COLD WAR CASUALTY

Cold wars, like hot wars, have their casualties, although they are of a different character.

We recently witnessed an interesting example. For some time negotiations had been conducted between this country and Russia concerning a commercial air treaty. The purpose was to permit Aeroflot, the government-owned Soviet air line, to fly to New York. In reutrn, Pan American ends on this accurate note: "Everything suggests World Airways, a private American enterprise, that this upheaval is just beginning. From it, the would have been permitted to fly to Moscow.

The negotiators reached virtually final agreement on terms. Then the whole matter was summarily dropped, because of the tense international situation.

It's a pity, to say the least, that in this supposedly far advanced stage of civilization such actions should become necessary. At the same time, in the case of the air treaty, there were very obvious dangers involved. The Soviets are using their commercial air service as a potent cold war actually, part of the Soviet air force, it doesn't need to make a profit or even break even Pan American, on the other hand, like any other taxpaying private eenterprise, must pay its own way. The potential difficulties that competition between two such different kinds of enterprise might pose

At any rate, the matter is dead for the time being at least. We can still hope than an era will come in world affairs when there can be close commercial contacts of every nature between the nations, under rules that are fair to all.
