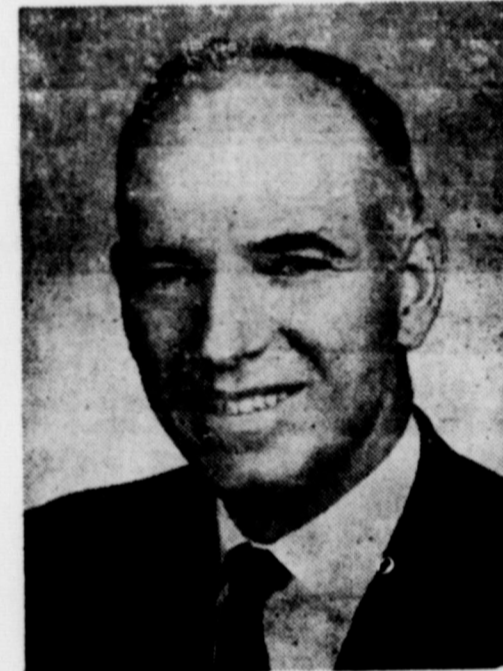

Can you be sure it'd sound intelligent? What makes you think they wouldn't turn off their sets and report: "We listened for but did not find intelligent radio signals from other worlds?"

What if they tuned in during the last ten seconds of a professional political campaign? What if they picked up one of Khrushchev's six-hour speeches? Or one of Castro's ten-hour jobs? Or a guitar player performing a singing commercial? Or right in the middle of an all-out war?

Man sometimes gets a little conceited about his accomplishments, but it's entirely possible, if there is life on other far distant planets, that those folks have already found out about us and are keeping it quiet, have pulled down their broadcasting towers, outlawed radio, and are trying to keep away from us just as long as possible. It's something to think about.

On the other hand, they may be in worse shape than we are and maybe we're the ones who ought to be keeping quiet. Sometimes people are a lot better off than they realize.
