of men and things for the service of the Communist bloc over the last years as a source of great danger to us, and I would say we are going to have live with that danger through much of the rest of this century. . . . Our job is to maintain our strength until our great qualities can be brought more effectively to bear."

The Health Information Foundation observes that one of the most important results of medical progress in this century has been a large increase in the average American's working-life expectancy. An American male baby born in 1958 had a working-life expectancy of 42.3 years—11.2 years over the comparable figure for a baby born in the 1900-02 period.

As of last June, the Department of Defense had about 100,879 acres of airfield pavements, about 166,155 acres of roads and streets, and approximately 13,200 acres of covered depot storage space. Cost of this acreage was \$6.9 billion.

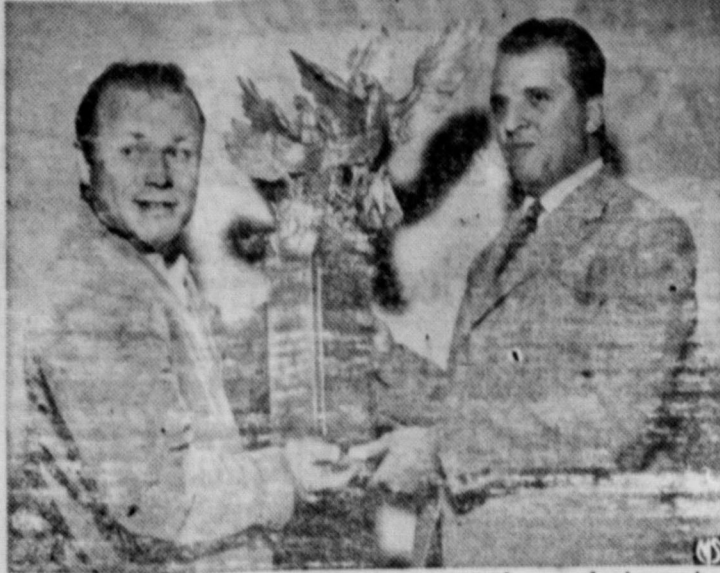

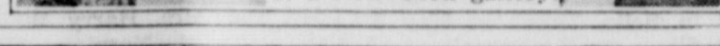

**It's the Law in TEXAS**

**A MAN WITHOUT A COUNTRY**

In the past a person could lose his citizenship largely because he wanted to; but of late one could lose it against his will by "expatriation."

Before 1900 the courts said; "No persons can by their own act, without the government's consent, put off their allegiance and become aliens."

In 1870 the U. S. and Great Britain, and later with Germany, agreed that naturalization in the one nation meant loss of citizenship in the other. Soon afterwards, courts also held that a citizen could give up U. S. citizenship at will, and the next question was when it could be taken away.

Under a 1907 federal law, certain acts could mean expatriation: one's swearing allegiance to a foreign nation; a woman's marrying an alien, a naturalized citizen abroad for a certain number of years.

In 1940 (later amended in 1952) the U. S. broadened the laws to cover new acts that could deprive one of his citizenship.

1. By willing foreign military service. One citizen in Japan before World War II was drafted

in the Japanese army. After the war, the U. S. tried to take away his citizenship, but the court said no: The citizen must have served willingly; if he were forced into Japanese service, no one could take away his citizenship.

2. By voting in a foreign election. One U. S. citizen voted in a Mexican election (as Mexican law permitted). The U. S. took away his citizenship.

Why?

By voting a citizen may encourage conduct against the U. S. interests.

3. By treason or desertion in war time. But in one such case the Supreme Court found expatriation so severe as to be "cruel and unusual" punishment in violation of the Constitution.

4. There are other acts which endanger one's citizenship such as leaving the country to evade military service in time of national emergency.

## Notes From Knox Farms, Ranches

By Jack Moore, Knox County Agent

### Grasshopper Infestations

A good many of the people in the Benjamin area have had a heavy infestation of grasshoppers in their lawns and in the lots and pastures near their homes. There are several good insecticides that are recommended for the control of this destructive insect. The application can be made with several types of sprayers.

Wade House of Benjamin is using a cattle sprayer and Merick McGaughey, also of Benjamin, is using a pump-up type sprayer. Dieldrin is recommended for non-agricultural land or land that is in the conservation reserve only. In addition, persons can use Aldrin, Heptachlor or Toxaphene on both pastures and non-agricultural land.

Malathion and Sevin are also recommended for pastures; however, there are restrictions that apply to the application of insecticides to agricultural land and a person is advised to see their County Agent for these regulations. The rate the insecticides are to be applied depends upon the use of the land and the grazing practices being used by ranchers. Persons applying insecticides should take personal safety precautions prescribed.

### Animal Health Law

The Texas Animal Health Commission has added several new counties to their growing list of counties that come under the Brucellosis program. Mitchell and Scurry counties qualified for modified certification in April.

Cleanup testing is in progress in Brown, Concho, Cottle, El Paso, Fisher, King, Kinney, Martin, Stephens and Taylor counties. Initial testing is in progress in Baylor, Edwards, Nolan, and Oldham counties.

### Gas Tax Refund Forms

Form 2240 Claim for Refund of Federal Tax on Gasoline Used on a Farm is now available from the County Agent's office and can be obtained upon request. The refund is for gasoline used for farm purposes from June 30, 1960 and before July 1, 1961.

## Ranchmen Should Become Alert To Invaders Of Plants

B. J. Ragsdale, associate extension range specialist, reports that he has received many inquiries regarding certain poisonous plants which have created serious rangeland problems in other states and countries. Two of these plants, Halogeton and Alfombrillo, have received much attention lately, and many questions have been asked about them.

Halogeton has been reported in the states of California, Nevada, Idaho, Wyoming and Colorado. It is found on salty soils of semi-arid regions, especially where the soils have been disturbed and the native plant cover reduced. Sheep are the most frequent sufferers of Halogeton poisoning, but cattle may be affected. Livestock seldom eat toxic amounts of this plant if other desirable forage is available, Ragsdale says.

Ranchers of northern Mexico consider Alfombrillo to be their greatest poisonous plant problem, continues Ragsdale. This plant is reported only in the states of Chihuahua and Sonora, Mexico. It has been found within 7 miles of Antelope Wells, New Mexico, 85 miles southwest of El Paso, and 20 miles south of the Arizona border, but there is no known record of it north of the border. Alfombrillo requires a slightly acid soil, and according to research conducted to date, the soils in the border areas of Texas are alkaline.

To date, neither Halogeton nor Alfombrillo present a problem to Texas ranchers. But, Ragsdale concludes that ranchmen should be on the alert for range invader plants. Local county agents should be notified of findings.

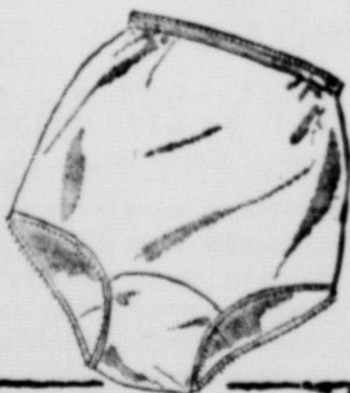
