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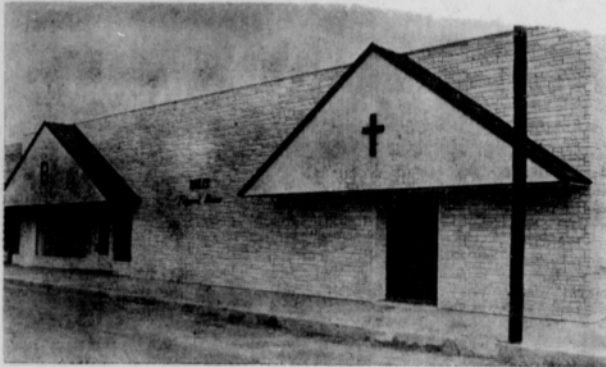

Electric Shock Demonstration Held at Baird High School Tuesday

Nobody is safe from electric shock, so don't let your body complete an electric circuit. This was the suggestion brought out by Joe Smetana, Safety Director for the Texas Farm Bureau in a graphic demonstration held Tuesday, Feb. 20 at Baird High School.

He illustrated this point and many others in the 45 minute demonstration using a variety of materials.

A model home, complete with special visual effects was used to trace electric current from the generator, through transformers, transmission lines, service entrance and "oversized" wall outlets.

Using special props, such as demonstration models of an "electro-graphic" man, electric drill, and toaster, Smetana pointed out where hazardous accident producing situations occur both inside and outside our homes as a result of using "faulty electrical equipment."

Some of the accident producing situations graphically illustrated, included standing on damp ground or wet cement, using or touching any grounded tool or appliance, or in contact with any piping system and allowing ordinary household current to pass through our body from defective equipment or accidental contact with conductors.

Continuing with the props having "special lighting effects" Smetana warned his audience of the hazards of associating with failing to unplug the toaster before cleaning, using an aluminum ladder near electric lines, flying a kite with wet or metallic threads in the string near electric power lines, and the dangers of a broken electrically charged line which has fallen over or near an automobile that has just crashed.

The average modern home has 120-volt or 240-volt, 60 cycle alternating household electrical current with a capacity of over 100 amperes. Electricity is constantly seeking "ground." Unfortunately the human body can complete the circuit. Medical authorities agree that if the amount of current required to light a 15-watt bulb, which is only 1-10 of an ampere, should flow through your heart, death might result in just one second.

Smetana offers these precautions and protective methods: 1. make sure that your electrical system is "grounded" - connect the white neutral wire, below the fuse, or circuit-

breaker box on the panel board, to a metal rod buried in the ground, or bond to water pipe. Make sure that the green "ground" wire is connected throughout the building to each outlet or wall plug; 2. If you purchase the latest type portable electrical tool with the 3-prong plug, don't clip off that third prong. Plug it in if you have a three-hole outlet, or if you have a two-hole outlet, use an adapter and attach the "pig tail" under the grounded center screw of the will outlet; 3. you may purchase certain quality portable tools featuring "double insulation" around the regular normal insulated wires and/or housing; 4. make sure that you have some type of ground wire properly connected on all stationary and most portable appliances and tools.

EXCEPT, DON'T GROUND an appliance that has an accessible open-coil heating element, such as a radiant heater, some broilers and a toaster; 5. consider the safety benefits of installing a ground fault circuit interrupter. The GFI's complicated electronic circuitry senses trouble the moment any current greater than 5-1000 of an ampere (5 milliamperes) starts to flow to the ground through a person or any object not intended to carry it. Then with snap-shot speed (as little as 25-1000 of a second) GFI snaps off the power. A flow of more than 15 amperes is necessary to blow the average household fuse or circuit-breaker.
