Lions Learn Work Wit Adult Blind

By AARON EDGAR slides, members of the Munday Lions Club received detailed information last Tuesday on rehabilitation work with the adult blind as it is being done at the Texas Lions Crippled Children's Camp at Kerrville. Lion Boyd Baker, program chairman for the month, showed the slides and did the commentary to provide this pro-

gram. During the summer months the Kerrville Camp devotes its energies toward a program for crippled children. During the remainder of the year, since 1957, it serves as an adjustment training center for the adult blind, bringing faith and hope to those who have been

deprived of their sight. These blind people remain at the adjustment center for some three or four months, where they are given some light in their world of personal darkness. Here they are taught how to thread a needle, the use of scissors, personal care of their clothing, how to cook for themselves on either gas or electric stoves, repair commodes, make simple electrical repairs and

many others. The happiest day of their lives, it was pointed out is when they learn to get around in downtown Kerrville by themselves. They are also taught in such areas as recreation and entertainment, and those visiting the camp are greeted by persons who are so thoroughly rehabilitated that they at first find it difficult to determine that they are blind.



Commissioner John C. White has announced that November is rice month in the Lone Star State. During this period, TAP (Texas Agricultural Products) will promote rice as one of Texas' top foods. The Texas Department of Agriculture will team up with the Rice Council for market development to call the housewife's attention to this product.

Considered our most versatile food product because of its use as a breakfast cereal, vegetable, main dish, and dessert, rice is produced in 21 counties, mainly along the Gulf Coast area. This area is bounded by Orange, Hardin, and Liberty counties on the north and in the south by Calhoun and Victoria counties.
