GOOD WORDS_BUT

On May 25, in his Message on Urgent Nafional Needs, the President said: " . . . if we are to preserve our fiscal integrity and world con-Edence in the dollar-it will be necessary to hold tightly to prudent fiscal standards . .

On June 6, Under Secretary of the Treasury Roosa said: " . . . I cannot emphasize too strongby the harmful effects deomestically and interna-Tionally of any indication that our government does not have its fiscal affairs under control. At home, undisciplined deficits are a prime source of in the cold war, to reach its maximum. inflationary pressures."

These are true words. But the sad fact is that they are not being matched by action.

The so-called "temporary" limit to the national debt is about to be raised by \$5 billion, to \$298 billion. The budget deficit during fiscal 1962 will be enormous. And much of the increase approved or proposed in federal spending, let us not forget, has nothing to do with national defense. It is for new expanded domestic programs of the welfare state nature.

High officials, the Secretary of the Treasury among them, urge that business and labor exercise restraint in seeking price and wage increases. This is important-but it still amounts to just more words unless government exercises restraint in spending. If deficits continue and grow, we will be courting a runaway inflation that could cut the value of the dollar in half once again, and knock the props out from under our economy and national security. The Soviets would like nothing better

Jesus said: "It is written, man shall not live by bread alone, but by every word that proceedeth out of the mouth of God." James teaches us that if we sin in one point of the law of God we become guilty of all (Ja. 2:10). Again, the Bible says that "to him that knoweth to do good and doeth it not to him it is sin." Surely there is no one who thinks he is so good that he does every thing

good that he knows to do. The man who ignores Christ and the Bible is guilty of in-

gratitude. "Every good gift and every perfect gift is from above, and cometh down from the Father of lights, with whom is no variableness, neither shadow of turning" (Ja. give thanks in every-thing (1 trusts in his own self-righteousness becomes guilty of pride. There is no place for human pride in the presence of

The best example of a good man who needed to be saved is Cornelius, the Roman centurion. Compare your virtues with his. He was devout. He feared God with all his house. He was well reported of by the Jews. He prayed to God always. He gave much alms. Yet, the Bible says he was not yet saved. He was commanded to send for Peter "who shall speak unto thee words whereby thou shalt be saved, thou and all thy house" (Acts 11:14).

Cornelis heard these words of the gospel, and was commanded to be baptized in the name of the Lord (Acts 10:47-48).

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

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



County Average Rate For Wheat Given

The average county rates per acre for wheat acreage diverted to conservation uses under the 1962 wheat program are \$16.30 and \$21.80, according to Gaylon C. Scott, Chairman of the Agricutural Stabilization and Conservation Committee.

Individual farm rates are based on these county rates, depending on the farm's productivity in relation to the county average, the Chairman said. He also pointed out that each wheat producer in the county with a 1962 wheat allotment, and also each producer without allotments who have grown wheat in at least one of the years 1959, 1960, or 1961, has received information on the 1962 wheat program, including two rates for his farm.

For the minimum payment, the rate is 45 per cent of the adjusted basic county suport rate, mutiplied first by the number of diverted acres, and then by the individual farm yield or productivi-

The maximum payment rate is computed in the same way using 60 per cent of the adjusted basic county support rate.

Producers must use an acreage at least equal to 11.1 per cent of their 962 farm wheat allotment for conservation in order to be chigible for price support under the 1962 program and be in compliance with their 1962 allotment.

In addition, farmers way voluntarily divert an additional onethird of their 1962 allotment. The payment earned from this addional diversion is made at the maximum farm payment rate.

The diverted acreage must represent an additional amount over the normal conservation acreage and any acreage diverted to conpervation uses for which payment is made under any other Federal program, such as the

feed grain program. If the payment rate you have received is incorrect based on setual production in 1959 and se, you may appeal to the manty Committee for a correcson. This will require that you furnish documentary evidence such as settlement sheets, scale tickets or other documents that will definitely prove your produc-
