Bond Sales For July Are \$4,988

M. L. Wiggins, Chairman of the Knox County Savings Bond Committee, reported this week that sales of Series E and H United States Savings Bonds in Knox County totaled \$4,988.00 during July. Sales for the first seven months were \$68,463.00 for 43% of the 1972 goal of \$160,000.00.

July sales in Texas were \$16,989,269 compared to \$16,810,210 during the same period last year. Year-to-date sales amounted to \$125,013,794, while 1971 sales totaled \$118,726,731 - a 5.2% increase.

Nationwide sales during July totaled \$493 million. For this January-July period sales were \$3.7 billion - 15% above sales last year. Exchanges of Series E for Series H Bonds amounting to \$27 million were reported for July, 13% above the \$24 million exchanged last year.



\$500,000 Is earmarked For Local Flood Control

Local city officials and commissioners of the Munday Drainage District are completing details relative to putting into high gear the local flood control project, for which a "starter" of \$500,000 has been appropriated by the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers.

The project is for cleaning out, widening and concreting the drainage ditch to the south and southeast of Munday which was constructed years ago to help carry off flood waters which converge on Munday during heavy rains. The project will include lowering the ditch some 18 to 24 inches and the elimination of several culverts along the route, giving more of an open channel for the drainage waters to flow.

It Rains So Easy, Now!

Remember when those prognosticators would say: "20 per cent chance of rain" and you'd scoff at them?

Remember how you wished it would rain--and it wouldn't? Now, you're wishing it would stop--and we don't blame you!

Adding to the 4.13 inches of moisture which was reported for last week's paper, the Munday area has had a total of 7.33 inches during the past ten days.

A rain of about one-third of an inch came during the nighttime hours Thursday, with some more being added through Sunday.

Then, Monday morning it got tired of just foolin' around, and the clouds celebrated Labor Day by dumping a total of 2.65 inches on Munday, bringing the week's total to 3.20.

Some near-flooding conditions were experienced in Munday, as the drainage again became inadequate, but the water drained off in a few hours. It's safe to say, however, that the area is wetter than all get-out!

Munday United Fund Elects New Officers

The Board of Directors for the Munday United Fund, Inc. met recently to elect three new board members, and a replacement on the Board for a two year term to replace Marvin James.

New Board Members elected were: Mrs. Charles Baker, Mrs. R. L. Brown and Leo Fetsch for three year terms. Troy Gaunt, Campaign Chairman for the 1972 Drive, was elected as a new Board member replacing Rev. James, and was also elected as new chairman of the board. Cecil Cox was elected as vice-chairman with Mrs. Walter Owen re-elected as treasurer, Mrs. Callie Ann Combs was also re-elected as secretary.

Action was taken at the meeting to redistribute funds not used and returned to the Fund, allocated last year to be used for a proposed Children's Day Care Center. The redistribution

will include lowering the ditch some 18 to 24 inches and the elimination of several culverts along the route, giving more of an open channel for the drainage waters to flow.

The fact that the money had become available was given in a letter to Mayor J. E. Reeves on March 27, 1972, from Carlyle H. Charles, colonel, Corps of Engineers and assistant director of Civil Works for Plains Divisions, in which he said in part:

"The President's budget request for Fiscal Year 1973 includes funds in the amount of \$500,000 to initiate construction of the flood control project at Munday. However, additional funds would be required from future appropriations to complete the project."

It is estimated locally that the project would run in the neighborhood of one million dollars. In order for these funds to become available, local governmental units must approve re-

Paul Perez Is Operator For Enco Station



solutions to the effect that they will cooperate with the Corps of Engineers. A resolution was signed by the drainage district officials on August 30, and by the City of Munday on August 31.

A similar resolution is expected by the Knox County Commissioners Court, involving one bridge span across the drainage ditch and three low-water crossings in other areas where county roads cross the ditch.

A group from Munday met with the Commissioners Court in a called meeting last Thursday morning to discuss the court's action in this matter. The Court, through County Judge Sam Clonts, requested more detailed information as to what would be required of the county.

Contact was made with Mr. Watson of the Corps of Engineers in Fort Worth, and he agreed to meet with the court at 10 a. m. Thursday, September 7, to give the Court and interested citizens more detailed information as to the work to be done by the county, and the approximate costs.

A resolution is expected to be issued when all details are worked out, giving the "go ahead" signal for this project.

Mayor J. E. Reeves was informed by telephone last week that the contract would likely be awarded and the project under way by this time next year.

Farm And Ranch News

FARMERS READY FOR SUNSHINE

Grain sorghum, cotton and guar producers in Knox County are ready for sunshine as from five to eight inches of precipitation has been received from August 25 through September 4.

Grain sorghum that was ready for harvest has sucker heads appearing that are becoming a problem in harvesting.

The continued wet, cloudy weather delays cotton maturity and increases insect numbers.

MINERALS IN FARM WATER
Unpalatability and reduced water consumption are often brought on by minerals dissolved in drinking water. Losses of appetite and in feed conversion efficiency result from this low water intake.

Thus, for best results in animal production, clean, palatable water is a prime ingredient. Water begins to decrease in palatability when the amount of minerals exceeds 500 to 1,000 parts per million (ppm) depending on the nature of the minerals. Beyond these limits the water becomes increasingly unpalatable and finally toxic.

If better water is available, neither man nor farm animal will choose highly mineralized water. But if forced to drink it, he may develop a tolerance to its taste and effects. This varies, depending on the nature and amounts of minerals, and the animal species, age and condition. Unfortunately, although tolerance to its effects may develop, there is a definite limit to how much the animal's body will take. Beyond that both water and feed intake are depressed, followed by rapid loss of body weight, signs of toxicity and eventually, death.

Some minerals are withstood better than others. Also, certain forms or compounds of the minerals are better tolerated. Experience and research have found that cattle, swine, sheep and chickens remain in good health on saline waters containing up to 15,000 ppm of the bicarbonates, chlorides and sulphates of sodium and calcium, up to 10,000 ppm of potassium and magnesium salts or as many as 5,000 ppm of sodium and calcium carbonates.

However, during the adjustment period, feed and water intake are reduced, as are growth rates, laying rates and milk yields. But once adjusted, animals perform normally up to the tolerance limits.

Although no water is com-

pletely free of dissolved minerals, accumulations of certain ones are harmful. Lead, arsenic, selenium, fluoride and some forms of chromium are cumulative poisons. As such, excesses are not eliminated from the body fast enough to prevent a build-up in the liver, bones or elsewhere in the body.

In addition, all nutritionally essential minerals are toxic at sufficiently high levels. Sodium, potassium, calcium, magnesium, iron, manganese, copper, zinc, molybdenum, cobalt, iodine, selenium and chromium are safe only in limited quantities.

Thus, in areas of highly mineralized water, producers should know the mineral content of feed as well as water.

The problem of acceptable minerals in farm water is one that becomes more critical as livestock production is intensified in smaller areas.

More information on this problem is found in a new fact sheet, "Acceptable Minerals in Farm Water" that is now available at the county Extension office. Information is also available on submitting water samples for analysis.

FUNGUS DISEASES INVADING LAWNS

Two fungus diseases that attack St. Augustine lawns are currently causing some "headaches" for Texas homeowners. The culprits are "grey leaf spot" and "fading-out," according to Dr. Walter Walla, plant pathologist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Grey leaf spot causes irregular brown to gray spots on the leaf blades of St. Augustine grass. The disease develops rapidly under warm, moist conditions and is usually noticed first in shady areas.

In areas of heavy disease development, Walla notes that the grass may have a burned

or scorched appearance. Grey leaf spot often invades newly sprigged or rapidly growing grass.

The Texas A&M University specialists explain that fading-out is a serious problem in many lawns where the grass is thin. The fungus disease develops rapidly, causing large dead areas in the turf.

Thatch build-up is one of the major causes of fading-out. Such a build-up comes by allowing grass clippings and dead leaves to accumulate on the turf. This provides a favorable environment for the disease.

The plant pathologist encourages homeowners to follow good cultural practices so that lawn grasses will stay healthy and thereby resist diseases. These practices include mowing at the proper height, fertilizing according to a soil test, water-

ing properly and avoiding thatch build-up by removing leaves and grass clippings.

If a disease situation becomes severe, a fungicide may be applied to hasten recovery, adds Walla.

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New Game Laws Became Effective On July 22

AUSTIN -- As a result of recent action by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission, several laws concerning sportsmen go into effect July 22 in all regulatory counties except those 23 counties in which commission action is subject to approval by the commissioners courts.

The daily bag limit on largemouth, smallmouth and spotted black bass was changed to 10 in the aggregate with a possession limit of 20 in the aggregate. The fish must be at least 10 inches long. The possession limit does not include fish processed and stored at the fisherman's permanent residence.

The 11-inch minimum length for catfish was removed. All trotlines that remain in public fresh water must be redated at the expiration of each 90-day period, and Texas Parks and Wildlife Department enforcement personnel are authorized to remove expired and undated trotlines.

"Spear" was deleted from the section on legal methods for taking fish, and "spear gun and spear, bow and arrow," was substituted.

Floating buoys 10 inches above the waterline are now required for marking crab traps.

In the Northeast Regulatory District the use of hoop, trammel and gill nets is now illegal in Toledo Bend Reservoir and the Sabine River in Panola County.

The javelina season in the permian Basin is Sept. 1, 1972 through Jan. 31, 1973 with a bag limit of two.

The combined daily bag limit of rainbow trout and brown trout in the Possum Kingdom, Permian Basin, Edwards Plateau and Trinity Brazos Regulatory Districts is five per day with no possession limit. The fish must be at least eight inches

in length. The waters of Lake Fairfield are closed to the use of all nets, and in the above regulatory districts catfish are deleted from those species which formerly could be taken by nets.

In Atascosa County the season on Javelina runs concurrent with the deer season which is Oct. 1-31 for archery and Nov. 18-Jan. 1 for the regular season. Bag limit is two per season.

In the Southeast Regulatory District catfish may not legally be taken with nets, and Walker County is closed to netting.

Pilot Housing Survey Is Scheduled For Area

The 19-county West Central Texas Council of Governments Region has been selected by the State as the site for a special pilot housing conditions and occupant attitude survey which will get underway September 7. This announcement was made recently at the August meeting of the Council's Regional Housing Committee in Abilene.

It is expected to take about two weeks to complete the survey and another two to three weeks to have the data analyzed and reports developed. The State will provide all necessary technical assistance for performing the survey in addition to actual training of the interview personnel.

According to the Council's Assistant Executive Director, Bob Lambert, some 25 to 30 ladies will be employed in local communities throughout the region to do the contact work in the survey. He stated that some 500 homes will be contacted as a basis for the inventory with pre-selection of the random cross samples determined by computer based on the 1970 general census records. Lambert indicated that this representative sample of homes will include families of all social and economic back-

grounds. The study will use a new pictorial method of evaluating housing conditions in an effort to objectively determine the incidence of sub-standard housing as it exists in this region. The workers doing the survey will be given a set of photographs showing different parts of a house and they will grade the dwelling in relation to which photo condition it most closely resembles.

The workers will also interview occupants so the conditions of the housing can be analyzed in relation to the attitude characteristics of the occupants.

Consultants who are employed by the State to coordinate the development of the study indicate that the survey will be 95% as accurate as it would be if every house in the region were examined.

Following a September 7 training session for workers, the inventory and interviewing will begin and it should conclude on or before September 21.



Memorial Gives Inspiration To Life

In the beautiful little cemetery at Baird, Texas, a red-dish granite memorial stands in a family plot. It guards not the grave of the one whose name is chiseled on this everlasting piece of granite. It is an inarticulate stone erected in memory of a young Air Force lieutenant named Robert Walls.

This young officer was lost on a combat mission over New Guinea in 1944. The inscription on this memorial stabs you awake and creates a reverie of gratitude for his life, sacrificed in the dark days of World War II.

It seems to me that his memorial says something to each of us today, for here on this rock is inscribed the words-- "When last seen he was still flying."

Who among us cannot visualize the courage and dedication of this young officer as he flew into the wild blue yonder to be swallowed up by the vast creeping jungle of vine and tree. His bones and his plane have long since bleached and milled into oblivion. The muffled drums' sad roll has beat this airman's last tattoo. Words carved in his memory may even surpass in motivation his full measure of devotion and the oblation of his life. "When last seen he was still flying."

Rhetoric can neither add nor detract from the offering that Robert Walls gave to his country. The score has long been settled. The lengthening shadows of the years are drawing the blinds on those who knew him personally, and the comrades that flew with him. To try to fathom a measure of understanding of what was at stake in the conflict that cost him his life seems unimportant now. No discourse can explain the devotion and courage and what "When last seen he was still flying" meant to the young man from West Texas.

More important, what does "When last seen he was still flying" say to you and me today? Can these words inspire us when the motor is missing, the runway is obscure, and the clouds are thick? Can we keep flying? Every day we come in contact with individuals whose flaps are down, who are skimming the treetops of life with a throttle closed, and are heading for a crash landing. So often we want to say, "Raise the flaps, open the throttle--keep flying!"

I paused in a ward recently in one of our mental hospitals and looked upon a pile of flesh that had once been a young and beautiful girl. Her life has been virtually destroyed by a hypodermic needle. This young girl had already decided that the navigation of life was rough and she had folded the map, turned off the engine and bailed out, depending on a parachute that was full of holes.

Recently, a person I know went home and put a bullet in her head. She had lost the radar of radiant living and she struck the tent and faded away.

Day after day, we see marriages that break and splinter for the lack of effort. The prisons are full of those who missed the runway of right direction. Welfare rolls, skid rows, flop houses, junkies, hip-

pies, and others are testimonies to failure. Many can offer excuses, few will say--"When last seen we were still flying." Many are unwilling to pay the price that will enable them to glide over the ramparts of life.

Is there a refrain that can touch your heartstrings today? Is there a voice crying out that says, "Stretch yourselves?" Is there one among us that cannot remember the time when the road was forked and the choice we made affected our life? Are we thankful when we look back to those souls that influenced us to reach for the stars and to keep flying?

It seems to me that America needs a sweeping revival of motivation. We need inspiration that says to the individual, "Flight one more round." Personally, I ask that I be numbered not among those meek souls that always stay in port. Let me be one who cried as the Biblical prophet of old, "Give me that mountain,"--to challenge me, to enrage me, to determine me, to beat it, and to climb it. If that mountain is despair, grief, disappointment, let me always attack and let my scars always be in the front.

Let us also remember that each individual must make an accounting. In the final analysis, it will not be the company, club, group, or even the family that will answer. No, it will be each of us, individually, with the ledger of our life and the ways we used it. It will be wonderful on that day, after our records have been checked, the ledger is closed, and we head down the road toward eternity, if that Man in the Tower is asked if He has us in the flight pattern and He replies-- "When last seen he was still flying."
