Edward Day that a contract has been awarded to Clar inda Corporation (Dr. David B. Allen, President) Room 102, 500 Broad Street, Wichita Falls, Texas, to build and lease the build ing to the Post Office Depart

"We are continuing to build new post offices where they are needed," Mr. Day said, "but we are constantly re-assessing our lease construction program to determine whether present buildings can be altered or remodeled to take care of our expanding volume of mail.

The construction program is being concentrated in those areas where the need is urgent and suitable space cannot be obtained except through new construction.

"We now have about 45,000 post office locations throughout the country, handling a volume of 65 billion pieces of mail a year By 1970 it is expected to rise to 90 billion. It is clear, therefore that we must redouble our efforts, not only in expanding our capacity but also in devising new postal techniques to meet the demands of our growing pop-


