Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, announced recently that the Texas Public Safety Commission has approved the appointment of 10 new Texas Rangers in the largest expansion of the 138-year old law enforce-

ment body since 1935. Among those appointed was Homer T. Melton, who is serving

as sheriff of Knox County. Sheriff Melton, 51, of Benjamin has been assigned to Company C in Lubbock. He was the only lawman from this area of Texas to be appointed in the

Ranger increase. Melton was elected sheriff of Knox County in 1946, taking office on January 1, 1947. He had previously served two years as

chief of police in Benjamin. His father, J. W. Melton, had served as sheriff of Knox County from 1923 to 1928, and later served as county judge for four

years. The increase from 52 to 62 men was authorized by the appropriations bill passed by the 57th Legislature, Garrison said.

"The legislature recognized the need for additional Texas Rangers resulting from great industrial and population growth in the state which has, in turn, increased the number of calls for assistance from local law enforecement officers," Garrison said in a statement.

Garrison said the selection of the Rangers was made from within and without the DPS.



#### MAYBE THEY DON'T HATE US!

The Saturday Evening Post recently devoted an editorial to the tremendous increase in air travel between this country and Europe. A mere 21 people made the trip in 1939-while 625,583 made it last year! Nowadays, the people with a week vacation can spend practically all of it

The Post then touched on the wider implirations of this trend: "As more and more people legin to take advantage of the new travel opportunities, the impact of our changing vacation abits is having interesting effects on the American way of life. Already better acquaintance with other countries has helped stimulate interest in the teaching of foreign languages in public schools, created a greater taste for foreign news, books, furniture, sports cars, wine, and so on.

"Conceivably, also, the greater number of Americans abroad could produce more interest by foreigners in us. If, as reported, we are hated broad, citizens of the lands we visit will have better opportunities to decide why they hate us. They might even conclude that they don't hate

In any event, anything that contributes in my way to closer relationships between peoples, with the better understanding of problems and attitudes that must result, serves all humanity. Juan Trippe of Pan-American has preached that thought for years.

#### POSING A PROBLEM

Retailers employ great numbers of young people who attend school on a full-time student besis, and work for limited periods in the afterneons, or evenings, on Saturdays, and during vacation periods.

This employment provides untrained youngsters with a source of income and, additionally, enables them to learn skills and responsibilities that will prove valuable in later life. But the newly-expanded federal Wage-Hour law, which includes retail workers for the first time, poses a serious problem.

. if retailers are required to pay the going minimum rate, most of the job opportunities now available for full-time students will disappear. Reminimum to part-time inexperienced workers. But the type of work now done by these students, in most cases, will not be performed by adult workers. It will either be done by mechanization, changes to self-service, or through other econo-

This, of course, is a truism. Taxes, as one writer puts it, are good and necessary for civilization, in the same way that fire and water are good. But you don't have to burn down your house to warm your hands—and you don't have Tom Barfield, district lay leader to open a dam and drown in the flood to get a

The "Taxes Are Good" argument is used as a support for an almost endless list of government projects and proposals which advance the welfare state, reduce or destroy local rights and responsibilities, limit the freedom of groups and individuals, and dry up the normal sources of taxation-for example, housing subsidies, farming subsidies, public power schemes, federal aid to schools, federal medical aid plans, and so on.

So the "Taxes Are Good" theme needs to be carefully analyzed. They are good when levied for necessary purposes. They are bad when levied for purposes which should be undertaken, if they are to be undertaken at all, by local government or private enterprise.

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

Repentance is essential before baptism. "Repent and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of your sins and e shall receive the gift of the Holy Ghost" (Acts 2:38.)

And the faith that is in the heart of the one to be baptized must also be confessed. "Whosoever therefore shall confess me before men, him will I confess also before my Father . . ." (Matt. 10:32.) "For with the heart man believeth unto righteouseness; and with the mouth confession is made unto salvation" Rom. 10:10.)

Infants cannot be scripturally baptized. Neither can any other person who has not been taught the gospel of Christ, nor believed the gospel, repented of his past sins, and made the good confession (That Jesus Christ is the Son of God) that one is capable of being baptized, regardless of his age.

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

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


