Study of Water Nitrate, Salt Content Begun

A team of representatives of the Texas Water Quality Board of Austin and Lubbock arrived here on Tuesday of this week to begin working in Knox and Haskell Counties, securing additional information about the nitrate and salt content of underground water in the area.

They are Dr. Clyde Bohnfolk, biologist, James Bain, geologist, and Raymond Mittel, district supervisor of the Lubbock District of the Texas Water Quality Board.

They will be working with

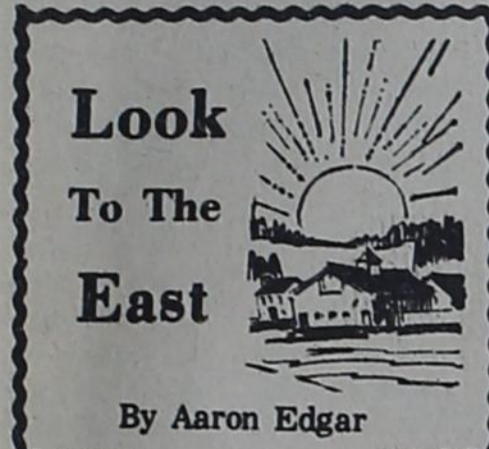
personnel from the Munday Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture for the purpose of interviewing city officials of area towns, farmers and others who can aid in providing information relative to the continuation of a study of the underground water found in the Seymour aquifer.

Last summer, a study of the salt water problems of this area was begun by the Water Quality Board and the department of agricultural engineering of Texas A&M University.

"We are looking at a more comprehensive study of underground water in this basin," stated Callie Ann Combs, manager of the Munday Chamber of Commerce. "The basin supplies water for some 3,000 irrigation wells that are used extensively in irrigating about 256,000 acres of land at this time."

"Most of these wells have been pumping for 24 years with very little fluctuations from the original water levels. Very rapid recharge from rainfall is strongly indicated in the entire Seymour aquifer, making a continuous supply available for irrigation. This very unique situation makes our land values very high as compared to other areas of Texas, since the area and its climatic conditions are very desirable for present and future food supplies. We need to be viciously protective of our underground water from any type of pollution."

It is hoped that contacts made by this visiting team will result in further study and surveys in protecting our water supply from rising nitrate and saline content.

We have a feeling of remorse because we didn't share some of our ailments and ideas for regaining health with this person.

Sometimes we act like the doctors and nurses are just doing the jobs before them, and do not know what's best for the patients. They need "the comfort" of a friendly visit and an "inspiring" story of how Uncle Harvey of Aunt Minnie became afflicted with this very same ailment, suffered a whole heap, finally got better; then had a relapse and didn't make it!

A good many of our visits with the sick come about by the insistence of our good wife. When we do go a visitin' at the hospital and we see a "No Visitors" sign, we sorta have an urge to go on in--at least crack the door to see what's going on. That's wrong, of course! But we--and we're not alone in this--kinda have the urge to see why the heck this patient can't have, or doesn't want visitors.

By the same token of Dear Ann's statement above: No visitors' signs are placed outside the door because the patient needs rest--not company. They don't need a chain smoker in there filling the room with cigarette smoke and carrying on yak-yak for an hour or more!

There are periods, of course, when a patient really wants and enjoys company. Perhaps a member of the family should inform friends when the time is ripe.

Even after they are released from the hospital and return home, we've never heard of them sending out engraved invitations to come visit!

Periods of visitation that were rewarding to us came about during the almost a year that Wade Mahan was a resident of Leisure Lodge in Munday. On top of being an old boyhood (almost childhood) friend of ours, Wade was "up and about" during his residence here.

We had sort of established the day and hour of our visit, and Wade got to thinking that we should be as prompt at this chore, if it could be termed a chore, as we were at opening the office each morning. He depended on us, and not many times did we let him down. When he left there were adjustments to be made.

Most of us can readily and truly admit that we don't visit the sick and the shut-ins enough. If we can be smart enough to temper our visits with reason,

H. C. Stone, Knox County Sheriff, announced Saturday that a reward of \$1,000 has been offered for information leading to the whereabouts of John Honeycutt, 37, of Munday, who has been missing since May 8.

Honeycutt has not been heard from since telling his mother, Mrs. E. J. Smith, that he was taking a week's vacation prior to opening of the potato harvest. He was last seen at a bus station in Seymour, and was supposedly headed for Lubbock.

He had reportedly withdrawn \$1,100 from his service station account prior to having a friend take him to the bus depot. Fear has been expressed locally that the missing man possibly has been a victim of foul play.

Detroit Students Getting Some Experience In Texas

A rental van--a 15-passenger vehicle--pulled into Munday last Monday evening, and its passengers unloaded for a short stay in the "rural community" of Munday. The "cargo" consisted of nine students in the Detroit Country Day School near Detroit, Mich., who were headed by Ronnie Clemmer, a teacher in the school, and his brother, Terry Clemmer.

Ronnie annually sponsors summer travel for educational purposes of interested students. He and Terry are nephews of Gene Brown of Munday, and it was through their uncle that the trip to Texas--and especially Munday--was arranged.

The group came to Munday, according to Clemmer, to see rattlesnakes, stinging scorpions, away from the mountains and forests, and to get an insight of "rural living" in Texas. "They want to work," he said, "and are particularly interested in the potato harvest."

The summer trip is designed to broaden their knowledge of the country and ways of living so different from their own. The group appeared at Tuesday's luncheon of the Munday Lions Club, and Instructor Clemmer gave the program--an interesting account of the school and an insight to Detroit. He introduced each of the ten boys and made some interesting comment on each.

While in Munday--and they're leaving July 1--the boys are guests in various homes of Munday citizens.

Other places included on their

itinerary are: Carlsbad and the White Sands in New Mexico; the El Paso-Juarez area, Big Bend National Park, Midland,

Dallas-Fort Worth, Six Flags and points in Kentucky.

Each of the boys is around 15 years of age.

Truck Driver Killed West Of Benjamin

Daniel David Dykes, 25, of Burleson, driver of an ICX Motor Freight truck, was killed instantly in an accident about 15 miles west of Benjamin at about 6 p.m. Sunday.

According to reports obtained from the office of Sheriff H. C. Stone, the family of John Philip Childs was moving from El Paso to Coffeyville, Kans., and had stopped by the roadside to get some rest and sleep.

Childs was driving a rental truck with two members of his family, Karl Barnett and Timberly Barnett as passengers in the truck. His wife, Shirley, another child, Kevin Barnett and a cousin, Danny Roeder, were travelling in the car.

The ICX truck, which was pulling two trailers, plowed into them from behind and jackknifed. Dykes was killed instantly, and four members of

the Childs family were taken to the Knox County Hospital, x-rayed and released.

An ambulance from McCauley-Smith Funeral Home was dispatched to the scene on an emergency run, and brought the body of Dykes to Munday. It was later transferred to Burleson.

Members of the transient family were taken to the Knox County Hospital for treatment, but the extent of their injuries were not learned.

All vehicles involved in the accident were badly damaged, with the ICX truck reported completely demolished.

Dykes was declared dead at scene by Alice Vinson, justice of the peace at Guthrie. The accident was investigated by the King County Sheriff and Highway Patrolmen Williams and Derring of Knox City.

Conservation Activity Increases Considerably

Conservation activity in the Wichita Brazos Soil and Water Conservation District has increased considerably following the re-activation of the Rural Environmental Conservation Program in April of this year reports Arche Lieb of the USDA Soil Conservation Service in Knox City.

Lieb said most interest, according to producers requests, is on brush management and irrigation practices, ponds, with a few producers requesting assistance on grassed waterways diversions, and parallel terraces.

During the initial sign-up period more than 40 requests were received for brush control, 25 requested assistance for installing irrigation pipelines, 18 for ponds, 11 for grassed water-

ways, 3 for parallel terraces and 2 for diversions. Additional requests are being received daily, Lieb reported.

There is a shortage of available conservation contractors, Lieb said, and producers are encouraged to make arrangements for their services before requests for SCS assistance are made. Producers should also contact the SCS office in Knox City well in advance of the time a contractor will be available, so design and layout can be scheduled. Requests can be serviced promptly if producers will keep this in mind.

Irrigation pipelines have been installed by David Albus, Jerrel Trainham, Mrs. Angela

Recreation consisted of swimming, miniature golf, pool tournament, ping pong tourney, tennis, a watermelon party and a "dunk the band director" event.

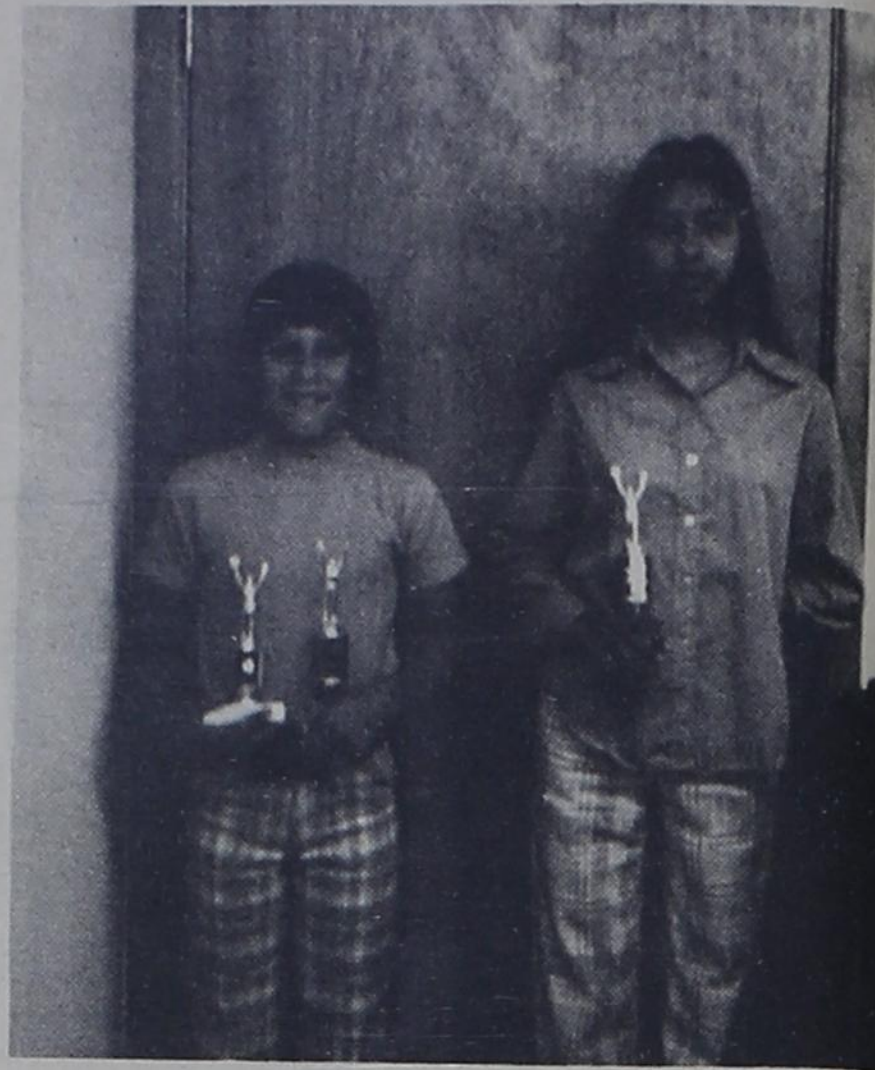
David Huff, local band director, showed his skill in several events, playing a great game of ping pong, golf, and the highlight event of dunk the band director.

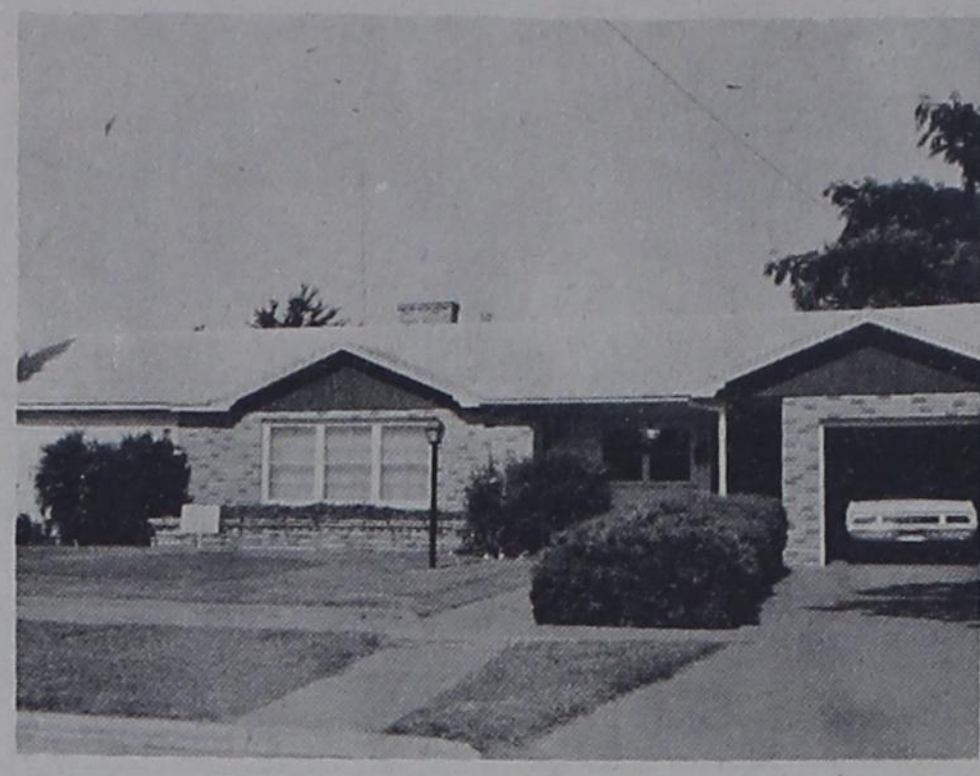

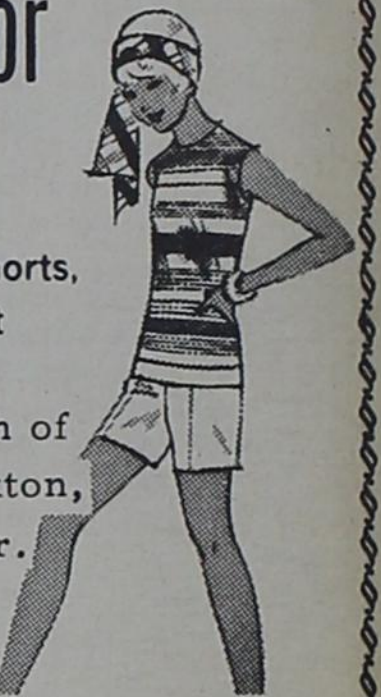

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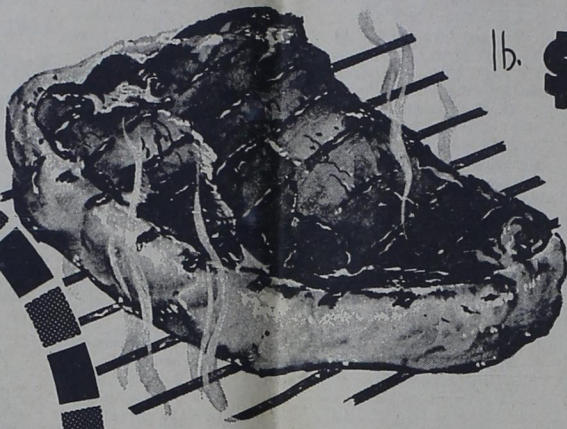
