Yes. In the eyes of the sales tax law you are a retailer. However, most, perhaps all, of your flown by private plane to Baylor ing the service. sales will be exempt because you are selling to persons who then re-sell to the general public. When your customers buy from you, they will sign a re-sale certificate designed by the Comptroller (it may be something you can just print on your usual invoice so as not to have extra paper-handling) and this will be your evidence that no tax is due on the transaction.

I am a manufacturer. How will this tax affect my business?

You will not have to pay the tax on your raw materials-that is on the component parts of move the bullet "at this time." what you manufacture. If you rent IBM or Remington Rand electronic equipment, you will have to pay the tax on the rental you pay for that equipment.

I am a printer. How will this tax affect my business?

All football fans are letterheads for a business firm, urged to attend the game. you will have to collect the tax on the total amount of the sale, assuming you provided the paper. If the customer supplied the paper and you just did the printing, then the tax would be due for that service. There are some exceptions: If you print paper bags then that would not be a taxable transaction since wrapping supplies and containers are

I am a building contractor. How will this tax affect my business?

You will be viewed as the consumer of the tangible personal property which goes into your construction. This means that you will pay the tax on the lumber, nails and bricks, as well as on your equipment, tools, etcetera. Since you cannot collect the tax when you sell the construction (it now being real estate and not subject to tax) you will have to allow for the tax expense when you quote prices. There's an easy and obvious answer--impose new taxes or increase existing taxes.

However, that answer is not alwys a true one. For the law of diminishing returns can apply to taxation as well as to other matters.

Take, as a prime example, the gasoline taxstate and federal combined now average some 10 provisions vary for "executives," "administrators" cents a gallon, or about half the retail price of

> This excessive tax, an executive of a leading oil company points out, is proving to be selfdefeating. By 1965, he predicts, the states will be deriving seven per cent less from the gas taxes than they planned, which will throw highway budgets far out of kilter in numbers of instances. His estimate, he adds, is born out by figures released by the Federal Bureau of Public Roads.

> In sum, motorists are rebelling at a tax on a necessity which is far larger than the taxes on even extreme luxuries. Their rebellion takes the practical form of reduced gas consumption. They drive less, or they buy more and more of the compact economy cars, or they do both.







Can Nancy win her lawsuit? Yes, said the court. The stove as offered to the public was, by reason of its negligent construc tion, inherently dangerous. The manufacturer knew or ought to have known of the defective condition of the article it placed on the market for general use. It places no hardship on manufacturers of such articles to charge them with knowledge of their own methods of manufacturing and of the defects in such methods if they exist.

The court further pointed out that although the danger in herent in the defect in the container was manifest to those who understood and were familiar with the method of fastening the cap to the container, it could not be said that the danger was apparent to Nancy, who had no knowledge of the manufacturing method used in making the stoves. Nancy had a right to asume that the stove was reasonably safe for use with ordinary care on her part.
