Simon, the sorcer, believed and was baptized; therefore he must have been saved for Jesus said "He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved" (Mk. 16:16). But after Simon had reached the saved condition, he tried to buy the power of God with money, and Peter said to him, "Thy money PERISH WITH THEE, because thou hast thought that the gift of God may be purchased with money. THOU HAST NEITHER PART NOR LOT IN THIS MATTER, for thy heart is not right in the sight of God, repent therefore of this thy wickedness, and pray God, if perhaps the thought of thine heart may be forgiven thee. For I preceive that thou are in the gall of bitterness, and in the bond of iniquity" (Acts 8:16-23). Simon was then lost, although he had before

Addressing the Christians at Galatia who desired to be saved by the law of Moses, after becoming children of God, he said, "Ye are fallen from grace." (Gal. 5:4).

You can find much more in the word of God on this subject. For instance, James chapter 5 and the last two verses thereof, "Brethren, if any of you do err from the truth, and one convert him, let him know, that he which converteth a sinner from the error of his way shall SAVE A SOUL FROM DEATH, and shall hide a multitude of sin." Save a soul from what death? Not physical death, for it is "appointed unto all men once to die" (Heb. 9:27). This includes the good and the bad alike. The only death from which you can be saved is the second (spirtual) death, which means to be cast into a lake of fire and brimstone (Rev. 20:14-15; 21:8). Who are the sinners here addressed? They are members of the church (children of God). James 5:19. No wonder, then, the apostle Paul said "Let him that thinketh he standeth take heed lest he fall." (1 Cor. 10:12).






