TALK AND TAXES

"Risk-taking and economic growth are not going to be stimulated by squeezing more money out of the pockets of millions of investors, already discriminated against by unfair double tax-

These words come from Keith Funston of the New York Stock Exchange. The double taxation he speaks of is levied against anyone who receives a return on his invested savings in the form of dividends. First, the profit of a company is taxed productive facilities on earth would be useless if at the corporation rate of 52 per cent; then any remainder paid in dividends is taxed again as individual income.

Some years ago Congress granted a modicum of relief, by excluding the first \$50 of dividend income from the individual income tax, and allowing a 4 per cent tax credit on any beyond that. It is now proposed that even this be abolished. Oone strange argument in favor of abolishment is that the exclusion and credit do not grant adequate relief and are unimportant. Mr. Funston replies that to abolish it on such grounds" . . . is like taking a thimbleful of water away from a thirsty man because it is not enough to quench

And never think that dividend income is the concern only of the well-to-do. The last census of stockholder's found that they numbered 12.5 million people. Of these 3.5 million had incomes of less than \$5,000 and another 6 million were in the \$5,000-\$10,000 range.

It is certainly true that the present law does not give adequate relief. But that is an argument for increasing the exclusion and the credit-not

for reducing or doing away with them. People with faith in the future and savings to invest deserve encouragement not the penalities of a short sighted government that talkes growth, and taxes it to death in the same breath.

Chips From The Carpenter's Workbench

velent in the religious world today results from doctrines and practices not taught in the Bible. In other words, men are divided more over what the Bible does not teach, than what it does teach.

For example, the scriptures are silent on the practice of infant baptism. The Bible does not teach, nor infer, the immersion of infants. To adopt such a practice is to do so without the authority of God as revealed in his word. On the other hand, the Bible does teach believer's baptism (Mark 16:15-16). first American flag? Historians are not quite sure.

The first public assertion that she did appeared in a paper read before the Historical Society of Pennsylvania in March of 1870 by her grandson, William J. Can-by. But Mr. Canby later found no official documents of any action by Congress on the flag before June 14, 1777.

Betsy's own story, related by her daughter, was that George Washington, along with Congressional representatives Robert Morris and George Ross, visited Philadelphia in June of 1776, showing her a sketch of the flag

and asking her to make one.

The only record of flags made
by Betsy Ross is a voucher in
Harrisburg, Pennsylvania, for 14 pounds and several shillings for flags made for the Pennsylvania
