Two afternoon meetings are to be held, one in the Vera community at 2:00 and the last one in the Gilliland area about 4:00. Locations of the meetings are now being arranged.

Irrigation Field Day

Water Board Okays Miller Creek Permit

Announcement was made Tuesday that the State Board of Water Engineers approved last Monday the application of the North Central Texas Municipal Water Authority to construct a dam and reservoir on Miller Creek in Baylor County, approximately 15 miles east of Munday. This is the proposed reservoir which will supply Haskell, Rule, Munday, and Goree with water.

Board members Otha Dent and Durwood Manford both voted to approve the application. However, it was amended slightly

from that originally sought by the Authority.

The reservoir will still be of 25,000 acre-feet capacity, but the annual appropriation for Miller Creek was cut down from 6,500 acre-feet to 5,000 acre-feet.

The Authority had previously asked for 3,500 acre-feet to be used for municipal purposes, 1,500 acre-feet for industrial and 1,500 for mining.

The application as approved by the board cuts the industrial appropriation to 1,000 acre-feet and mining portion to 500 acre-feet annually.

The board's decision climaxed a heated two-day hearing in Austin some two weeks ago, in which a number of Haskell residents hotly contested the Authority's application.

Accidents Cause \$1,175 In Damages During Last Month

The highway patrol investigated 3 accidents on rural highways in Knox County during the month of May, according to Sgt. Frank Jirick, highway patrol supervisor of this area.

These wrecks accounted for one person injured, and a property damage of \$1,175.00.

This brings the total for the first five months of 1961 in this county to 16 rural traffic crashes resulting in no persons being killed, five injured, and a combined property damage amounting to \$5,250.00.

After noting the accident picture for this county for the first five months of this year, the Sergeant pointed out another significant fact. As summer approaches with longer days and additional good driving weather, the driver should be especially aware of the danger period at dusk. Many accidents happen during this period. One cause of this is the driver fails to turn his lights on soon enough.

Although the law sets out when lights must be turned on, the driver should also use his own good judgement. Any time a driver cannot see an unlighted object approximately one-half mile away, he should turn his lights on. He may be able to see the other driver, but can the other driver see you?

IMPERILING PUBLIC HEALTH

A proposed Congressional bill, according to its sponsors, is designed to encourage more competition in the drug industry. But the chances are that it would weaken the ability of this industry to produce new and better drugs, to the imperilment of the public health.

For instance, certain of its provisions would alter the American patent system so far as drugs are concerned. The holder of a prescription drug patent would be compelled to license other companies to manufacture the product only three years after an original patent is granted. It doesn't take a genius to understand what the result would be. Why would any company risk huge amounts of money in research, a hazardous operation at best, if any chance of recouping the investment was thus minimized?

The bill also would make mandatory the "proving" of superior efficacy before a patent could be obtained on many new drugs. That is next to impossible. Individual responses to certain drugs, for example, have the most important of bearings on which is most effective. In some cases, a given drug may be effective for most patients—but may do nothing whatever for others. Blanket rules just can't be set down. Only the physician in close contact with the patient can prescribe what is best. And no government board could determine the comparative value of preparations used to treat little understood conditions, such as arthritis and mental illness, whose diagnosis and treatment are often more art than science.

The ethical pharmaceutical industry spent \$215 million for research last year. It could hardly be expected to keep up the pace if the proposed law were passed. Then sufferers would be deprived of potential discoveries of the utmost value.

SHRUNKEN WORLD

Fortunately, not all legislative proposals are controversial. Some are given near-unanimous support. That seems to be the case with the bill to establish an office of International Travel. Offices will be located in key locations abroad, with the purpose of encouraging travel to this country and to provide interested people with information they want and need.

We have been the only nation of any consequence without such a travel service. That lack has been costly. We suffered what might be termed a "travel deficit" of about a million dollars last year. That was the difference between what American tourists spent abroad and visitors from

abroad spent with us. It is one reason why our gold reserves declined.

Moreover, the government is taking some other long needed steps. It is relaxing old and needless rules which discouraged and sometimes even insulted prospective tourists to this country, and is simplifying the visa procedure.

The jet airplane has shrunk the world. European recovery has given great numbers of people the wherewithal to visit the United States. Steps that can be taken to capitalize on this are all to the good. And—most important—meetings and minglings of peoples of many nations have a positive bearing on the great cause of world peace and understanding.

BUSINESS IN A FREE SOCIETY

"Freedom is indivisible. Any act which deprives an individual of some portion of his freedom is a threat to all who enjoy these freedoms.

"In a sense, free enterprise as a system is suspect in the minds of many. But this is a reflection of the past. Every freedom possessed by man has a history of license—man has always had to learn to live responsibly with whatever degree of freedom possessed."

These words were spoken by Charles H. Kellstadt, Chairman of the Board of Sears Roebuck and Company, at the ground-breaking ceremony for the American Freedom Center of Freedoms Foundation at Valley Forge, which will include a library to be known as the Sears Roebuck Library.

Mr. Kellstadt dealt at some length with the responsibilities and duties of business in a free society. And of the free enterprise system he said: "It is the customer's freedom to choose; business' freedom to compete, that makes a free market—one means nothing without the other. An enterprise which does not respect the customer's freedom has no claim for respect of its own freedom." This is a truth which can be overlooked only at grave peril.

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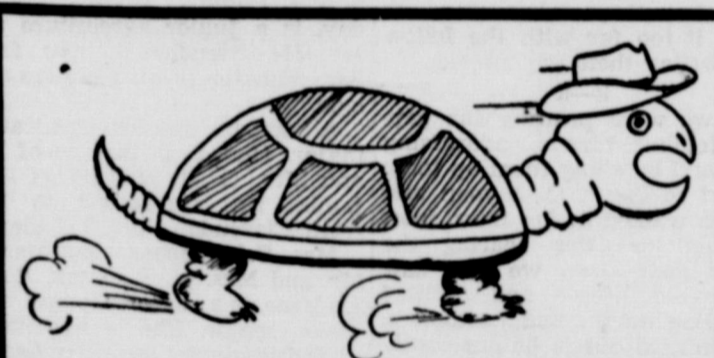

New Laws Passed On Fish And Game

The recently completed Regular Session of the 57th Legislature saw the introduction of 108 bills pertaining to fish and game, of which 65 became laws.

Among the new laws of statewide interest is one permitting certain incapacitated persons to hunt from a vehicle (except from public roads.), provided their incapacity is authenticated, in writing, by a licensed physician; a law requiring deer tags to bear the date and place of kill; one prohibiting the possession or transportation of live coypu (nutria) without written permission of the Game and Fish Commission, and a law classifying the sandhill crane as a game bird.

Washington County was removed from the list of counties under Regulatory Authority, but 16 counties were added to the 105 still participating in the program, to bring the net total to 121. In addition, Precinct 4 of Tyler County was placed under Regulatory Authority, as was that portion of Lake Texoma lying in Cooke and Grayson Counties, and the Northeast portion of Matagorda Island. Also, the Commission was given regulatory responsibility over doe deer in San Saba County.

A Digest summarizing the general game and fish laws is being prepared for distribution early this fall.



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

Knox Prairie Philosopher Tries His Hand At Writing A Speech For The 1961 Graduates, But Gives Up

Editor's note: The Knox Prairie Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm on Miller Creek meets a difficult problem this week, and then sidesteps.

Dear editor:

A friend of mine who didn't have much to do and less on his mind stopped by out here the other day and after complaining about the weather and high taxes said: "Say, if you were making a speech to a class of graduating students, what would you say?" This is like asking somebody who has just gone bankrupt how he would pay off the national debt, and I ignored the question, but after he left I got to thinking about it.

Later on in the day I read a newspaper account of a speech a man made to a bunch of university graduates, and he painted the picture of the world as so serious, so grave, so fraught with dangers and momentous uncertainties, so filled with the possibilities of the destruction of man if the wrong decisions are made, that for a moment my advice to anybody graduating from school this spring was:

Don't do it. Get back in school. It's too dangerous out here in the world.

You'd think somewhere, sometime, a speaker would tell a graduating class: "This is a fine, wonderful world we've arranged for you. Be sure to take care of it," but so far none of them has had the nerve. They just warn 'em what's out there, then duck.

But then I got to thinking. If the present world, under the type of management us adults have been giving it, hasn't blown up, it ought to be safe for graduates to come on out and see what they can do with it.

Of course it won't be much, but then the standards already set aren't too high anyway. Personally, I have never felt

uneasy about turning over the world to a new set of graduates. In the first place, they don't have nearly the effect on the world as they figured they would. Doesn't make any difference how much education a graduate has, the world just doesn't seem too impressed at the start, and frequently not at the finish.

When it comes to giving advice to graduates, I shut the gate and retire to the back side of this Johnson grass farm.

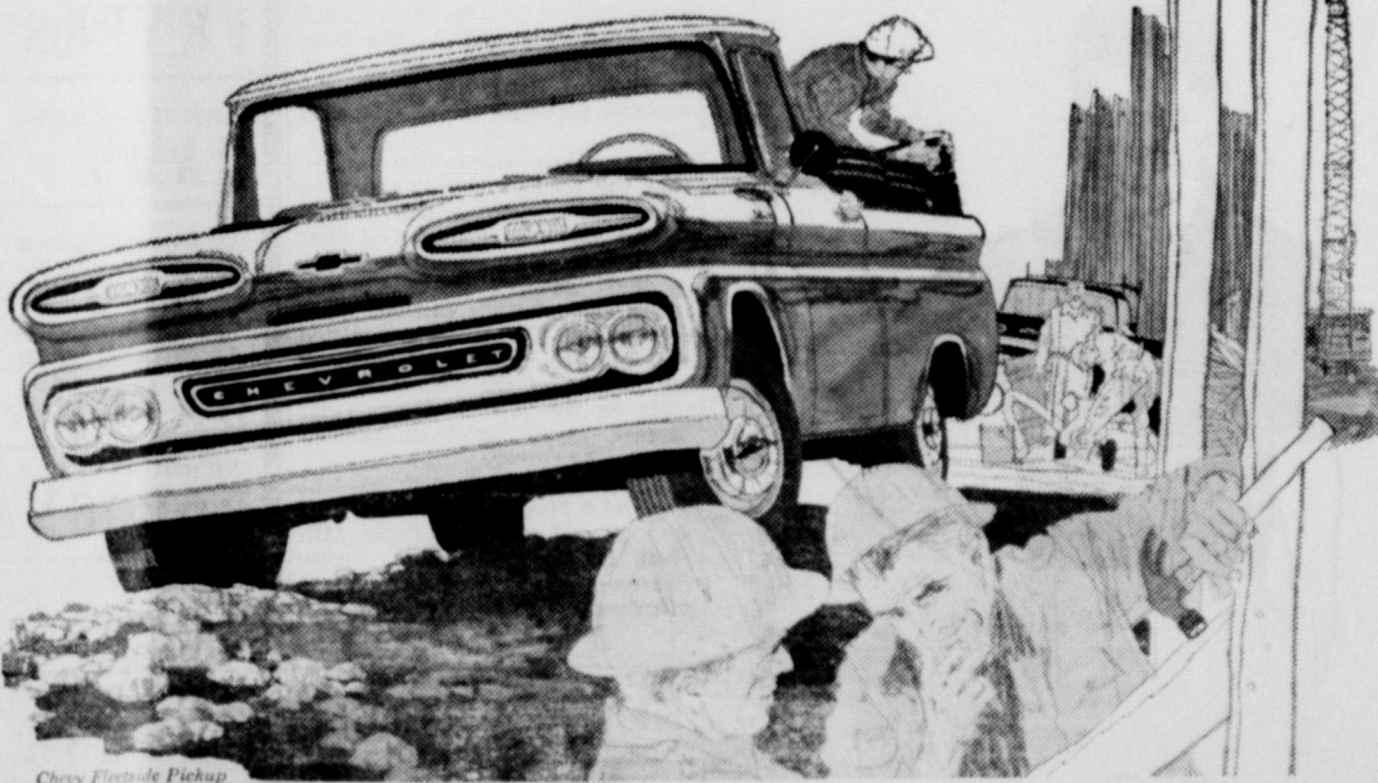

on Saturday, June 17. Secretary Freeman will attend a luncheon in Temple, Texas, and drive from Temple to Rosebud where he will make a major agricultural policy speech at 3:00 p.m. The scene of this speech is the football stadium at Rosebud.

Local arrangements committee at Rosebud is planning a parade and other events prior to Secretary Freeman's 3:00 p.m. speech. As additional information is available in regard to the Secretary's visit, it will be made known.

Grain Sorghum Variety Tests

The Crops Committee of Knox County planned several varieties tests of grain sorghum and forage sorghum tests this last year, and have several of the tests now planted. There will be two late grain and one late forage test planted and there is one early forage and four grain tests that have been planted.

Bob Partridge has the largest test plot and reports that there are two varieties that have come into full head and one of the varieties is now in the full bloom stage. There are several varieties now in the boot. Bob planted his test plot on the 17th of April. On May 21, NK120 was in full head and came into full bloom on June 8, while an experimental variety Nk X-3021, came into full head on June 1. Bob's test is located near the Partridge home in the Sunset community.

Other test plots are located in the Rhineland community at the farms of Alfonse Dehuler and Clarence Herring. One test plot is located on the farm of H. A. Reeves in the Gilliland community. Sam Leaverton of Benjamin plans to have an irrigated plot in Benjamin, and B. E. Smith plans to have a test plot on his farm in the Munday-Goree area. Lloyd Griffith of Benjamin has a forage test plot that is off to a good start.

The crops committee stated that the results of this one year test could not give a true picture of the varieties tested and that this will be a continuing test for at least several years so that seasonal variations can be better determined. The crops committee will plan to have a public meeting at one of the demonstration plots on the 3rd of August and discuss grain sorghum production in the county.

The committee is composed of Arnold Navarati as chairman with Sam Leaverton, Billie Mitchell, Lester Hickman, Fuller Shannon, and Gaylon Scott as members.
