Your hunting and fishing licenses expire August 31, 1970. The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department has mailed new licenses to approximately 2,500 dealers in Texas well in advance of the deadline.

A spokesman for the department pointed out that persons hunting or fishing beginning September 1 should have new day, September 1 at 12 noon to licenses. But until that time the law requires all participating in either sport to have a license on their person.

Basically, persons 17 years of age and under 65 need the regular Texas resident licenses.



## July Bond Sales Reach 26% Quota

Mr. M. L. Wiggins, chairman of the Knox County Savings Bonds Committee, reported today that sales of Series E and H United States Savings Bonds in Knox county totaled \$4.985 during July. Sales for the first seven months were \$41,683 for 26 percent of the 1970 goal of \$160,000.

July sales in Texas amounted to \$15,434,922 compared to \$15,058,788 during the same period of 1969 - an increase of 2.4 percent. Year-to-date sales were \$106,206,174, while the 1969 sales totaled \$104,261,845 - a 1.8 percent increase.



LSD is so powerful that an amount covering a pinhead can turn a person into a monster. It enters the brain and confuses the senses. A sound may appear as a color. A fire seems to be a fragrant flower, so that the user reaches for it or put his face to it and suffers a severe burn.....

A feeling of lightness can influence an LSD user so that he thinks he can fly and he does, right out of the window to his death. He is out of touch with reality. If he has a "good trip," he can recover. But, months later, he can get the LSD effects without taking another dose.

LSD does not improve the personality or increase one's creativity. A "good trip" just gives you some new experiences. A "bad trip" can make you mentally unstable. Your brain might not be able to take it. Keep away from LSD.




