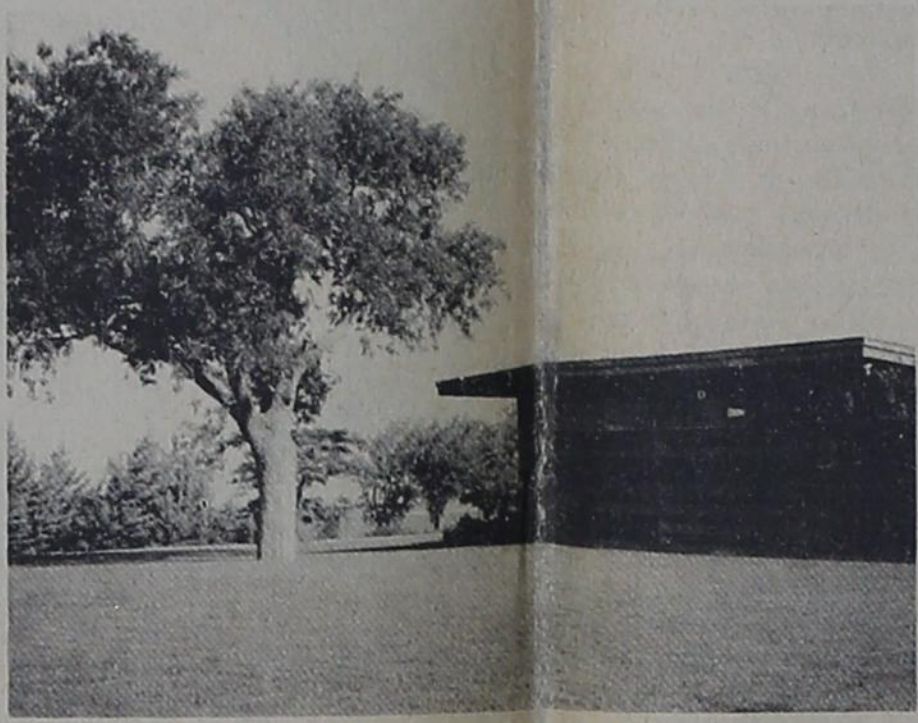
## Bond Sales Total 30% Of '71 Goal

April sales of Series E and H United States Savings Bonds in Knox County were \$7,215, according to County Bond Chairman, M. L. Wiggins. Sales for the first four months totaled \$48,060 with 30 per cent of the 1971 goal achieved.

Sales in Texas during April totaled \$17,799,730, while year-to-date sales were \$69,658,537 with 38 per cent of the 1971 goal of \$181.9 million achieved.

Nationally, Savings Bond sales during the month totaled \$463 million, 26.7 per cent above 1970 sales. Sales for the four-month period amounted to \$1,838 million, 18.1 per cent above a year earlier.

## Potato Harvest In Full Swing Here

Potato harvest started last Thursday with the first load brought in by J. T. Offutt and processed by Munday Vegetable Growers Co-op. Gene Thompson, manager, stated that they had processed 765,000 pounds at noon Monday with 90% bulk loaded, with the harvest just now getting in full swing.

Munday Vegetable Growers Co-op has approximately 500 contracted acres of Russets, or baking potatoes, and potatoes for chipping. Frito Lay of Irving purchased the first load and Ballentine Produce of Alma, Arkansas bought the second load.

The price of potatoes and yield is about the same as last year according to Mr. Thompson, and if the weather continues to be pretty, the potatoes will be rolling in.

Mr. O'Haughey of Lubbock, who processes for B. E. Smith & Sons every year, stated they started Tuesday morning and had 275 acres of red potatoes. He said they do not contract their potatoes but sell to various producers and grocery stores. He stated the Smiths had a good crop of potatoes and the quality was also good.

At Colville and Wilson Potato Shed processing started Monday morning. Jack Colville said he has 300 acres of red potatoes contracted and that the quality and yield seemed to be good.

Rains fell last week slowing down harvesting but fair weather prevails the first of this week and the farmers are working early and late to get their crop harvested.

## Contracts Let For Highway Construction

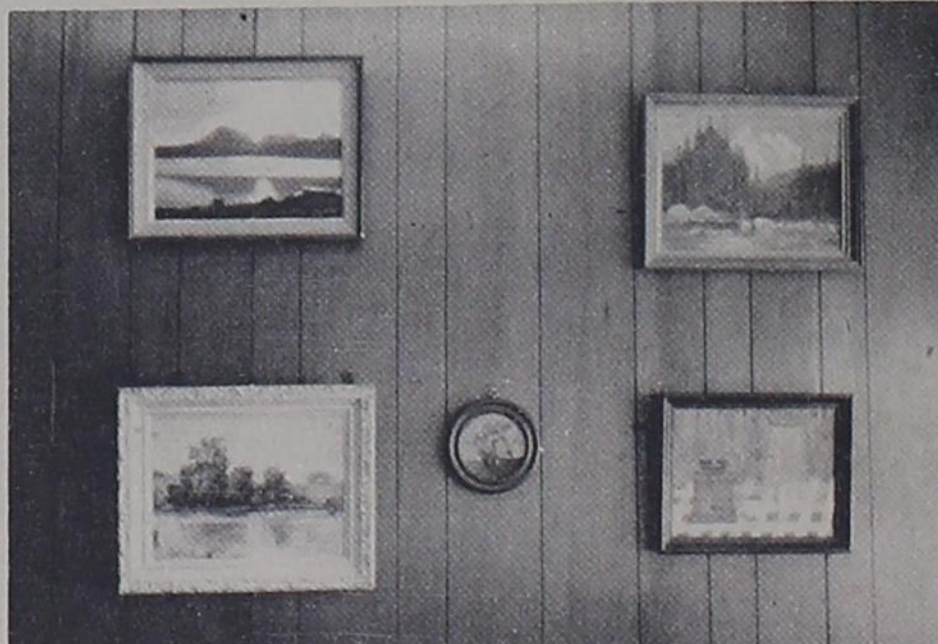
Austin - Contracts for highway construction in the Childress district have been awarded by the Texas Highway Commission.

The work will be under the supervision of District Engineer V. J. McGee, and will be in Knox and Briscoe Counties.

H. L. Freeland, Inc. and George M. Amthor of San Antonio were awarded a contract for grading, structures, base and surfacing on 9.0 miles of Farm to Market Road 3202 and FM 1587 in Knox County. Low bid was \$306,517.50.

The project extends from FM 2534, southward to FM 1043, and from Munday southward to the Haskell County Line, George R. Wall of Munday is the Highway Department engineer in charge of the project which will take an estimated 150 working days.

**West Texas Well Suited For Vegetable Production**

Lubbock - Texas leads all the states in the nation in harvested acreages of cabbages, carrots, onions and watermelons. It ranks third in fresh market produce and fourth in the acreage of all vegetables.

The High Plains contributes to the record with an annual vegetable production of \$23 million - principally in potatoes, onions, carrots, cucumbers, lettuce, green beans, tomatoes, watermelons and cantaloupes.

The prospects for greater vegetable production is "indeed bright," according to Dr. Sam E. Curl, associate dean of the College of Agricultural Sciences whose specific interest is the college's research programs.

"West Texas has soils and climate well suited to vegetable production," Professor Curl said, "and the area's intensively cultivated vegetable crops generate a large percentage of the state income derived from vegetables."

The principal production areas, he said, are the Munday-Knox City area, Gaines County, the Plainview-Herford-Muleshoe triangle, the Pecos-Fort Stockton area and the upper Rio Grande Valley near El Paso.

"As with any other farm crop," Curl pointed out, "vegetables provide a significant multiplier effect which stretches their economic value far beyond the direct sale of the products."

Large numbers of people are involved in the production. They deal with chemicals, fertilizers and machinery. Production itself requires a large labor force, and harvesting, packing, shipping and marketing involves an even larger segment of the population.

It is in each of these areas, Curl said, that Texas Tech University is supplying continuous and progressive research leadership.

"The Texas Tech research," he said, "supports the prediction that vegetables have a strong future in the West Texas economy."

Dr. John D. Downes, Vegetable Research Program director, is a professor of agronomy. Working with him are faculty in horticulture, entomology and others in agronomy with special interests in plant and soil sciences.

The researchers function as a team, explained Curl, "supplementing and complementing the skills and efforts of one another," and working cooperatively with the Texas Department of Agriculture and other state agencies.

Supporting the research effort is the Texas Tech Vegetable Research Advisory Com-

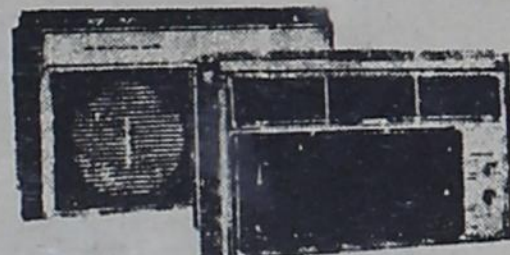
