"The United States is so strong and its power so deployed that an aggressor who indulged in a sneak nuclear attack would be inviting destruction." So said Roswell L. Gilpatrick, deputy secretary of defense, in a speech at Hot Springs, Va., a few days ago.

"Our forces are so deployed and protected that a sneak attack could not effectively disarm us," he continued. "The destructive power which the United States could bring to bear even after a Soviet surprise attack upon our forces would be as great as, perhaps greater than, the total undamaged force which the enemy can threaten to launch against the United States in a first strike."

"In short, we have a second-strike capability which is at least as extensive as what the Soviets have. Therefore, we are confident that the Soviets will not provoke a major nuclear conflict."

We sincerely hope the Secretary is right, and that Mr. Khrushchev realizes it, too.

A fighting bunch of Munday Moguls suffered a stinging defeat of 37 to 8 last Friday night at the hands of the powerful Crowell Wildcats, and it appears the Wildcats are headed for another District 11-A championship.

Crowell is 4-0 in district play, and has an impressive 7-1 season mark. It was Munday's first district loss against two wins. The Moguls are 4-3 in season play.

The first touchdown for the Wildcats was set by an 88-yard drive. Gafford plowed over the goal from one yard out, and Halfback Dale Doyle added two more points on an end run.

Gafford scored again with 23 seconds left in the first half, and Doyle ran for two more points. Gafford got his third TD of the night in the third quarter. Another score followed when quarterback Ronny Bradford intercepted a Munday pass and raced 60 yards to the goal. Crowell's final counter was made on a five-yard run by Doyle, who also ran the final two conversions.

The Moguls' counter was made in the final period on a pass from quarterback Ricky Couch to halfback Douglas McGrady. The play covered 15 yards. Halfback Pete Alcalá ran for the two extra points.

"The Moguls were just up against a more powerful team," fans said Saturday in reviewing the game. "Of course they made some mistakes—all teams do—but they never stopped fighting at any point in the game. They're a scrapping bunch of Moguls."

Griffith remained unconscious Tuesday, except for very short intervals. According to reports of the accident, the car in which the youths were riding was passing another car when it swerved, "fishtailed" and overturned several times. All occupants were thrown from the vehicle.

FACTS ABOUT FALLOUT

The Soviet Union has resumed testing of nuclear bombs, and there is a belief that some of enormous size will ultimately be exploded. The United States is expected to soon resume tests too—reluctantly, but necessarily, in view of the Kremlin's ominous gestures. And these grim developments have inevitably aroused deep fears of what may result from radioactive fallout.

No one with a modicum of good sense will minimize the possibilities of the nuclear weapons, whether in the stage of testing or the final stage of use. At the same time, it would be equally futile to succumb to needless and dangerous panic. So a survey published by the American Medical Association, made up of the opinions of seven top scientists, is extremely important.

They find that the possible effect of the current increased level of radioactive fallout in the United States of health is "insignificant." They emphasize three basic points: 1. Fallout constitutes a very small amount of radiation compared with the amount of radiation occurring naturally in the environment. 2. There is no proof that distant fallout ever caused a disease in a human being. 3. Although most scientists assume that any amount of radiation has a genetic effect, this effect is unknown in human beings.

The consensus, finally, of these seven authorities is that any additional radiation is undesirable, but that the increase due to the distant fallout, because of Russia's resumption of tests, does not represent a significant health hazard.

We certainly should deplore the tests—but there's no present reason to be scared to death.

PRIME TARGET

Senator Byrd of Virginia has a long and honorable record of making straight, down-to-earth, and important statements, especially on fiscal policy.

In a recent speech he pointed out that late increases in federal spending have been for domestic-civilian programs—not for defense or foreign aid. He then said: "In 20 years we have lost more than 50 per cent of the purchasing power of the dollar. Let us, in all seriousness, ask ourselves: How disastrous will it be if we continue inflation-breeding policies—which appear to be on the increase—when our concern should be for return to fiscal responsibility?"

"Our fiscal position is vulnerable, and Khrushchev knows it. This is a prime target in the

strategy and tactics of the cold war he is waging against us."

The international picture seems to darken more each day. This year we have had a huge increase in the military budget, and no man knows what further increases may become inevitable in the near future. In the name of national survival itself, every possible government expenditure for domestic political projects and frills, and cradle to the grave handouts, should be voted down.

"SOFT-HEADED PHILOSOPHY"

Former President Eisenhower, now an elder statesman with a working lifetime of service to the nation behind him, recently said this: "Addiction to a soft-headed philosophy that federal money can cure every national ill could undermine one of the greatest resources of America—the sturdiness of and self-dependence of the individual citizen; it could ultimately cost our people their liberty."

"The unending drive for federal domination of the nation's power and water resources, and the ever-increasing federal involvement in urban problems, agriculture, housing, care of the youth and the aged, the ill and the poor, and the temporarily unemployed, can only end—if unchecked—in a dangerous centralization of power."

"Continued, this tendency will ultimately destroy the will and the ability of the individual and community to govern themselves."

To that clear and eloquent statement, nothing needs to be added. Long centuries of history prove the truth of the former President's words.

OPPOSING THE INEVITABLE

The steel companies have not raised prices since 1958. In the meantime, big wage increases have been granted, the last occurring on October 1.

To retard inflation, the President wrote the leading steel companies asking that they not raise prices, in spite of this last wage increase.

It is difficult to understand how continued wage boosts can be absorbed without an increase in the price of a product, in a free market.

It doesn't take the Department of Labor or any world renowned economist to figure out how continued wage hikes cause increased prices, and steel is no exception to this rule.

The owner of the smallest restaurant or cleaning establishment can give the answer—when costs go up, prices go up.

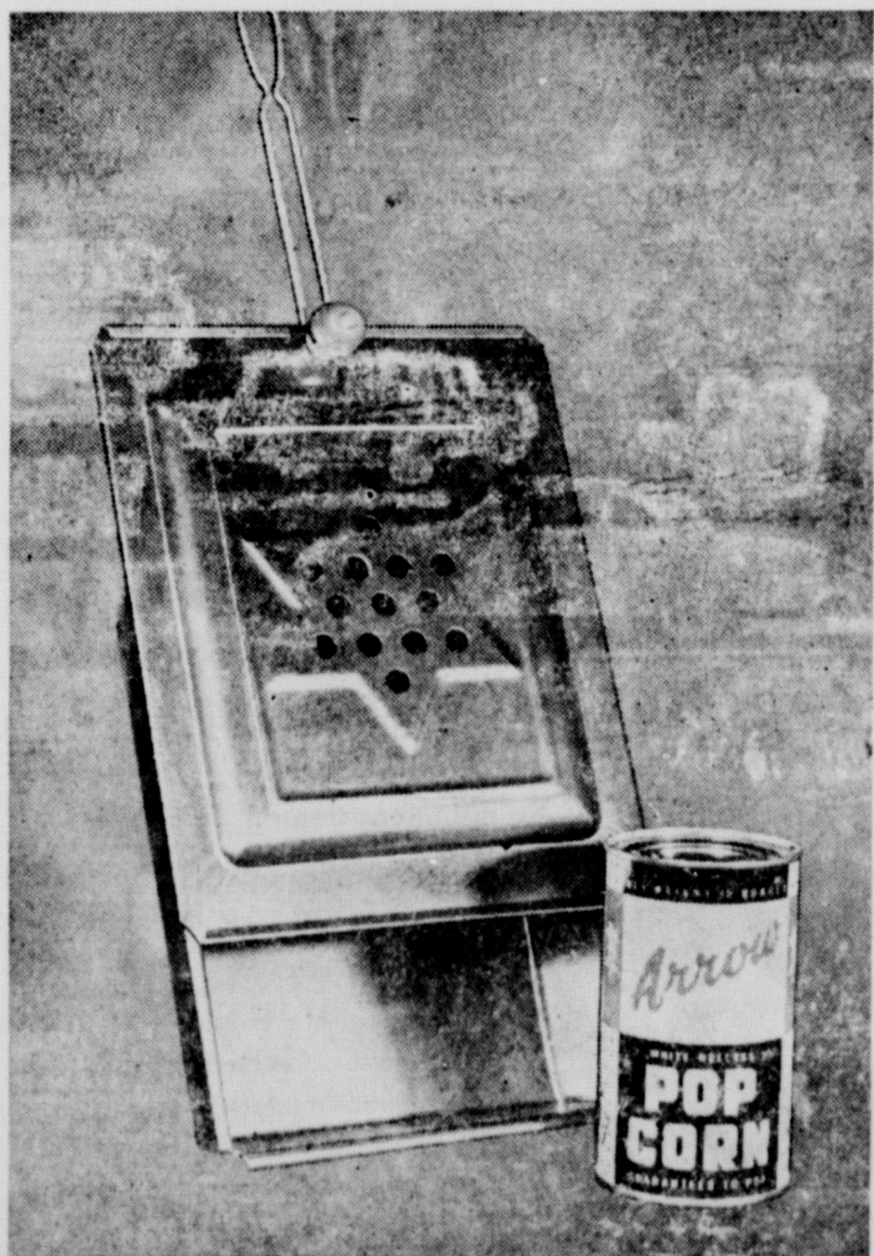

Dear editor:

As everybody pretty well agrees, the Russians are ahead of us in space and behind us in farming, and while I won't say this proves us farmers are smarter than our space scientists, still it's hard to argue with a fact.

But what I started out to say was I read about Mr. Khrushchev's twelve-hour speech before a big Communist party gathering in Moscow last week, a six-hour speech one day, followed by another six-hour one the next day. That is, I read a few highlights; one of the choicest freedoms of democracy is the freedom to not listen to a one-hour speech by a politician, not to mention a 12-hour ordeal.

And down toward the end I noticed that Mr. Khrushchev has promised all the Russians, including farmers, that by 1980 they'll be working only 6 hours a day, five days a week, and, he added, everybody will have paid vacations, including farmers.

Incidentally, he added also that if farmers don't start producing more right now, somebody's going to get sent to Siberia.

But what interests me most is this six-hour day Mr. Khrushchev is going to give farmers.

Now I have tried a six-hour day out here on this Johnson grass farm, and I like it fine, only I have found out that if everybody else tried it, I'm afraid the Secretary of Agriculture would stop worrying about too much food and start worrying about too little.

Maybe the present Russian farmers are smart enough to work twelve hours a day and still not produce a back-breaking surplus, but American farmers have never been able to swing it. The more they work, the more they produce, and the more they produce, the less they get for it and the longer they have to work to come out even.

I am afraid though that before Mr. Khrushchev gets all his farming done in a six-hour day, he's going to have to control the weather, produce a flat free tractor tire, a perpetual battery, an everlasting crankshaft, a dust-free carburetor, abolish insects and outlaw fishing, and I doubt if he'll be able to do that by 1980, which is only about 18 years away. If I was a Russian farmer and wanted to try the 6-hour day, I believe I'd cross the border.

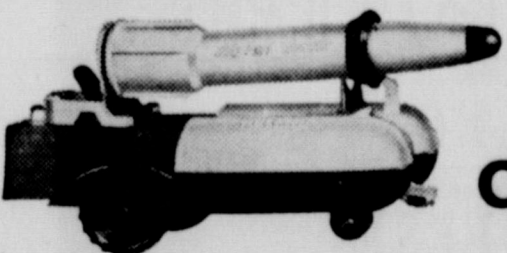

should check to see if they are shipping into a county that comes under the Brucellosis law.

For producers in the counties which come under the law, the Animal Disease Eradication Division of the USDA has announced that under a new plan, cattle producers can ship to market their cattle subject to a slaughter test that will save the producer the trouble of having his herd rechecked and still comply with the regulations.

County agents throughout the state are receiving the necessary preshipping tags that are to be placed on the cattle.

Forage Sorghum Demonstration

Sam Leaverton of Benjamin has just completed the harvest of the irrigated forage sorghum demonstration plot on his farm located west of Benjamin. The demonstration plot consisted of about one acre of each variety and received one irrigation.

The plot was planted on wheat land that was being changed in a rotation and for this reason, nitrogen was applied to the demonstration and there is a check plot. Two varieties received 128 lbs. of nitrogen and the others 64 lbs. of nitrogen. The two varieties that received the double fertilization rate were FS22 FS1A.

It should be remembered that this was not a replicated test and that the same varieties on the same land in another year might produce entirely different results. The results are as follows:
