

saved Without Having Sins Remitted

If the sinner is saved without baptism, then he is saved without having his sins remitted. For Peter, inspired by the Spirit, said: "Repent, and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ for THE REMISSION of your sins, and ye shall receive the gift of the Holy Ghost." (Acts 2:38). Baptism is here stated to be "for". So until one has been baptized for the remission of his sins he has not had his sins remitted! Thus no salvation.

Saved Without Being In Christ

If sinners are saved without baptism, then they are saved out of Christ! "For ye are all the children of God by faith in Christ. For as many of you as have been BAPTIZED INTO CHRIST have put on christ." (Gal. 3:26-27). But can one be saved out of Christ? Jesus said, "I am the way, the truth, and the life: no man can come unto the Father, but by me." (Jno. 14:6). Again we read, "And this is the record, that God hath given us eternal life, and this life is in his Son." (1 Jno. 5:11). Even as we put on Christ in baptism, so we put off the "old man" mentioned in Col. 3:9-10 "Lie not one to another, seeing that ye have put off the old man with his deeds; And have put on the new man . . ." We can't put on Christ without baptism, and we can't put off the old man of sin without baptism. Read Romans 6:3-6. It is when we come into Christ that we have every spirtual blessing, (Eph. 1:3) not out of Christ. It is in Christ that we become complete (Col. 2:10). It is in Christ where we become new creatures (2 Cor. 5:17); and have salvation (2 Tim. 2:10). Now, if one is saved without baptism, he is saved OUT of Christ where every spiritual blessing has been located by the God of heaven.
