




In releasing Treasury figures, County Bond Chairman M.L. Wiggins announced that

sales of United States Savings Bonds in Knox County during March totaled \$10,670. Curing were \$44,018 for 28 percent of goal achieved.

Texans purchased \$18,288,-542 in Savings Bonds during the month compared to March 1971 sales of \$17,180,080 -- an increase of 6 percent. Quarterly sales totaled \$56,927,138 for 28 percent of the state's goal of \$202.3 Million.

National sales of E and H Bonds amounting to \$582 Million were reported for March, 13.3 percent above 1971 sales of \$513 Million. Sales for the three-month period totaled \$1, 640 Million - 31 percent of the National goal of \$5.3 Billion.

Lost at the Laundry

"We had a burglary last night," he said, "and your bundles were stolen. I'm afraid you are just out of luck.'

But Katherine decided that he, not she, ought to bear the loss. Filing suit for damages, she pointed out that the back door of the laundry had only the flimsiest kind of a lock, even though the building had been burglarized before. The court found the proprietor guilty of negligence, and ordered him to pay Katherine's claim.



When you leave clothing at either a laundry or a dry cleaner, you are creating what the law calls a "bailment." The company, as the bailee, must take reasonable care of your belong ings. Although not to blame for an unavoidable loss, it is liable for a loss it could fairly have prevented.

Suppose the company tries to protect itself by a notice saying it is not responsible for losses of any kind. Does that make a difference?


Most courts will recognize some limitation, but not a total denial, of the company's liability. Furthermore, a notice has no



In one case a laundry inserted into each finished bundle a small printed notice, placing a dollar limit on its liability for losses. But when a customer demanded payment for some missing items. the company was held liable in full. The judge said the dollar limit could not be part of the bailment contract, because it was not even mentioned when the clothing was first brought in. On the other hand, the company too is entitled to "notice" of what it is accepting responsibility for. In another case, a man negligently left a ring in the pocket of a suit he sent to the cleaner. The ring vanished, and he put in a claim against the company for compensation.







How often do you stop to think about an impressive statistic that is written about glibly? For example, 5 million unemployed. Bet that conjures up an image of desperate breadwinners who were thrown out of their jobs and are hopelessly walking the streets in search of nonexistent work.

But such is not the case, according to George Hagedorn, chief economist of the National Association of Manufacturers. It's not that the Department of Labor's statistics are assembled for false impressions, but rather that you would have to wade through masses of figures every month to get the true picture. Also public media are likely to give only the amount of detail they think you and I will read.

Actually, in 1971 the statistics-collectors listed only 1,810,000 unemployed people who were "household heads." That's just 36 percent of the 4,993,000 unemployed. The rest, or 64 percent, were




